To Establish Motor Parcels Post Route

Messrs. Opyke and Mullen, inspect-
ors from the Philadelphia Postoffice,
were in consultation with Postmaster
Bewers this week in reference to the
establishment of a motor parcels post
route from the lower part of this pen-
insula to Wilmington, Philadelphia
and other northern cities. They have
made a thorough inspection of the
peninsula and will recommend its es-
tablishment. Chestertown will be a
center for feeders from Rock Hall,
Tolchester and Betterton. By the es-
tablishment of this service farmers
and truckers will be enabled to reach
the above markets with their produce
which will be a convenience and will
prove profitable to them.

PROCLAMATION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO
THE CONSTITUTION OF THE
STATE, PROVIDING FOR AB-
SENT VOTING.

WHEREAS, AT THE JANUARY SES-
SION OF THE GENERAL AS-
SEMBLY OF MARYLAND, HELD
IN THE YEAR 1918 A BILL WAS
PASSED, TO WIT: CHAPTER 20
OF SAID ACTS, PROPOSING AN
ADDITIONAL SECTION TO ARTI-
CLE I OF THE CONSTITUTION
OF MARYLAND, TO BE KNOWN
AS SECTION 1A AND RELAT-
ING TO ABSENT VOTING, AND
WHICH SAID BILL IS IN THE
WORDS AND FIGURES FOL-
LOWING:

CHAPTER 20

An Act to propose amendment to
Article I, title, "Elective Franchise,"
of the Constitution of the State of
Maryland, by adding a new section
thereto, to be known as Section 1A,
the same relating to absent voting;
and to provide for the submission of
said amendment to the qualified voters
of this State for adoption or rejection.
Section 1. Be it enacted by the Gen-
eral Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths
of all the members of each of the two
Houses concurring, That the following
new Section be and the same is hereby
proposed as an Amendment to Arti-
cle I, title, "Elective Franchise," of
the Constitution of the State of Mary-
land, to be inserted after Section 1,
and to be known as Section 1A; the
same, if adopted by the legally qual-
ified voters of the State as herein pro-
vided, to become a part of Article I of
the Constitution of Maryland.

Section 1A. The General Assembly
of Maryland shall have power to pro-
vide by suitable enactment for voting
by qualified voters of the State of
Maryland who are absent and engaged
in the Military or Naval Service of the
United States at the time of any elec-
tion from the ward or election district
in which they are entitled to vote, and
the manner in which and the time
and place at which such absent voters
may vote, and for the canvass and re-
turn of their votes.

Section 2. And be it further enacted
by the authority aforesaid, That said
foregoing Section hereby proposed as
an amendment to the Constitution
shall at the next General Election for
Members of Congress held in this
State submitted to the legal and qual-
ified voters of the State for adoption or
rejection, in pursuance of the direc-
tions contained in Article XIV of the
Constitution of this State, and at the
said General Election the vote on the
said proposed amendment to the Con-
stitution shall be by ballot, and upon
each ballot there shall be printed the
words "For the Constitutional Amend-
ment" and "Against the Constitutional
Amendment," as now provided by law,
and immediately after said election
the returns shall be made to the Gov-
ernor of the vote for and against said
proposed amendment as directed by
said Fourteenth Article of the Consti-
tution, and further proceedings had in
accordance with said Article Fourteen.

Approved March 23, 1918.

Now, therefore, I, Emerson C. Har-
rington, Governor of the State of
Maryland, in pursuance of the direc-
tion contained in Section 1 of Article
14 of the Constitution of Maryland, do
hereby order and direct that this Pro-
clamation, containing a full, true and
correct copy of the text of said Chap-
ter 20 of the Acts of the General As-
sembly of Maryland, Session of 1918,
be published in each of the counties of
the State where so many may be pub-
lished, and where not more than one may
be published, then in that newspaper,
and in three newspapers published in
the City of Baltimore, one of which
shall be in the German language, once
a week for at least three months
next preceding the General Election to
be held in the State of Maryland on
Tuesday, November 5, 1918, at which
election the said proposed amendment
to the Constitution shall be submitted
in form and manner prescribed by the
General Assembly, to the legal and
qualified voters of the State for their
adoption or rejection.
(The Great Seal of Maryland.)

Given under my hand and the Great
Seal of the State of Maryland,
Done at the City of Annapolis this
twentieth day of July, nineteen
hundred and eighteen.

Meade and says he feels better than
he has for years.

his son over seas.

Private Walter Taylor, of Camp
Dix, N. J., spent several days at home
with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James
Taylor, near Rock Hall, recently and
had the misfortune to slip and fall
against the engine while fishing with
his father. Dr. W. W. Beall took two
stitches in one of the young man's
legs.

Mr. John G. Moore, of Betterton, has
arrived safely in France.

Hudson Maxim, the noted inventor,
says regarding the way to make peace
with Germany: "There is but one way
to peace, and that is the road to Ber-
lin. The German military ring must
be broken and so shattered that it can
never be reunited. Those who have
been responsible for the rape of Bel-
gium and France; those who have
been responsible for the heinous out-
rages upon the civilian population
overridden by Germany; those who
have been responsible for torpedoing
passenger vessels and hospital ships,
and for dropping aerial bombs on
shore hospitals; those who have been
responsible for the killing and main-
ing of women and children in London
and Paris, have placed themselves be-
yond the pale of any peace arrange-
ments. And this seems to be about
the opinion of civilization the world
over.

transferred from Camp Meade to Camp
Niagara, New York.

The whole of Kent county is again
saddened to hear the news that Mr.
Henry Elliott Taylor, the young son
of County Treasurer Harry E.
Taylor, is severely wounded as a
result of the recent battle in France.
Mr. Taylor enlisted with Uncle Sam's
forces in Wilmington, Del., about a
year ago. We all trust that his injur-
ies prove not as bad as the report
indicates. The following telegram was
received by his father Tuesday: "Mr.
Henry E. Taylor, Worton, Kent Co.,
Md. Deeply regret to inform you that
it is officially reported that Private
Henry Elliott Taylor, machine gun
battalion, was severely wounded in ac-
tion July 15. McC
