THE Food Administration has issued an order by which only three pounds of sugar can be consumed by any one individual in one month. Every purchaser of sugar for domestic use, except for canning or preserving, is required to sign a pledge card that they will not purchase over the three pounds a month. The order goes into effect July 1.

THE killing of young James E. Caldwell in action on the battle front in France on the 7th of June brings home to our citizens what eventually happen to more of our Kent Co. boys who are doing our fighting in France. To the parents of this young hero we extend sympathy and hope they may find consolation in the fact that their boy died in defense of his country.
