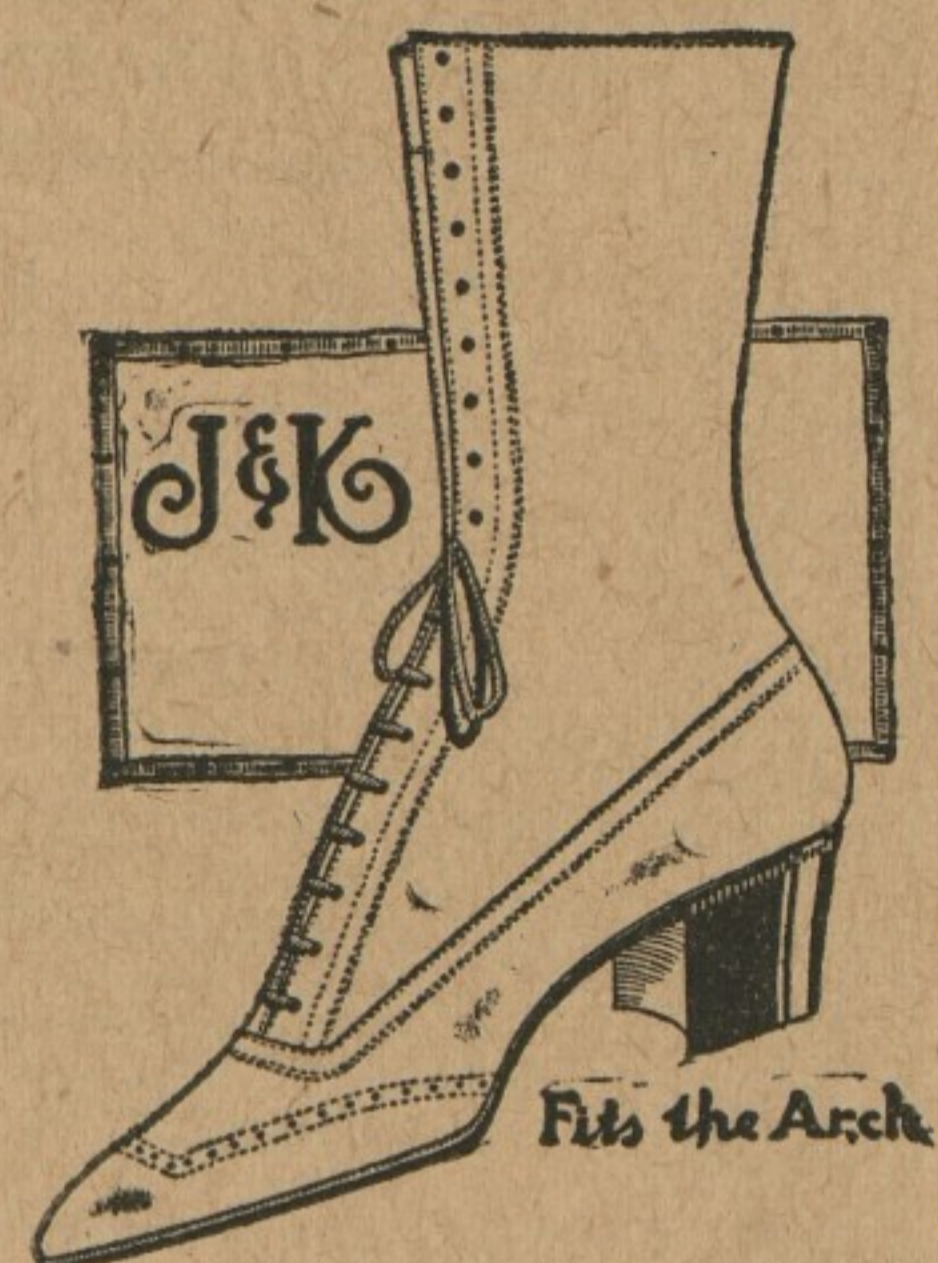

### ARE YOU AT WORK ?

F. D. Cahn, Federal Director of the U. S. Boys' Working Reserve, in a letter to the County Director, J. S. William Jones, writes as follows: "It is essential that the farmer learn the very important role that the Reserve is destined to play in the solution of the labor problem which now menaces the productivity of the farm and the prosperity of the farmers. Special effort should be made to overcome the prejudice that exists against what he terms city boys. As a matter of fact these boys are young men of the type and age that foreign armies are drafting into service in the actual field of conflict. Many of them could be successfully employed in industrial pursuits, and it has only been through a patriotic appeal that we have managed to enroll them into what now appears more essential, certainly at this season of the year--the production of food."

The County Director of the Boys' Working Reserve, after going over the labor situation with the County Agent, L. L. Burrell, has named in each Election District a District Director, as follows: 1st District, E. Thomas Massey; 2nd District, Edgar R. Pennington; 3rd District, Carson W. Harris; 4th District, P. A. M. Brooks; 5th District, S. E. Burgess; 6th District, William G. Smyth; 7th District, A. H. Covey.

Farmers who desire to avail themselves of the Reserve should lose no time in getting in touch with the County Director, who upon request, will furnish a blank to be filled in by an applicant for farm labor.

At a meeting of the agricultural interests of the State it was agreed that boys having no agricultural experience should receive a minimum wage \$3.75 per week for the first two weeks, including board and lodging, and thereafter should be paid at the rate of \$30.00 per month, including board and lodging.

Boys, who are enrolled, must serve for a period of not less than six weeks, and farmers are required to engage them for that length of time. The farmer is expected to pay the transportation of the boy to and from his home, reimbursing him for the transportation to the farm at the time of paying the first month's wages.

Every young man of Kent county, 18 to 21 years of age, who is not already engaged in some useful, or necessary occupation, should become immediately a member of the U. S. Boys' Working Reserve and help his country to its part in supplying the world-wide shortage of food.
