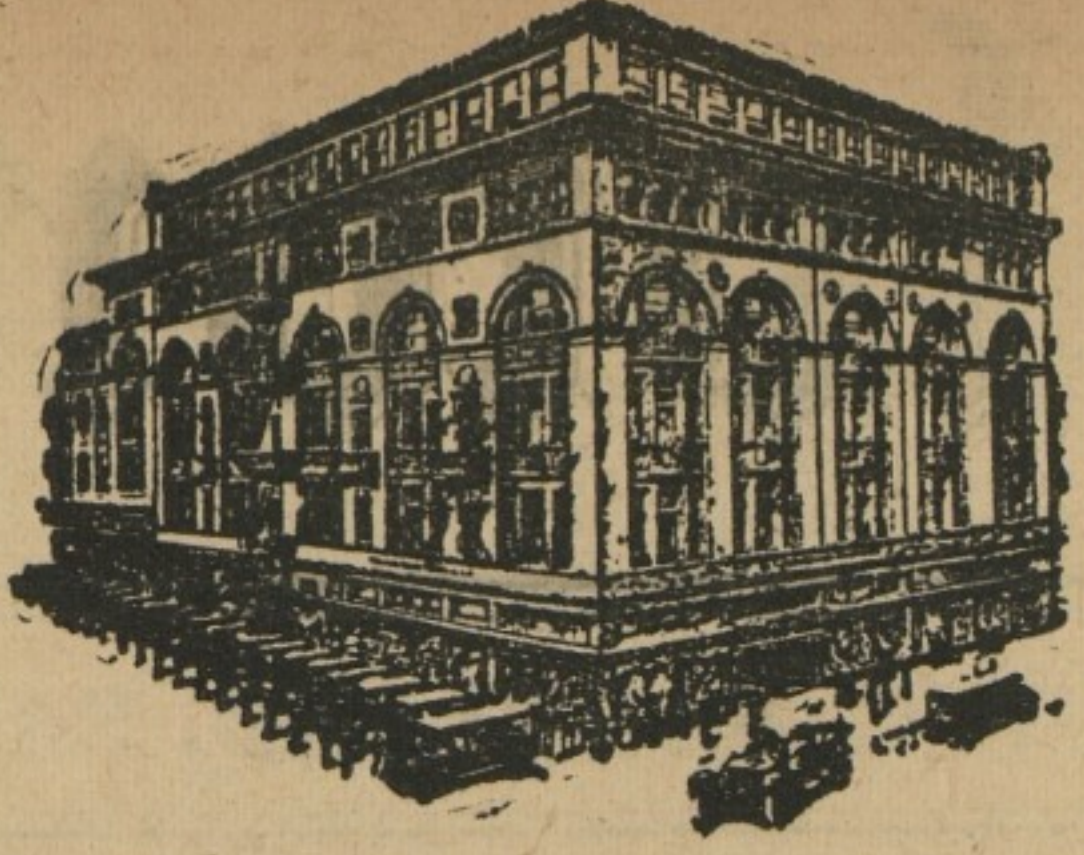

A WORD TO THE TAXPAYING PUBLIC

Above you will see a detailed statement of our last year's levy and how the money was spent on it. We show the certificate levy of \$54,804.20; the cash levy of \$102,451.45, making a total amount of \$156,255.65 as provided for in the levy of 1917.

If you will examine this year's levy you will see we have reduced the certificate levy to \$34,373.38 and have raised the cash levy to \$124,257.33, making a total amount of \$158,630.71.

You will note we have provided a small contingent fund of \$3,000 to help tide us over until the taxes begin to come in. But this will be of no assistance until the striking of the next levy; then it will be of a very material assistance and help. It will have to be increased as the cash levy is increased from year to year.

But with the co-operation of the taxpayers this county should be on a cash basis in five years or sooner and save the interest it is now paying on certificates, which would simplify the published statements so any school boy could understand them.
