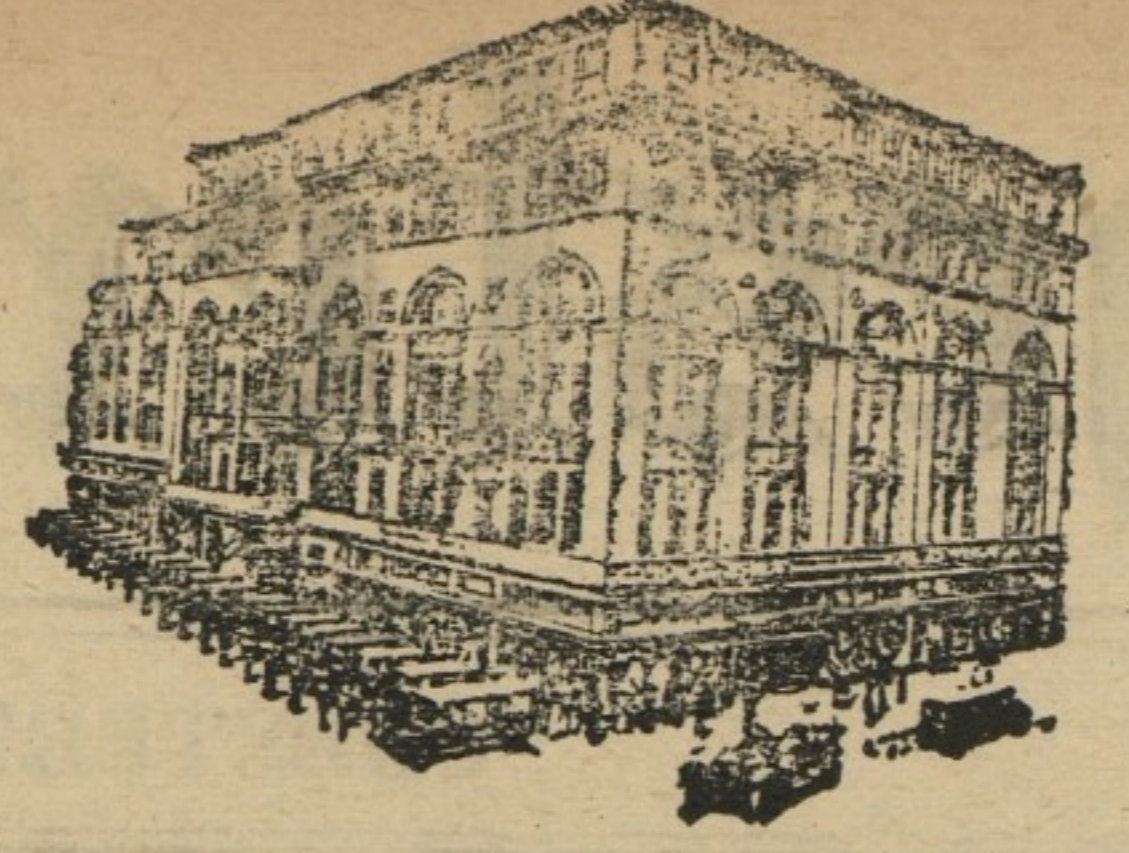

A WORD TO THE TAXPAYING PUBLIC

Above you will see a detailed statement of our last year's levy and how the money was spent on it. We show the certificate levy of \$54,804.20; the cash levy of \$102,451.45, making a total amount of \$156,255.65 as provided for in the levy of 1917.

If you will examine this year's levy you will see we have reduced the certificate levy to \$34,873.38 and have raised the cash levy to \$124,257.33, making a total amount of \$158,630.71. We increase this cash levy that we may decrease the certificate levy from year to year and thereby get the county on a cash basis.

You will note we have provided a small contingent fund of \$3,000 to help tide us over until the taxes begin to come in. But this will be of no assistance until the striking of the next levy; then it will be of a very material assistance and help. It will have to be increased as the cash levy is increased from year to year. We agree it takes more money to do everything and in consequence we had to come across with about \$13,000 extra to the schools, and if you will examine the cash levy above of last year and compare it with the cash levy of this year below, you will see the difference.

But with the co-operation of the taxpayers this county should be on a cash basis in five years or sooner and save the interest it is now paying on certificates, which would simplify the published statements so any school boy could understand them.
