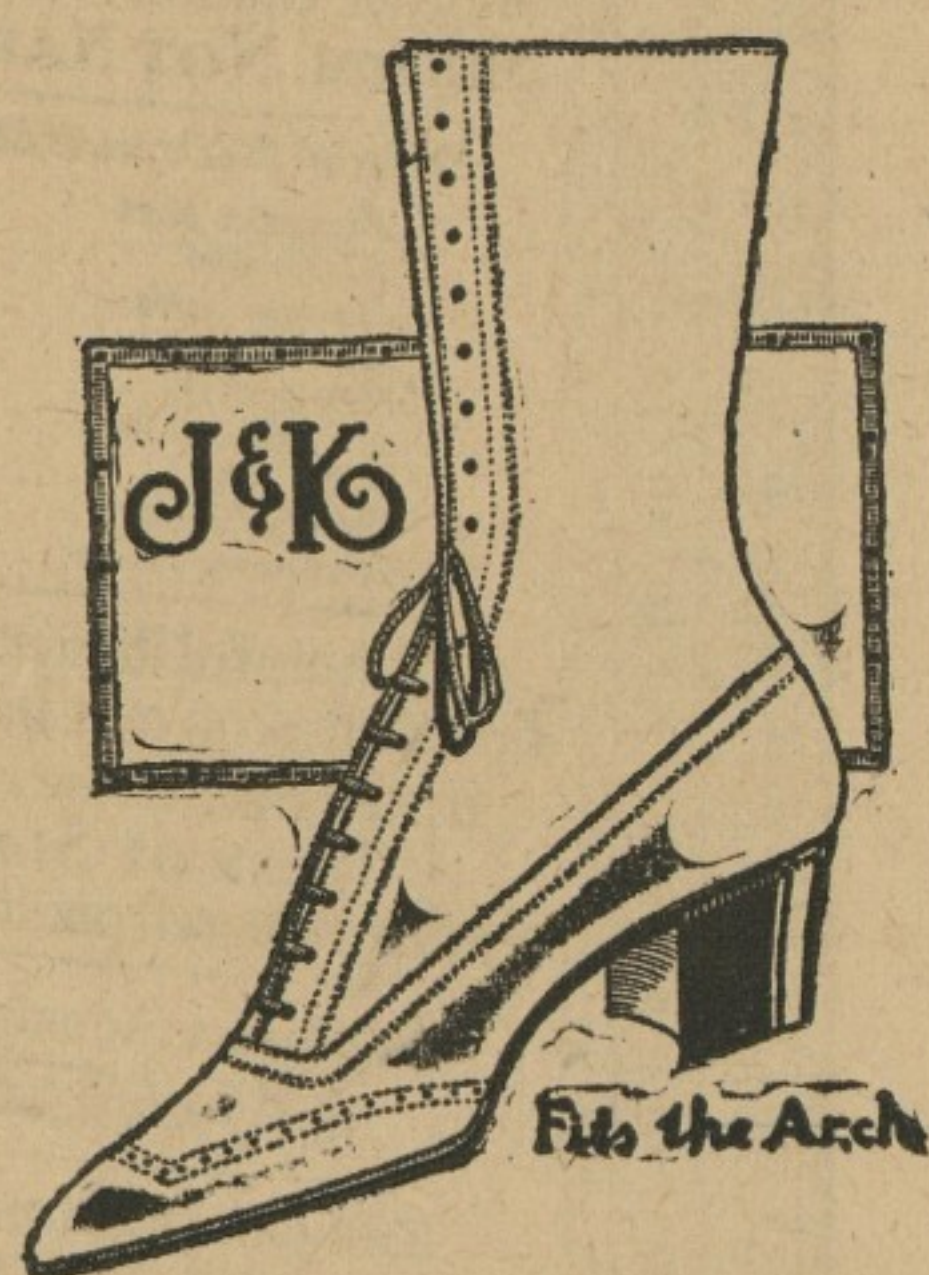

Red Cross Notes

Kent county reports \$4200 on Thursday morning for the Second War Fund Drive for \$100,000,000 for American Red Cross.

A county-wide meeting was held in the M. P. Church in Chestertown May 19 in the interest of this great War Fund.

Col. Spangler, of Pennsylvania, and Mr. Marsh, of Seattle, made most interesting addresses on the Red Cross.

The Choral Club furnished the music. Meetings have been held at Massey, Rock Hall, Millington, Quaker Neck, Wharf, Galena, Still Pond, Fairlie, Kennedyville, Worton, Lynch and Betterton.

The corps of local speakers have been most eloquent in their appeals for this fund.

Judge J. A. Pearce made a fine address at Millington. Dr. Barrett and Judge Pearce made splendid talks at Still Pond. Prof. Maphis, of Virginia University, and Corp. Bobby, of Canada, were at Galena Wednesday night.

Prof. Maphis made a masterful talk on the Red Cross and Corp. Bobby, who had volunteered a year and a half ago and had been wounded while in the front line trenches, took his audience with him in his story of the war down into the trenches until one almost felt the horrors of war and what our soldiers have to endure.

On Friday at Betterton a pageant was held at 2.30 p. m. Supper served at Hotel Betterton. In the evening a dance was held and a French officer spoke all for the benefit of the War Fund.

Saturday night at Rock Hall a dance will be given for the benefit of this fund. There will be speaking by two Canadian soldiers, who were wounded, and will tell of their experiences over there.

Next week's papers will give a full account of the money raised in this county for this fund.

Spring Drive For College Men

The U. S. Marine Corps will make a "spring drive" for college men. A number of university and college graduates now in the Corps are being sent both to their old schools and nearby recruiting stations to thoroughly explain to members of the graduating and other classes the many advantages of the Marine Corps.

A special feature of the work will be to enroll a few men for the aviation branch of the Corps. They will search particularly among successful athletes for applicants for this branch. After their application has been successfully passed, the men will be sent to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and enrolled as gunnery sergeants. Then they will go to the flying school and, if successful, will be commissioned second lieutenants.

Many of the collegians who do not desire to enter the aviation are planning to enter the Marine Corps and work their way into the Marine Officers' Training Schools, which are held every three months for enlisted men only.

Eddie Mahan, Harvard football star; Harry Legore, Yale crack; Johnny Overton, crack Yale runner; Johnny Beckett, Oregon University football star; "Pup" Phillips, Georgia Tech's sensational football star, and Pete Garlow, Carlisle Indian star, are a few of the noted college athletes now wearing the uniform of the Marine Corps.

Mrs. J. W. Ivens has gone to Wilmington for an extended stay. She took Dorothy with her. We will miss them both.

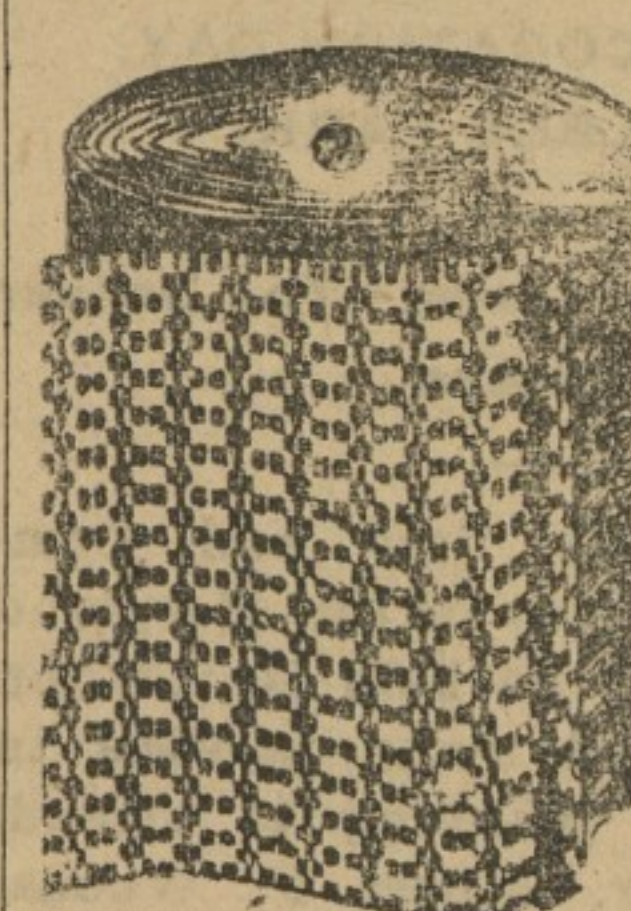
