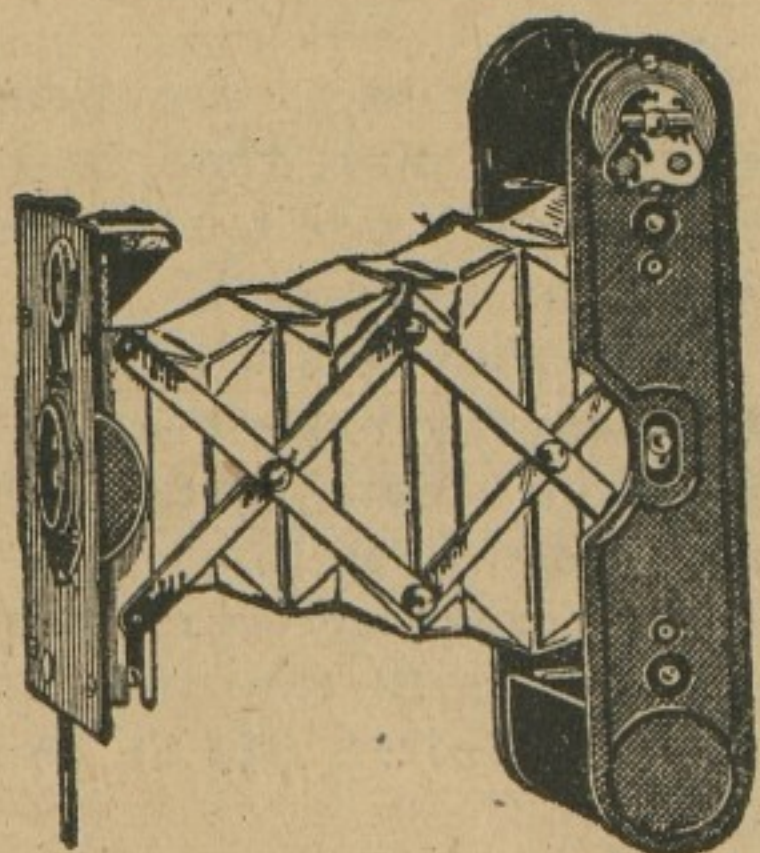

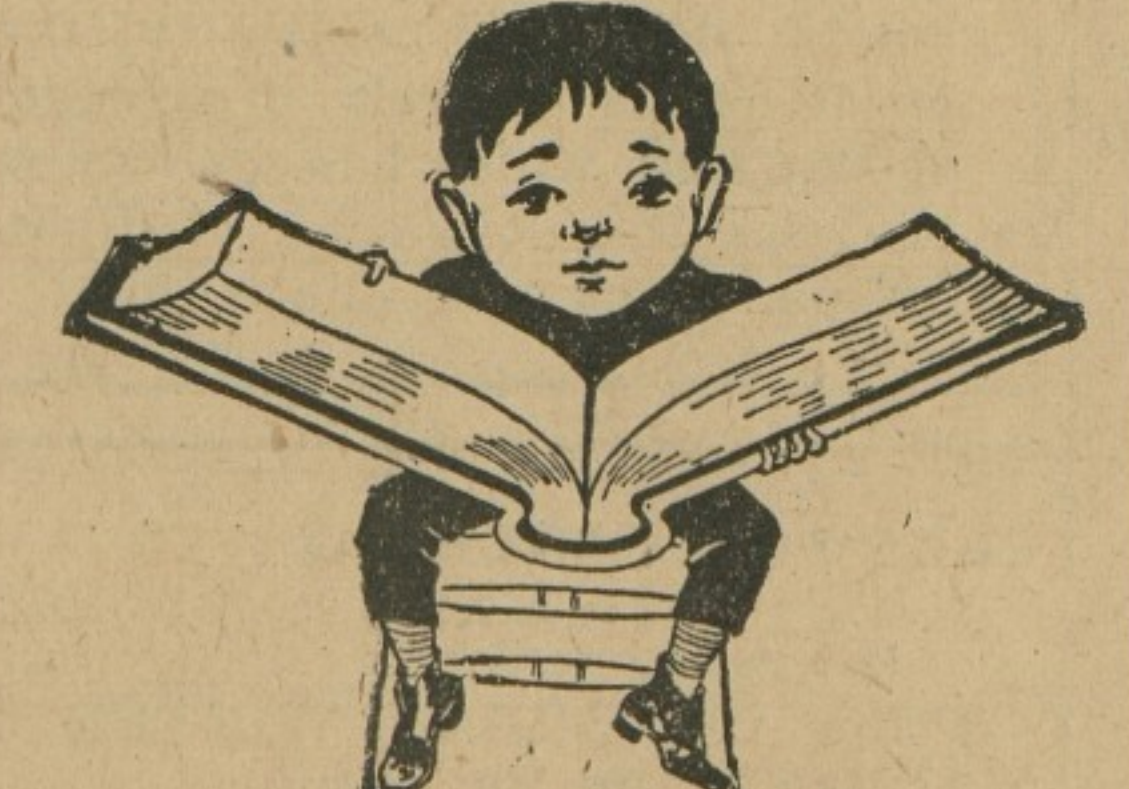

apply to each dealer in Kent County.
