THE WHIP!

### Kent Cow Testing Association

The Kent County Cow Testing Association is now in the last month of its first year's work. About 23 cows who could not stand the pace under the high cost of feed have been culled out. Twelve pure bred heifers have been purchased. One of them, a pure bred Holstein, owned by Mr. C. Cornelius, of Kennedyville, milked in the past month 51 lbs. a day with a test of 4 per cent. This is equivalent to 1 1/2 lbs. of milk and 63.2 lbs. of butter for the month. This is especially good when you consider that this cow did not get any silage or hay with her grain ration. There will be a meeting of members of the Cow Testing Association on April 9th at 2 p. m., at the office of County Agent Burrell.

With concentrates worth close to \$60.00 a ton and labor scarce, the man who keeps any herd at all should cull out the boarders and the attention spent on them put on the producers.

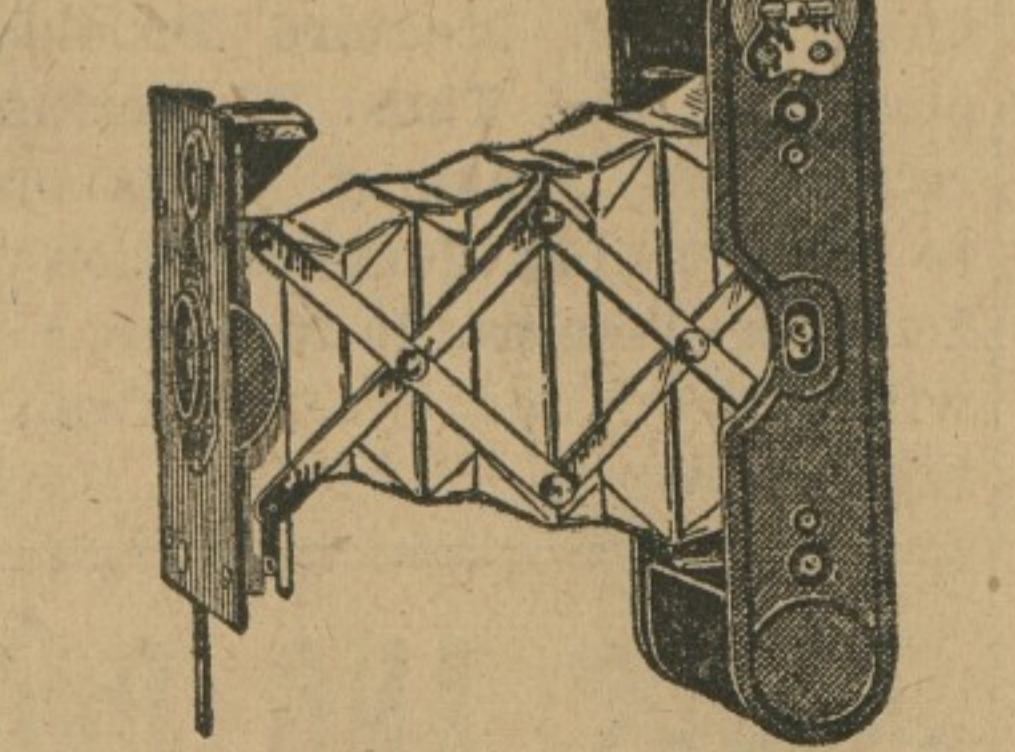

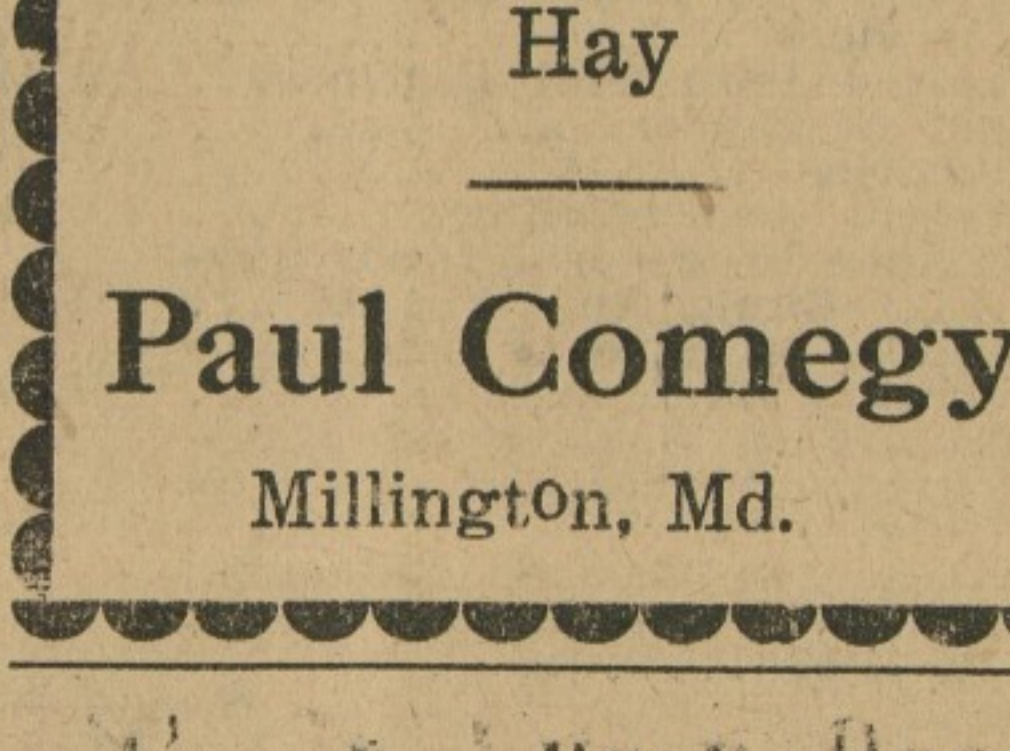
