As has been stated many times before, but which will bear repeating many times again, the allotment for Kent County for War Savings Stamps is \$339,140.

President Wilson has issued the following proclamation: I earnestly appeal to every man, woman and child to pledge themselves ON OR BEFORE THE 28th OF JUNE, to save constantly and to buy as regularly as possible the securities of the Government; and to do this as far as possible through membership in War Savings Societies.

DIOCESE OF EASTON HOLDS ITS 50th ANNUAL CONVENTION

Convention, Which Met in Easton, Took Strong Stand on Law Marriage Laws of Maryland—Recommends Combination of Parishes

The fiftieth annual convention of the Diocese of Easton was held last week in Christ Church, Easton, there being an unusually large attendance of both clerical and lay delegates.

The convention took a strong stand on the law marriage laws of the State, especially the disgraceful conditions in Cecil county, and appointed a committee of one layman in each county to bring the matter before the next legislature.

Resolutions of hearty support to President Wilson in his conduct of the war were unanimously passed and ordered sent to the President.
