

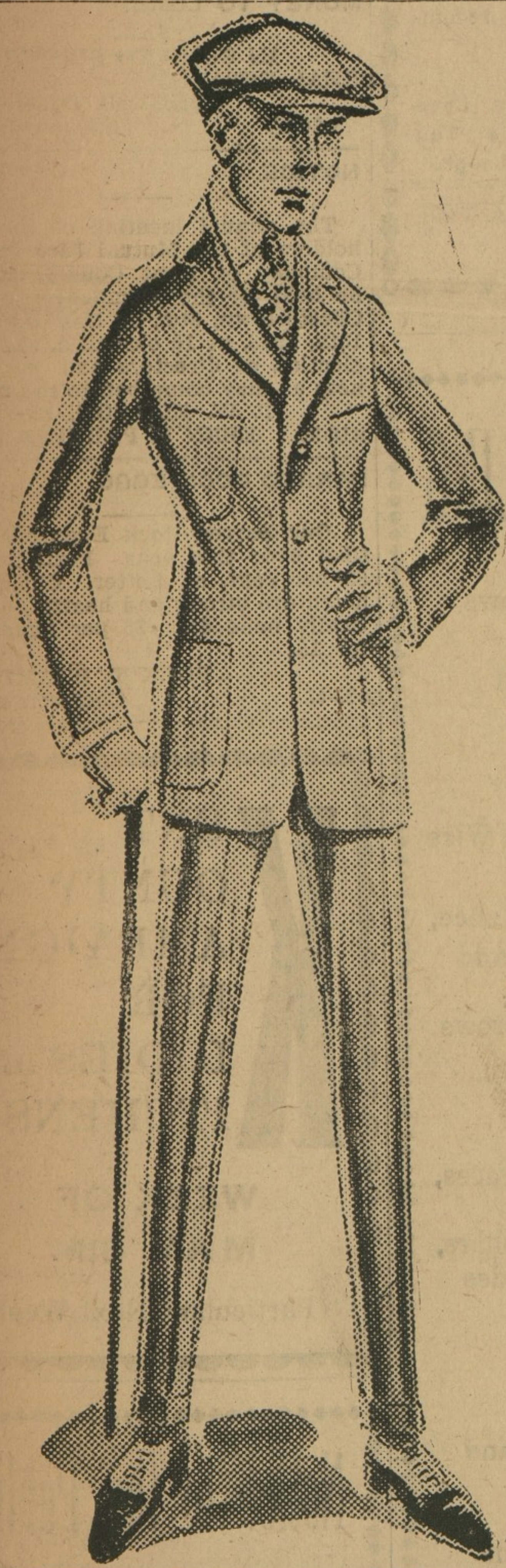

### ELECTION OF TOWN COMMISSIONER WATER BOARD AND VOTE UPON THE BONDING OF THE TOWN FOR SECURING ADDITIONAL FIRE EQUIPMENT.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the Court House in Chestertown, Md., on

Monday, April 22, '18,

for the purpose of electing one person to serve as Commissioner of Chestertown for three years in the place of Robert Moffet, whose term expires May 1st, 1918. Also to elect Three Members of the Chestertown Water Board, the terms of the present Water Board expiring on May 1st. Polls open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m.

And under and by virtue of a law passed by the General Assembly of Maryland in 1913, at the said election there will be submitted to the qualified voters of Chestertown the question contained in a bill, to bond the town for additional fire equipment, the provisions of which are in the following bill:

AN ACT to authorize and empower the Commissioners of Chestertown, Kent County, Maryland, to borrow money on the credit of said town for the purpose of securing Additional Fire Equipment for said town and to issue bonds for the payment of same, and levy on the assessable property of said town to redeem said Bonds and pay the interest on the same.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Commissioners of Chestertown be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to issue bonds in the name of the Commissioners of Chestertown to an amount not exceeding \$6,000.00 in sums of not less than \$100.00, to be signed by the Commissioners of Chestertown under the Corporate Seal of said Commissioners, to be designated as "Additional Fire Equipment Bonds," bearing interest at a rate to be fixed by the Commissioners of Chestertown not exceeding six per centum, payable semi-annually on the first day of July and the first day of January of each year, which bonds shall be exempt from all County and Municipal taxation in Kent County and the due or overdue coupons for interest shall be received by the Commissioners of Chestertown in payment of Town taxes. Said bonds shall bear date as of July 10th, 1918, and be payable in sums of \$500.00 in each of the years beginning with the tenth day of July, 1922, and each year thereafter until fully paid. Said bonds to be numbered consecutively and to be redeemed in the order in which they are numbered, but said Bonds shall be redeemable at the option of said Commissioners after six years from the date of the issue.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That said Commissioners of Chestertown are authorized and directed to advertise at least once a week for two successive weeks in the newspapers published in Kent County and one newspaper published in the City of Baltimore for sealed proposals for the negotiations of said bonds and on a certain day to be named in said advertisement, the said Commissioners of Chestertown shall in the presence of such persons as may be interested in said Bonds, open all bids received and award the bonds to the highest bidder; provided, no bids less than per shall be accepted and reserving the right to reject any and all bids.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That the Commissioners of Chestertown shall create an annual sinking fund beginning with the year 1920 for the payment of interest and for the redemption of said bonds, and if said sinking fund cannot be made sufficient under the present authorized levy or any future authorized levy to pay the interest on said bonds, and the one-twelfth part of the said bonded debt as it matures, the said Commissioners of Chestertown are hereby authorized to levy and collect annually a tax upon the taxable property in Chestertown for a sum sufficient to provide for the payment of any such deficiency of interest on said bonds and any deficiency on one-twelfth part of the principal of said bonded debt, as the said bonds mature.

Sec. 4. And be it enacted, That the said sum of \$6,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose, shall by the said Commissioners of Chestertown be used and applied to the purchasing of additional fire equipment for said town, and if any part of the proceeds of sale of said Bonds be left over after the purchasing of said Fire Equipment, the said amount is to be turned over to the Treasury of said town to be used by the Commissioners of Chestertown in improving the Streets of said Chestertown.

Sec. 5. And be it enacted, That at the next regular election for Commissioners of Chestertown, there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of Chestertown the question whether bonds shall be issued for said additional fire equipment and at such election the ballots cast upon such question shall have the words "For Additional Fire Equipment" or "Against Additional Fire Equipment" thereon, and if a majority of the votes cast upon said question shall be "For Additional Fire Equipment," then the Commissioners of Chestertown, or a majority of them, shall proceed to execute the power vested in them by this Act, but if the majority of votes cast shall be "Against Additional Fire Equipment," then this Act shall be of no effect.

Sec. 6. And be it enacted, That this Bill shall be declared an emergency law as it is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health and safety of Chestertown, Kent County, Maryland.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

Mr. John B. Richardson, son of Mrs. Harry T. Richardson, near Puchester, has just received word that he has arrived in France.

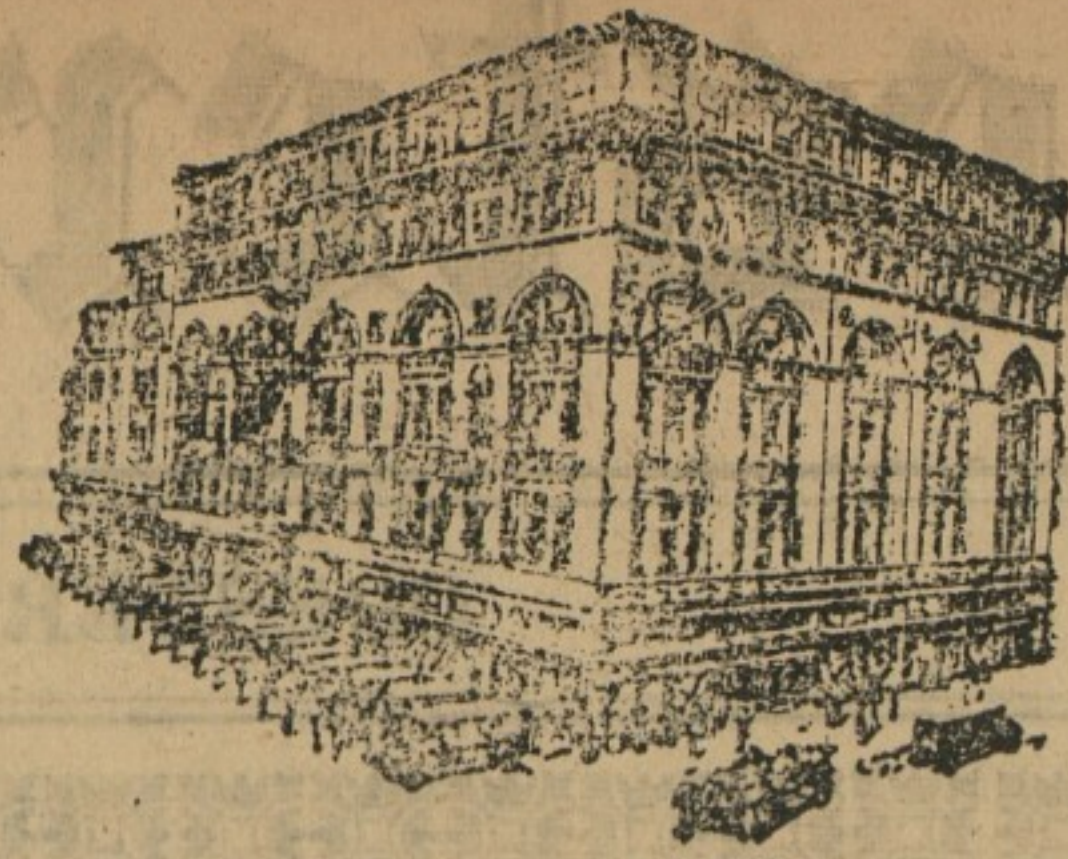

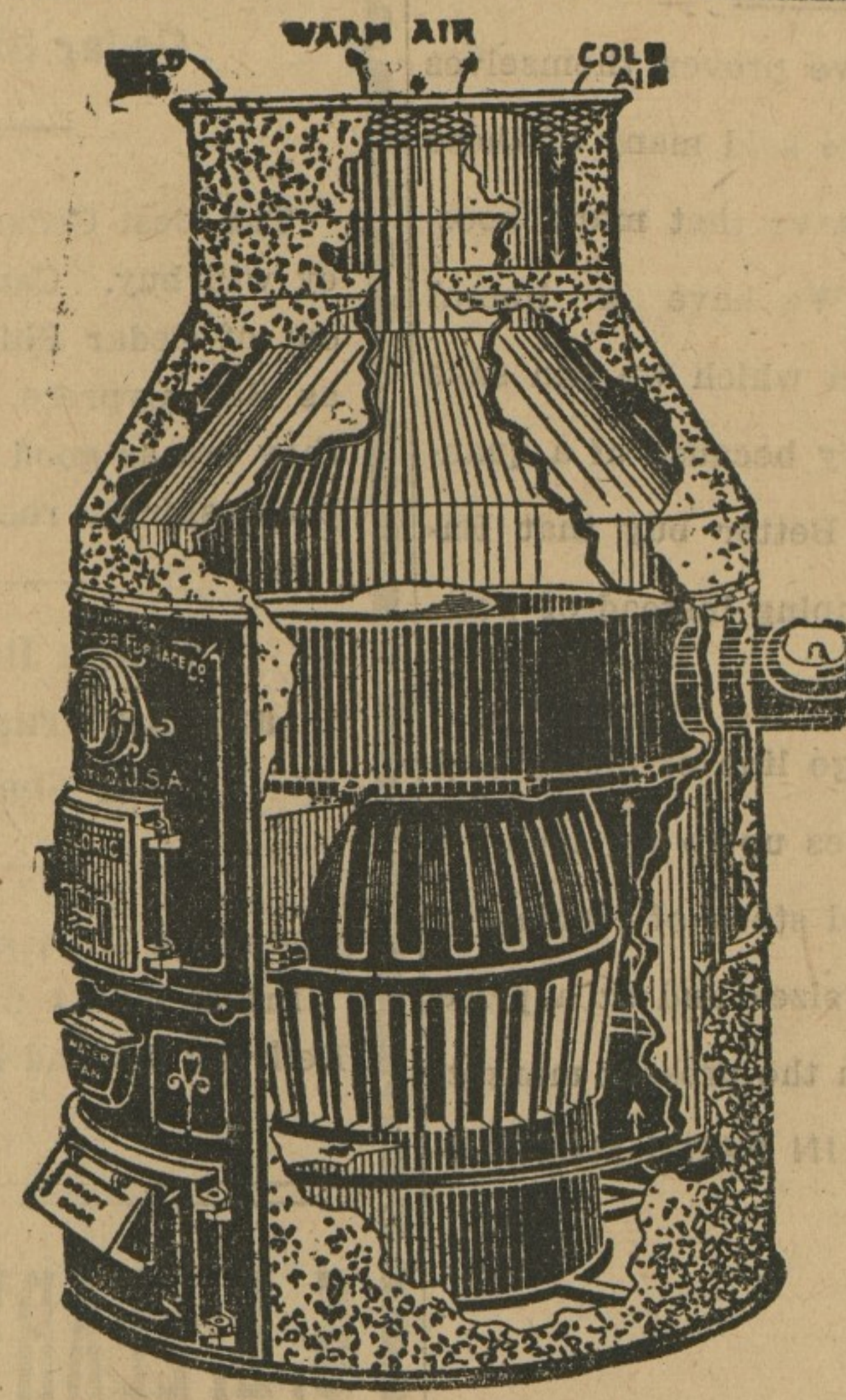
