THE Third Liberty Loan Drive will open today in Kent. At ten o'clock this morning the church and town bells will be rung announcing the occasion.

SENATOR OWEN CROTHERS, of Cecil, we understand, has announced his candidacy for Congress from this district. He is a nephew of the late Gov. Austin L. Crothers, and has made an enviable record in the Maryland Senate, where he is now serving his second term. We also understand that Congressman Jesse D. Price will be a candidate to succeed himself.

THE Maryland Legislature adjourned Monday night and as usual with all legislatures, some good and some bad legislation was put through. The budget bill and the public service commission have eliminated many of the small bills that are usually passed, as these two bills take the place, in their scope, of many small local bills. Two of the most important bills passed were the Federal amendment for nation-wide prohibition and the Baltimore City annexation bill. The anti-gambling race track bill was defeated.

DEATHS

Mr. Bartus Trew, one of Kent's leading and most respected citizens, died at his home in Chestertown on Tuesday afternoon, April 2, aged 83 years. Mr. Trew's ancestors were the original Quakers that settled in Quaker Neck and the farm where he spent his life was part of the original land grant. Mr. Trew was a farmer all his life, but for a number of years carried on a commission business in Baltimore during the fruit season. He loved agriculture and combined with it a rare intelligence. Last Xmas, failing health caused him to move to Chestertown.

He is survived by a son, Mr. Walter Trew, a daughter, Miss Katie Trew, a sister, Miss Joe Trew, and a grand son, Master Bartus Trew, of Baltimore.

Funeral services were held at his late residence on Queen street, Chestertown, on Thursday afternoon at 3 p. m., conducted by Rev. A. H. Covey and Rev. T. F. Beauchamp. The bearers were: Samuel J. Mr. Isaac Cleaver, one of Kent's oldest and most highly respected citizens, died at his home in Kennedyville last Monday evening, aged 82 years. He leaves one son, William Cleaver, and two daughters, Mrs. Janie Webb and Mrs. Margaret Webb. Funeral services will be held from his late residence Thursday afternoon, conducted by the Rev. P. Schauer, interment in Still Pond cemetery. The pall-bearers were: Thomas Vandye, W. Thos. Jones, Elias Othson, George R. Rasin, Robert Wallace and Linwood Redmile. Undertaker W. H. Krusen in charge.

Mrs. Sarah V. Biggs died at her home in Baltimore Tuesday last aged 76 years. She was the widow of the late Capt. Perry Biggs, of Worton, this county.
