Red Cross and Defense Council Meet

On Monday of this week there was a meeting of the chairmen of the different auxiliaries of the Red Cross and of the Defense Council of the county at the beautiful new High School at Rock Hall. The morning was devoted to the business of the Red Cross and reports from the different chapters were read. Mrs. Wood, the county chairman, presided. Miss Norton, the Red Cross Nurse, urged the "fly campaign" be more vigorously pushed, also that greater interest be manifested in the weighing in the county of all children under six years.

During the intermission the ladies of the Rock Hall Chapter gave a most delightful luncheon to the visitors and the generous hospitality for which the Rock Hall people are noted was most heartily enjoyed. After the luncheon, Miss Copper, the County Demonstrator, spoke of the importance of drying fruits and vegetables, thereby conserving sugar, jars and rubbers, all of which are very scarce. She gave an interesting demonstration in drying.

The officers of the Defense Council held a meeting, after which all met in the spacious Assembly Hall. Report of the last meeting was read. Mrs. W. Hubbard, County Chairman, gave a talk explaining the work of the Council of Defense and spoke of the drive which is now on for women nurses. Reports were given by the chairman of each district and Kent's quota of ten nurses has been nearly completed.

Mrs. Wm. G. Smyth, woman chairman of the County Food Conservation Committee, explained the scarcity of sugar and urged every one to help in this work.

Mrs. Lecates, of Georgetown, chairman of the Woman in Industry, reported that many women in Kent County were taking the places of men in the industrial world. After a vote of thanks to the Rock Hall Chapter for their generous hospitality, the meeting was adjourned.

"Over the Top" with Empey is A Voice From The Trenches!

"A voice from the trenches" is the way Sergeant Empey's great story, "Over the Top," has been described by critics. As a drama, with the fighting sergeant in the very role he enacted in the trenches, it will be shown next Friday and Saturday, August 16 and 17, at the Lyceum Theatre.

The soldier-author with this play holds the mirror up to human nature as he found it in the English private soldier. His story will appeal to young and old alike, to all who love pathos and humor, great deeds and manly men.

"Prospective soldiers can learn here pretty nearly just what is awaiting them, in both incident and sensation, while their folks at home will be heartened."

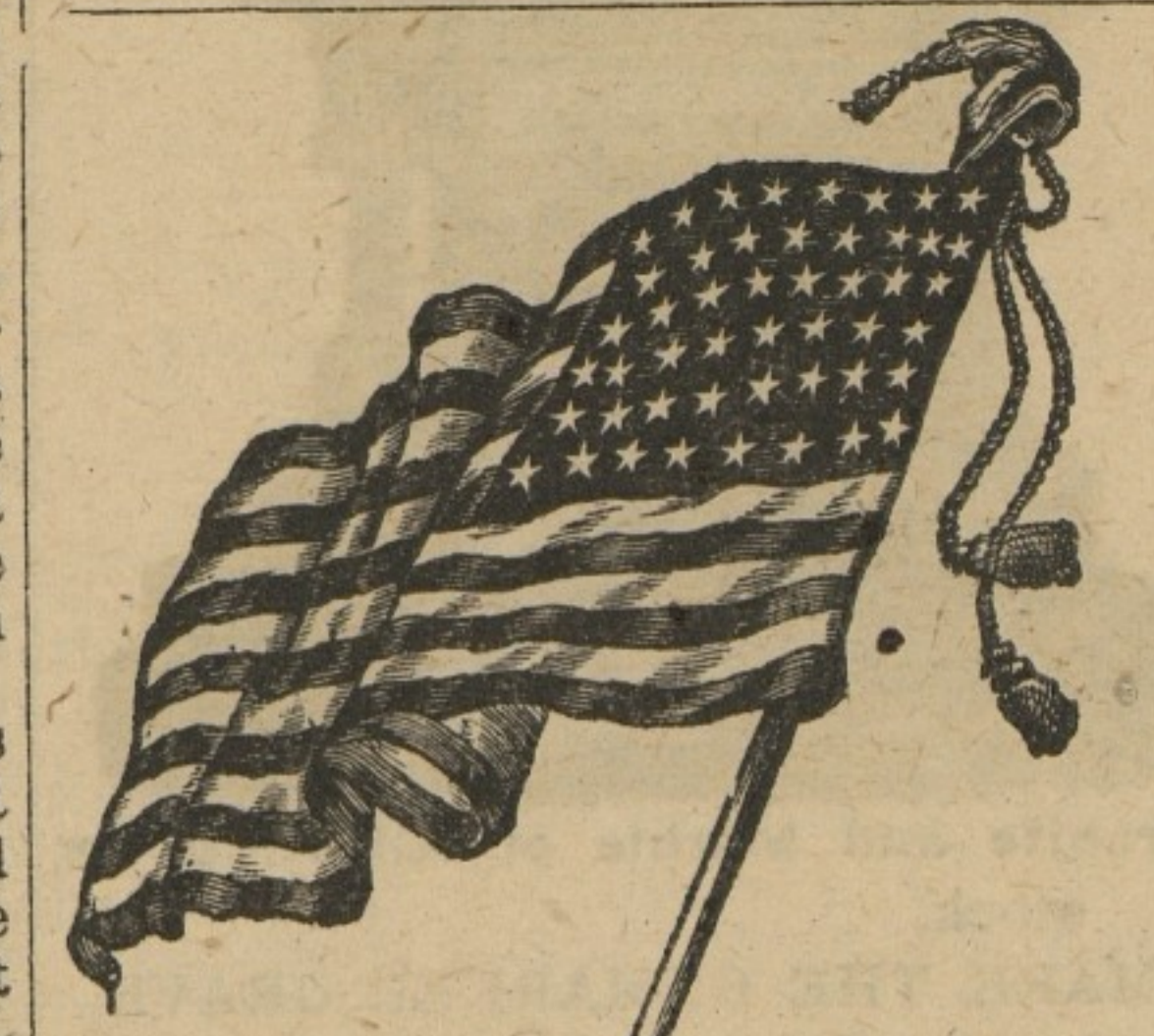
