Daylight Saving Begins April 1.—All the clocks of Kent county, and the whole country, in fact, will be set ahead one hour on April 1. The primary object of this is to save two hours of daylight each day.

Mr. Turner bought 1200 bushels from him. Mr. Nicholson made the sale a few days before the bottom dropped out of the corn market, which sent it to \$1.60 a bushel for yellow corn.

Woman Arrested For Bigamy.—Sheriff Carter went to Chester Wednesday and arrested Mrs. Unsworth and brought her to Chestertown on the same day. It is charged that Mrs. Unsworth, since her marriage to Mr. Unsworth in Gloucester, N. J., was married to Mr. Earle Dodson, of Chestertown. Unsworth is now in France with Uncle Sam's forces.

Former Kent Man Killed.—Mr. William Greenwood, son of Mr. John H. Greenwood, and a brother of Mrs. J. Hyde Thompson, of Chestertown, was run over by an electric car in Baltimore this week and killed. He was born here and moved to Baltimore a number of years ago. He was 53 years old and leaves four sons. His body was brought to Kent via Towchester Beach and interred at St. Paul's. The bearers were Edward Leary, James Burgess, James Wood, Charles Wood, J. H. Thompson, James Burgess. C. L. Dodd, undertaker.

Forcing Them To Work.—A negro farm hand of County Commissioner Carey Reinhart was arrested one day this week on the charge of stealing corn from Mr. Reinhart. Mr. Reinhart went to his corn crib one morning this week and found the wire torn off. He saw footprints leading across his cornfield, and following the trail he was carried to the home of the negro in Georgetown, where he found a quantity of the corn. Sheriff Carter made the arrest. The man was given a hearing before Police Justice Rogers, who bound the negro over to Mr. Reinhart and Mr. Mahon Lee for a year.

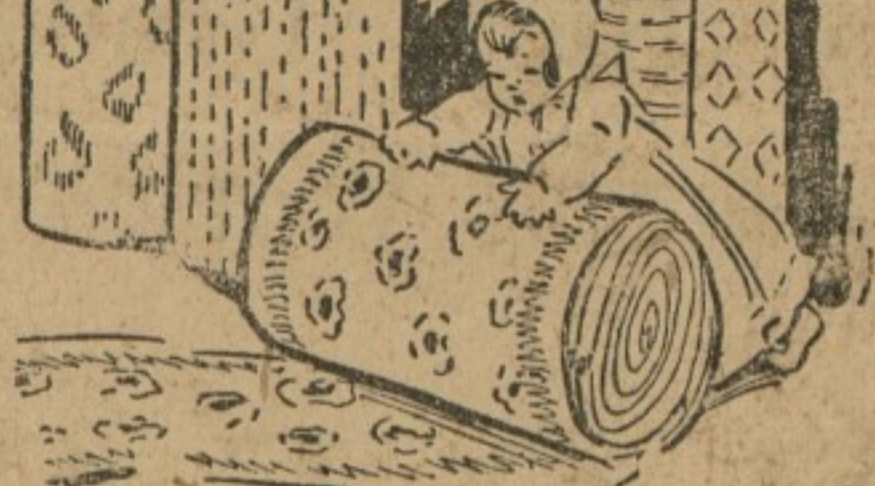

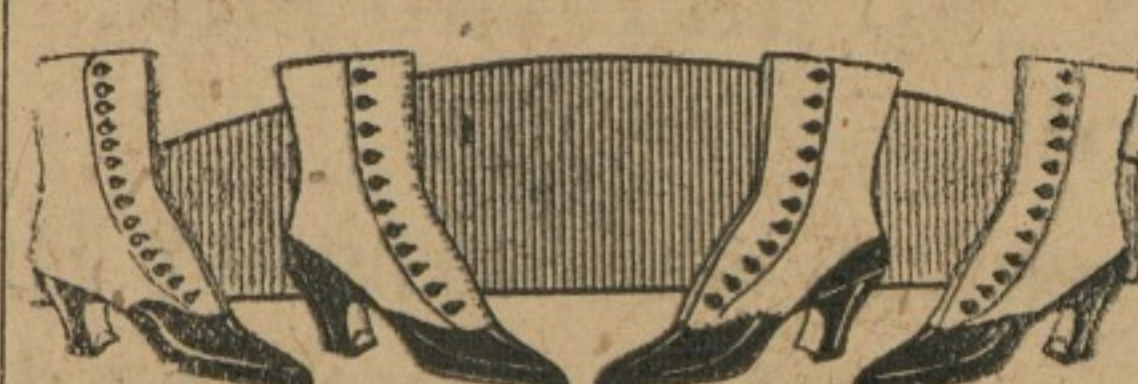

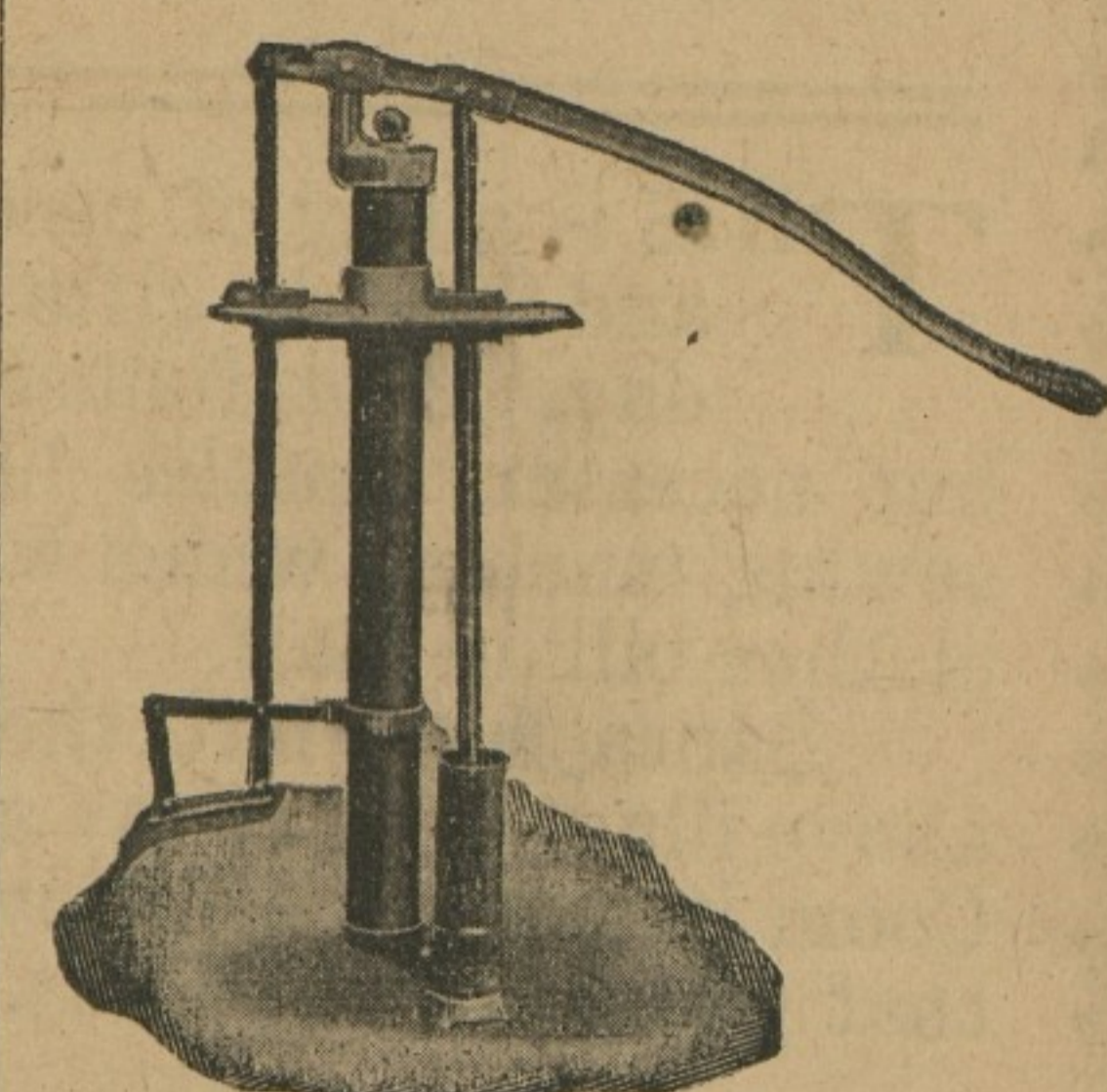
