The land and scenery are very pretty, but oh the hills, they are the same as mountains, but we go up them just the same, but there is nothing like the old United States.

On our way over I saw several objects which I never saw before, such as flying fish, blue fish, whales, porpoises, etc. That certainly was quite a large "ditch" too, as I never knew that there was so much water in the entire world. We were a little over a week coming across, not seeing anything but water the entire time.

This is a great country for grape vineyards which they make wine of. They also have some beautiful roads here, just as good as those in Kent and Queen Anne. They ought to have them because it is very rocky here and they have a plenty of same to build with.

The people dress very queer here. For instance, they wear wooden shoes, and the women work the farms, as there are very few men to be found around here.

Tell everybody that I am getting along all right.

Under the heading, "The Sacred Seven," Walt Mason, one of the most brilliant writers of the country says:

"The Germans die in every style that's been invented up to date; they lie around in rick and pile, they're home away in box and crate. They fall before the roaring guns, and planted, lack an epitaph; the white the kaiser and his sons are posing for a photograph. In herds and swarms in droves and flocks, the Germans up ward turn their toes; they perish while the landscape rocks beneath the marching of their foes. At Wilhelm's word the gray-clad ones march forth to face the deadly storms; the white the kaiser and his seven sons are putting on new uniforms. Some guns now used are wailed across the front, less leagues their missiles whoop; but no gun has so great a range that it can hit that sacred group. Though death may riot mid the Huns, and for the last survivor search, the kaiser and his stall-fed sons will be concealed behind a church. The Huns march forth, and they escape the raging blast of the gray-clad ones; the Prussian homes are hung with crape, and echo with the sounds of woe. At Potsdam, through King Death has won no victims for his well known grave; the kaiser, with each beery son, is hiding in the cyclone cave."

The following letter is from Mr. Herbert Robinson, son of Mrs. W. Irving Robinson, of Betterson, and was written to his brother:

Have arrived back to Paris after spending a most delightful furlough at Aix-les-Bains. I sent you several cards of the place and brought about fifty views back with me. I left Paris Sunday morning, Aug. 11, and spent the night at Lyon, left Lyon next morning at 7:15, arriving at Aix at 11 o'clock. On my way back I spent a day and night at Lyon and took several pictures there, so I also saw quite a lot of the city while there. I will send you some of the photos when I get them developed.

You can see by the post cards that Aix is a magnificent country and the Y. have arranged several trips up to the various peaks, in which you carry a wheel up and coast all the way back. On one of the trips you can coast about 16 miles back through a beautiful country. Then there is quite a lot of historic territory around here. Near here is where Hannibal carried his elephants over into Italy. Aix is also noted for its sulphur baths, the first being established 815 years B. C.

I ran into Norman Hiron down at Aix. He is the first person that I have seen from Kent. He is stationed at Tours, the city that I just left. It is too bad I could not be there with him.

The Sun's last Sunday contained a photograph of Mr. Rolph Townshend, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. P. Townshend, which was about fifteen miles, and we made it in about five hours with a pack on our back that weighed about forty pounds, and returned with same on Monday morning, being out in tents

Maryland's Record in The Past Three Liberty Loans

While Maryland subscribed in larger proportion to the Third Liberty Loan than any other State in the Fifth Reserve District, its record was not as good in over-subscriptions as some of the other States, but what it lacked in this respect, it more than made up in per capita subscriptions.

Maryland's apportionment of the first loan was \$30,000,000 minimum, \$35,000,000 maximum and total subscriptions amounted to \$37,013,750 or \$2,013,750 over-subscriptions.

In the second loan Maryland was apportioned \$39,000,000 minimum, \$65,000,000 maximum and subscriptions amounted to \$54,343,300 or \$10,656,700 less than the maximum.

There was no maximum apportionment for the third loan.

Maryland's share of that loan was \$38,259,900 and subscriptions totaled \$48,729,800 or \$10,470,000 more than its allotment.

Subscriptions in all the States comprising the Fifth District were larger by \$21,413,350 for the second loan than for the first due, no doubt, to the intensive educational campaign conducted especially to impress upon the wage earner the importance of practicing thrift and investing the savings in Liberty Bonds.

While total subscriptions in the Fifth District for the third loan were nearly \$14,000,000 less than for the second, they exceeded the first loan by \$75,020,650. Subscriptions for the entire Fifth District for the first Liberty Loan amounted to \$109,738,000; for the second loan \$201,151,700. Subscriptions for the third loan exceeded the apportionment by \$66,259,030.

Many subscribers to the first and second loans anticipated themselves with the belief that they had done their full duty and refrained from subscribing to the third loan.

Every effort will be made during the fourth loan campaign to impress upon recalcitrants that it is their duty to subscribe to the limit of their ability to every loan floated by the United States.

It is estimated that one out of every 5 1/2 persons in Maryland bought a bond of the third issue. In Baltimore City it is estimated that one in every 2.8 of the white population bought a bond. The total number of subscribers in the State, including Baltimore City, was 253,916 of whom 177,498 were residents of the city and 76,418 were residents of the county. Only the District of Columbia exceeded Maryland in per capita subscriptions. The per capita subscriptions for the State, outside of Baltimore City, was \$15.93, while that for the city was \$59.65, making the total for the whole State \$34.51. The District of Columbia per capita subscriptions was \$36.02; Virginia \$20.53; West Virginia \$18.94; North Carolina \$10.24; South Carolina \$12.18. The per capita subscription for the whole Fifth District was \$20.25.

Maryland also lead in the number of subscribers to the third loan. Against its total of 253,916 was the District of Columbia 435,824; Virginia 173,787; West Virginia 125,344; North Carolina 1,582; South Carolina 87,905, making a total of 858,258. The percentage of the population of the Fifth District subscribing to the loan was 9.34.
