THIRD LIBERTY LOAN DRIVE

The Third Liberty Loan campaign closes at 6 o'clock today and the people of Kent County can feel that they have done their duty in the splendid results achieved. No one who has been in close touch with the people of this county and with the progress of the campaign here has ever doubted but what Kent would, as usual, do her part, and the figures in another column prove their faith in the good people of this county. The various committees of both men and women and Boy Scouts have all worked hand in hand to accomplish these results and all can now feel that their efforts have been well rewarded. Now that the Third Liberty Loan is over there is another duty for our good people to perform in putting over the top the Thrift Stamp drive. Let each one do his or her part and there will be no shortage when the wind up comes. Already there has been much good done in the Thrift Stamp campaign, but there is much to be done yet. We have confidence in our people and know they will measure up to this occasion as they have always done in the past. It is Thrift Stamps now until the required amount is sold.

Game Warden Appointed

At a recent meeting of the Conservation Commission Mr. E. Lee LeCompt, of Cambridge, was appointed State Game Warden for a term of two years. Under the new game law, Mr. LeCompt will have the appointment with approval of the Commission, of 8 paid deputy game wardens for the following districts:

- 1st—Garrett, Allegany and Washington.
2nd—Frederick, Carroll and Howard.
3rd—Montgomery, Prince George's and Anne Arundel, below Severn.
4th—Charles, St. Mary's and Calvert.
5th—Baltimore City, Baltimore, Harford and Anne Arundel, above the Severn.
6th—Cecil, Kent and Queen Anne's.
7th—Talbot, Caroline and Dorchester.
8th—Wicomico, Worcester and Somerset.

Each deputy game warden will receive a salary of \$75 per month. The law goes into effect June 1, after which date no one can hunt without taking out a license, which license must be secured through the county clerks. The license fee for residents is \$1.00, for state-wide residents \$5.00 and for non-residents \$10.00.

Save the Children Campaign.

If the warm spring breezes will blow, Kent County Campaign for Kiddies and Kitchens, will be a success. We will have warm addresses, red-hot music and general get-togethers on Monday night in Chestertown. The big parade promises to be a feature. Several of the towns will have representative floats, Kennedyville's will be "Korn is King." The Kanning Clubs will line up; "Swat the Fly" will be out, and several Baby Specials will be run. The parade forms at the college, and all are requested to be in line on concrete road at 7.15, and will march down Washington avenue to Main, to Water, to Maple, to Queen and on up Main, then back to Lyceum.

The speakers, the music and the moving pictures will make this one of the biggest things in town this year. We will talk to benefit the health of Kent county and "there is no wealth like health!" We will try to arrange to draft some of the undertakers for work on the farms in Kent this year, by keeping alive at least one-third more of our babies; and as war has called away so many of our doctors, we will try by right living to keep the ones left here. The speakers will be Messrs. V. H. Maltbe, A. C. Nelson and Arthur Boehm, from Baltimore.

The Health Conferences and War Food Demonstrations will be held as follows: Rock Hall School House, Tuesday, May 7, 1 p. m.; Kennedyville School House, Wednesday, May 8, 1 p. m.; Chestertown, The Inn, Thursday, May 9, 9.30 a. m.; Galena, Friday, May 10, 1 p. m.

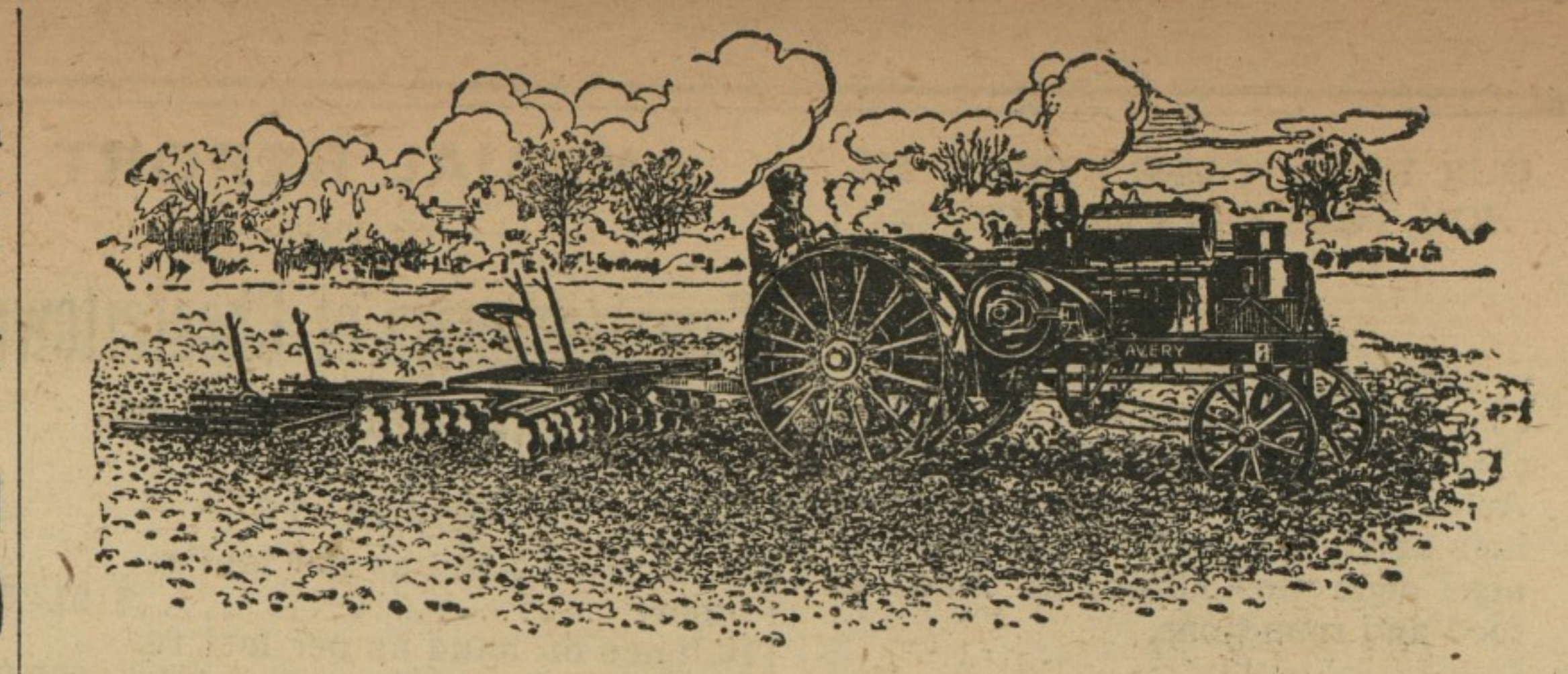

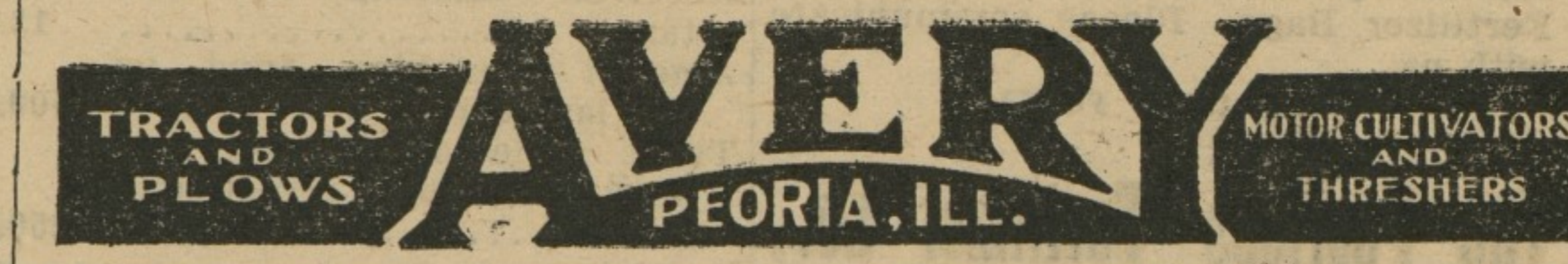
