A rousing meeting for the purpose of selling the Third Liberty Loan Bonds was held in Lyceum Theatre on Monday evening. The theatre was packed. Pledges to the amount of \$52,000 were taken. Kent's quota is \$254,000 and, so far, the amount pledged is far short of this amount.

County Chairman Allan A. Harris introduced the following speakers, who presented the cause in a forceful manner: Ex-Senator Clarence Perkins, James W. Chapman, Jr., Esq., General T. Kemp Bartlett and Sergeant Wild, the latter having been in service in France. Arnold's Band, of Baltimore, furnished music, while Mr. T. Kemp Bartlett led the patriotic airs.

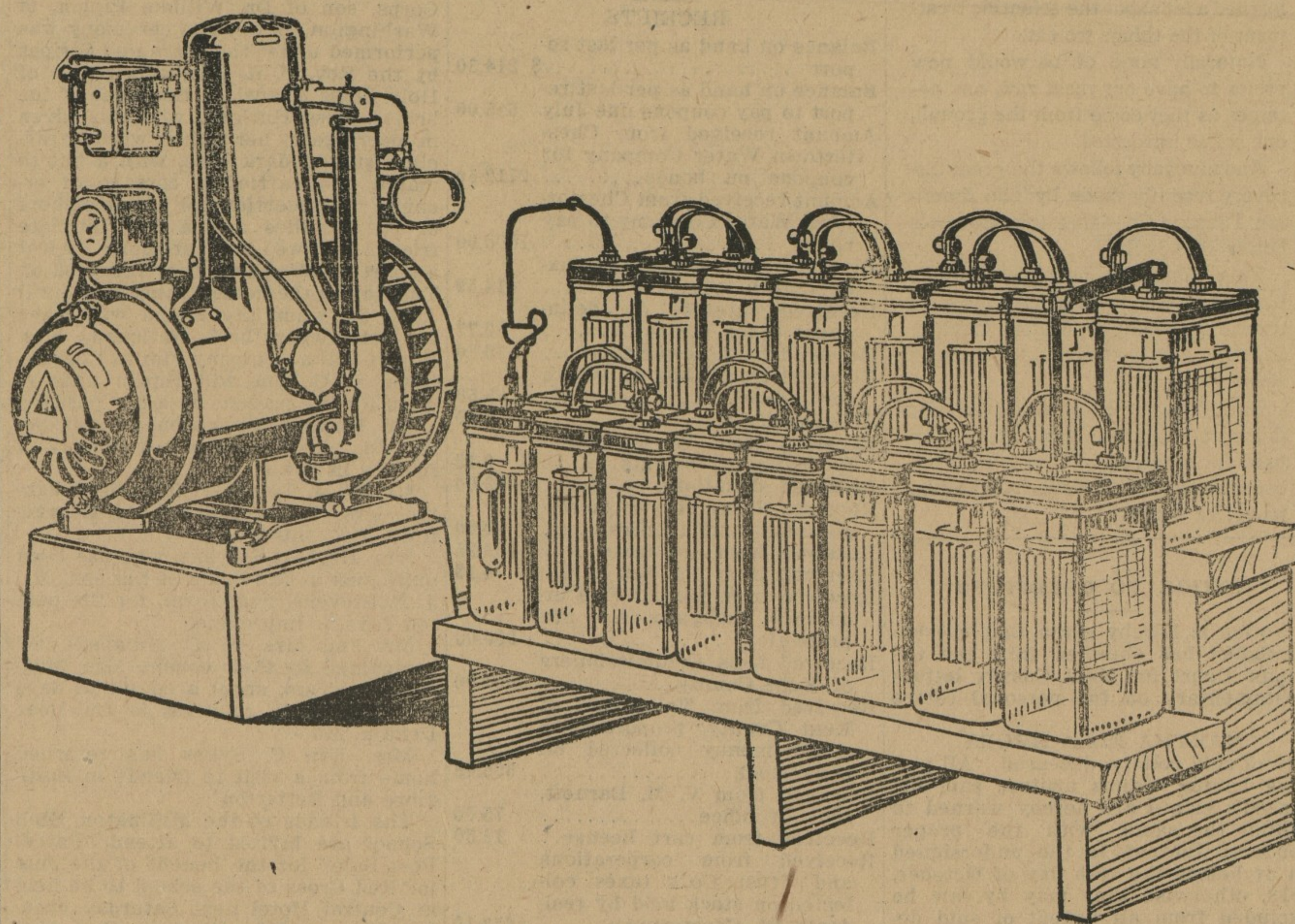

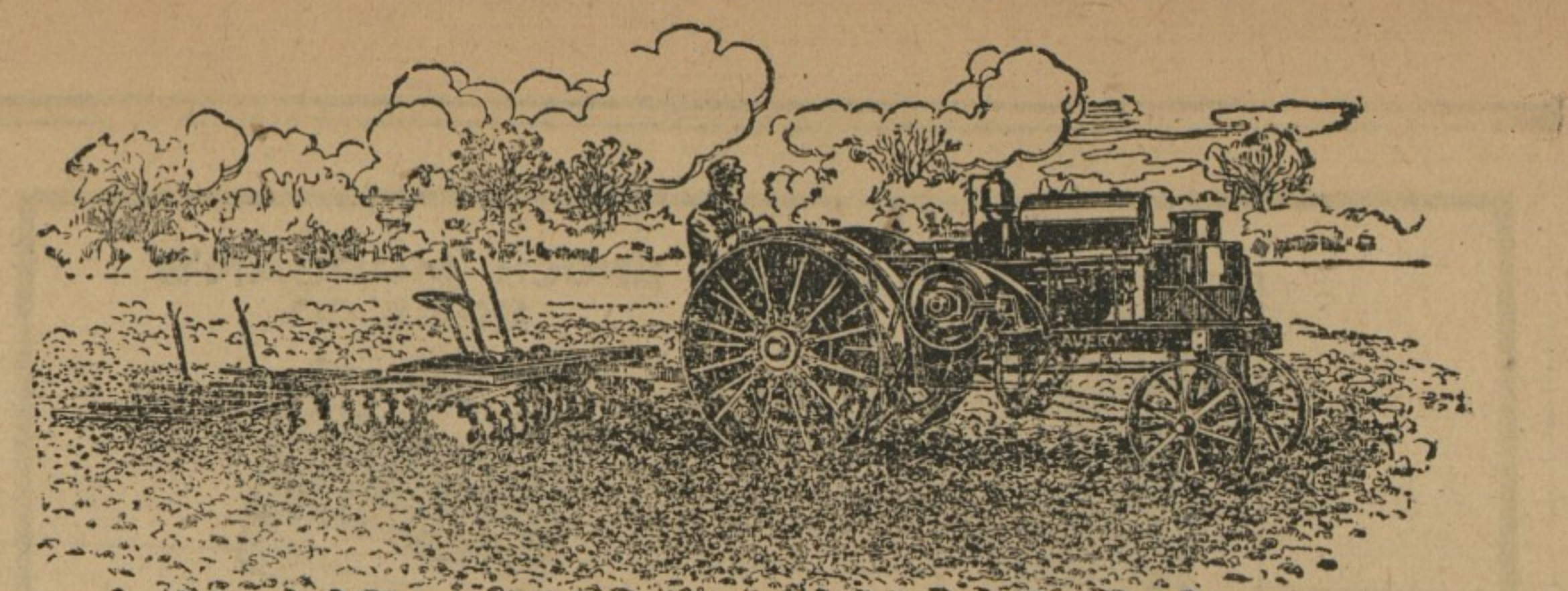

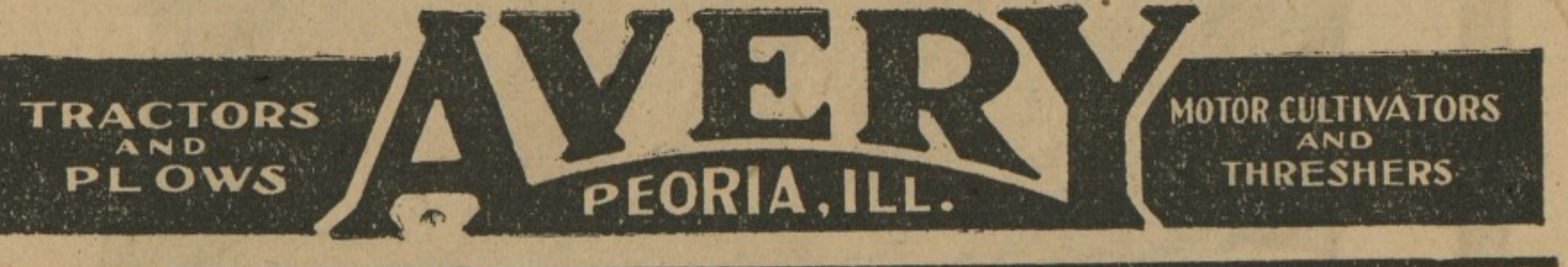
