Mrs. James Casey, of Rock Hall, visited her daughter, Mrs. D. J. Moore, last week.

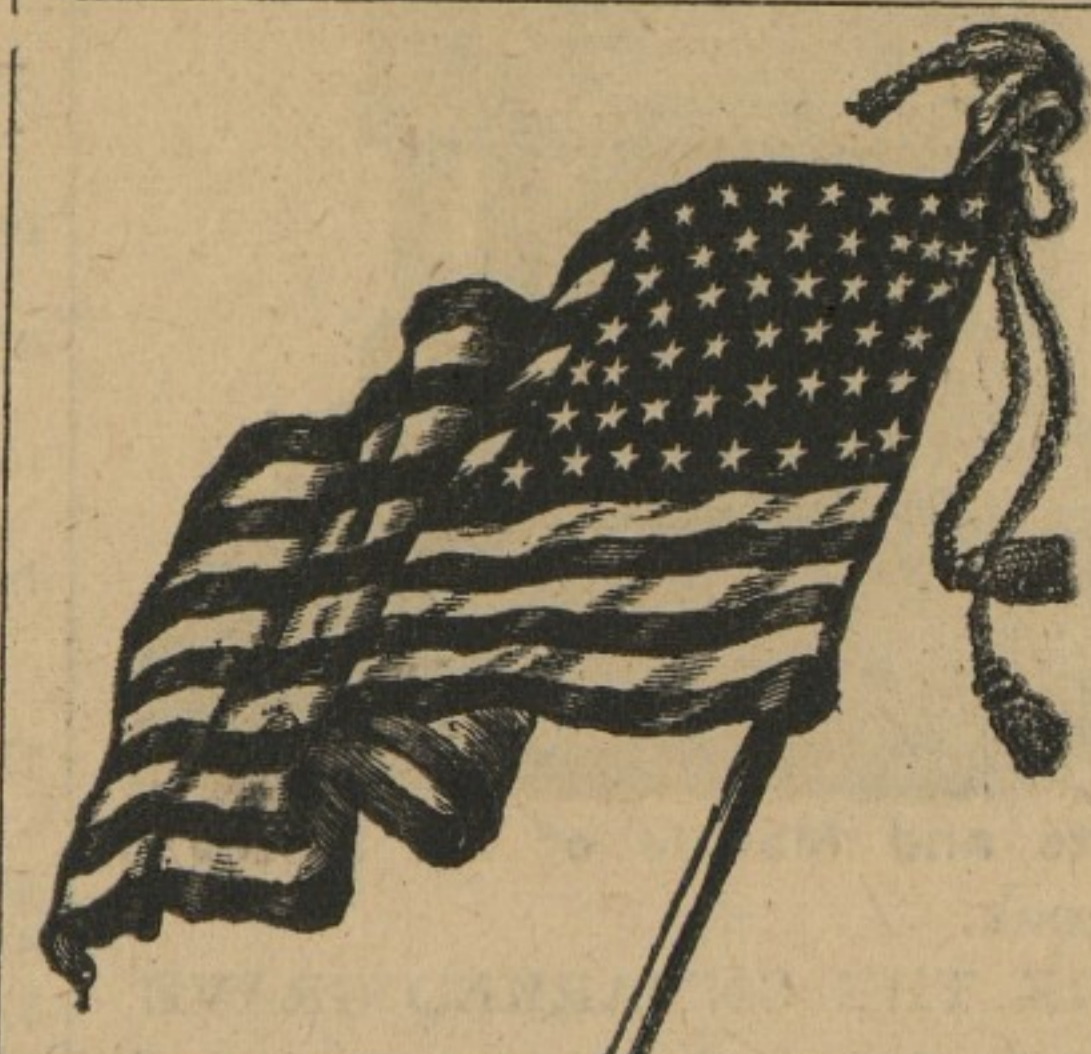
