THE reported death of Lieutenant Quentin Roosevelt, an American aviator and youngest son of Ex-President Theodore Roosevelt, has been received with many regrets by the American people. He lost his life in the defense of his country.

THE Allied armies this week have dealt the German army a crushing blow on the Western front in which the American soldiers pushed back the Germans five to six miles on a 25-mile front, capturing many cities and taking much valuable equipment and many prisoners. The results of the past few days fighting has given renewed encouragement to the Allied army. The casualty list has not yet appeared, but it will bring heart aches and sadness to many homes. The German losses are reported as being very heavy.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

And Vote Upon Bonding of the Town of Millington for Erecting a Stand Pipe or the Purchase of Fire Fighting Equipment.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at Comegys Hall, in the town of Millington, on

SATURDAY, AUG. 3, 1918,

between the hours of 2 p. m. and 5 p. m. for the purpose of voting for or against the issuing of bonds for the erection of a stand pipe or the purchase of fire fighting equipment, as provided under the provisions of Chapter 367 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at its January Session of 1918, the provisions of which act are as follows:

CHAPTER NO. 367. A BILL ENTITLED

AN ACT to authorize and empower the Commissioners of Millington, Kent County, Maryland, to borrow money on the credit of said Town for the purpose of erecting a stand pipe for better protection against fires or the purchase of fire fighting equipment and to issue bonds for the payment of the same and to levy on the assessable property of said town to redeem said bonds and pay the interest on the same.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That for the purpose of purchasing and erecting a stand pipe by the Commissioners of Millington or for the purchase of such fire-fighting apparatus as the Commissioners of Millington in their discretion may deem advisable, the better to afford protection against fires in the Town of Millington, the Commissioners of Millington, Kent County, Maryland, be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to borrow money on the credit of the Town of Millington to an amount not to exceed twelve thousand (\$12,000.00) dollars, and to issue coupon bonds of said Town in payment of said sum and the interest to accrue; provided, however, that the question of the issuing of the said bonds shall be submitted to the voters of said Town, qualified to vote for the Commissioners of Millington at the election to be held in said Town as hereinafter provided. The said bonds shall be issued in the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars each, shall have coupons attached for the interest thereon, payable semi-annually at a rate not exceeding six per cent. per annum, the bonds shall be signed by the Commissioners of Millington with the corporate seal of said Commissioners affixed and shall be registered by the Clerk of said Commissioners in a book to be kept for that purpose. The coupons attached to said bonds shall be signed by the Clerks of the said Commissioners at such time as the Commissioners of Millington shall determine, subject to the provisions of this Act; provided that the date of issue shall not be more than six months after the date of the election held, as hereinafter provided. The bonds shall be designated as Millington Fire Bonds and numbered consecutively and shall be redeemable in the order they are numbered in sums of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars in each year beginning two years from the date said bonds are issued, and one bond shall be paid each year thereafter until all of said bonds shall be paid; but said bonds shall be redeemable, however, at the option of said Commissioners of Millington, at any time after twelve years from the date of their issue; they shall be exempt from State, County and municipal taxation and shall have printed on them a reference of the Act of the Assembly authorizing their issue. The said Commissioners of Millington are directed to advertise at least once a week for three consecutive weeks in two or more newspapers published in Kent County for the purpose of opening negotiations for said bonds and on a certain day to be named in said advertisement, they shall, in the presence of such persons as may be interested, open all bids received and award the bonds to the highest bidder, provided no bid less than par shall be accepted.

Section 2. And be it further enacted, That the Commissioners of Millington shall in each and every year levy upon the assessable property in the Town of Millington such sums of money as may be necessary to pay the interest on said bonds as said interest shall become due and payable and also to levy such sums in addition as may be required to pay or redeem said bonds as the same mature from time to time until all of said bonds shall have been paid.

Section 3. And be it further enacted, That as a preliminary and prerequisite to the exercise of the powers and authority hereby granted and conferred, the sense of the voters of the Town of Millington who are qualified to vote at any election held in the Town of Millington for Commissioners of Millington, shall be first ascertained, taken and had thereon, at an election to be held for the purpose in the Town of Millington on the 27th day of July, 1918, at some suitable place in said Town, selected by said Commissioners between the hours of 2 P. M. and 5 P. M. The Commissioners shall give at least ten days' notice of said election by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Kent County aforesaid and any Justice of the Peace selected by said Commissioners may preside thereat and if the said Justice be not present at the time of the opening of the polls for said election, the Commissioners or a majority of them, may hold the same; if anything shall prevent said election from being held on the day so designated the Commissioners shall appoint another day for holding the same and shall give notice thereof at least five days previous thereto in the manner designated, when the question shall be submitted to the said voters of Millington as to whether or not bonds shall be issued for the purchase and erection of a stand pipe or the purchase of adequate fire equipment for the protection of the Town of Millington against fires and at said election this question shall be submitted on separate ballots prepared by the Commissioners of Millington, which said ballots shall have the words "For Millington Fire Bonds" or "Against Millington Fire Bonds" thereon. And if a majority of the votes cast at said election upon said ballot shall be "For Millington Fire Bonds" then, and not before, the Commissioners of Millington shall proceed to execute the powers and duties imposed upon them by this Act. But if the majority of the votes cast at said election upon said question shall be "Against Millington Fire Bonds" then this Act shall be of no effect.

Section 4. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the first day of June, 1918.
