SECOND RED CROSS DRIVE FOR A HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS

Date Set is May 20 To May 27—Kent's
Quota is \$4000

This money is to be used for war relief and every American citizen should contribute without hesitation. Our boys in the Army and Navy must be cared for and supplied with everything needed in this terrible conflict, which threatens our country and our Allies.

Every contributor will understand that he or she is giving directly to his or her Red Cross and that every cent given will be applied to the care of our sick and wounded soldiers and to hearthen and strengthen our Allies.

Help win the war and stand by our boys going to the front every day. Contributions to the Second War Fund does not carry with it membership in the Red Cross and workers are cautioned particularly on this point. All gifts are voluntary.

Provision is made by the War Council to allow the Chapters a portion of their War Fund collections, not to exceed 25 per cent. in order to assist the Chapters in meeting local needs along War Relief lines.
