THERE IS COLLECTIBLE ABOUT \$322.18, MAKING A TOTAL OF \$7,100. AN ADDITIONAL TOTAL OF 10 CENTS WAS COLLECTED TO PAY FOR COUPONS ON BONDS FOR STREETS AND SEWERS, AMOUNTING TO \$1,250.

The bonded indebtedness of Chestertown is as follows: \$25,000 for streets and sewers; for the purchase and improvements of water works \$53,500, making a total bonded indebtedness of \$78,500.
