A SUCCESSFUL MEETING

The W. C. T. U. of Kent County met in annual convention, June 27th, at the M. E. Church, Chestertown. The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Emma Shafer, the county president. The devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. Haslup, the State president. The report of the corresponding secretary, Miss Ida C. Crew, was most encouraging. All unions reported. War relief work through the departments of soldiers and sailors, and efficient legislative work. The L. T. L. of the county are reported to be in a flourishing condition. The Jefferson L. Smith, L. T. L. having a membership of 90. The W. C. T. U. of Kent County have purchased a \$100 Liberty Bond. The principles of temperance are promulgated on all occasions. Most of the unions have contributed to the Willard and L. M. Stevens Fund. The treasurer reported a balance of \$37.05 in check account and \$765.10 in savings account.

The report of our loved county president, Mrs. Shafer, was most encouraging and touching. She spoke in loving memory of our honored members who have passed to the "great beyond" since our last convention, viz: Mrs. Avis Vannort, Mr. Jefferson L. Smith, Mr. E. W. Crew, Mr. James Weer, Mrs. Amanda Fogwell, Mrs. Mary Anthony. Our president paid glowing tribute to our editors who have always so willingly given publicity to all W. C. T. U. work. The noon-tide hour of prayer was conducted by Mrs. Virgie Skirven.

The following officers re-elected: Mrs. Shafer, county president; Miss Ida Crew, county corresponding secretary; Mrs. Wm. G. Smyth, county recording secretary; Mrs. Aca Crew, county treasurer. The afternoon session was promptly called to order at 2 p. m. Mrs. Tilghman Hudson, of Fairlee Union, conducted the devotional exercises.

The importance of National Prohibition during the war was strongly emphasized by our State President, Mrs. Haslup, and all men are urged to write the president to that effect. The importance of subscribing to the State and National Temperance papers was strongly urged upon every one.

The reports of Superintendents of Flower Mission, Legislation and Enforcement of Law, Mercy, Health and Heredity, L. T. L. Social and Parlor Meeting were most encouraging. The discussion "The Year's High Lights in State and National Progress" was opened by Mrs. Haslup, followed by Rev. J. L. Ward and Rev. T. F. Beauchamp.

Miss Norton gave a most interesting talk on her experience as County Nurse. The resolution committee composed of Mrs. Fred. G. Usilton and Mrs. Norman Jefferson presented eight resolutions which were strong, forcible and to the point. They related: 1st, to Bone Dry Law; 2nd, Woman Suffrage; 3rd, Anti Narcotics; 4th, Wage Equality; 5th, Salvation of flag; 6th, thanks to Representatives and Legislatures for their votes; 7th, Sabbath Observance; 8th, Vote of thanks to minister, church, press and every one helping with convention.

The L. T. L. demonstration conducted by Mrs. Claude Parks was very impressive. Children from Rock Hall, Worton and Kennedyville took part in the demonstration. The talk by Miss Carrie Green, State Secretary of L. T. L. work was greatly enjoyed.

The evening session was opened by prayer by Rev. T. F. Beauchamp, followed by music and an able address by Mrs. Addie B. Parsels, Vice-President of Pa. W. C. T. U.

COUNTY TREASURER'S TAX NOTICE!

IN PURSUANCE OF AN ACT of Assembly passed at the January Session, 1894, Chapter 283, the undersigned Treasurer of Kent County hereby gives notice that the County Commissioners of said county have levied a tax of \$1.25 on the Hundred Dollars, on the taxable property of said county.
