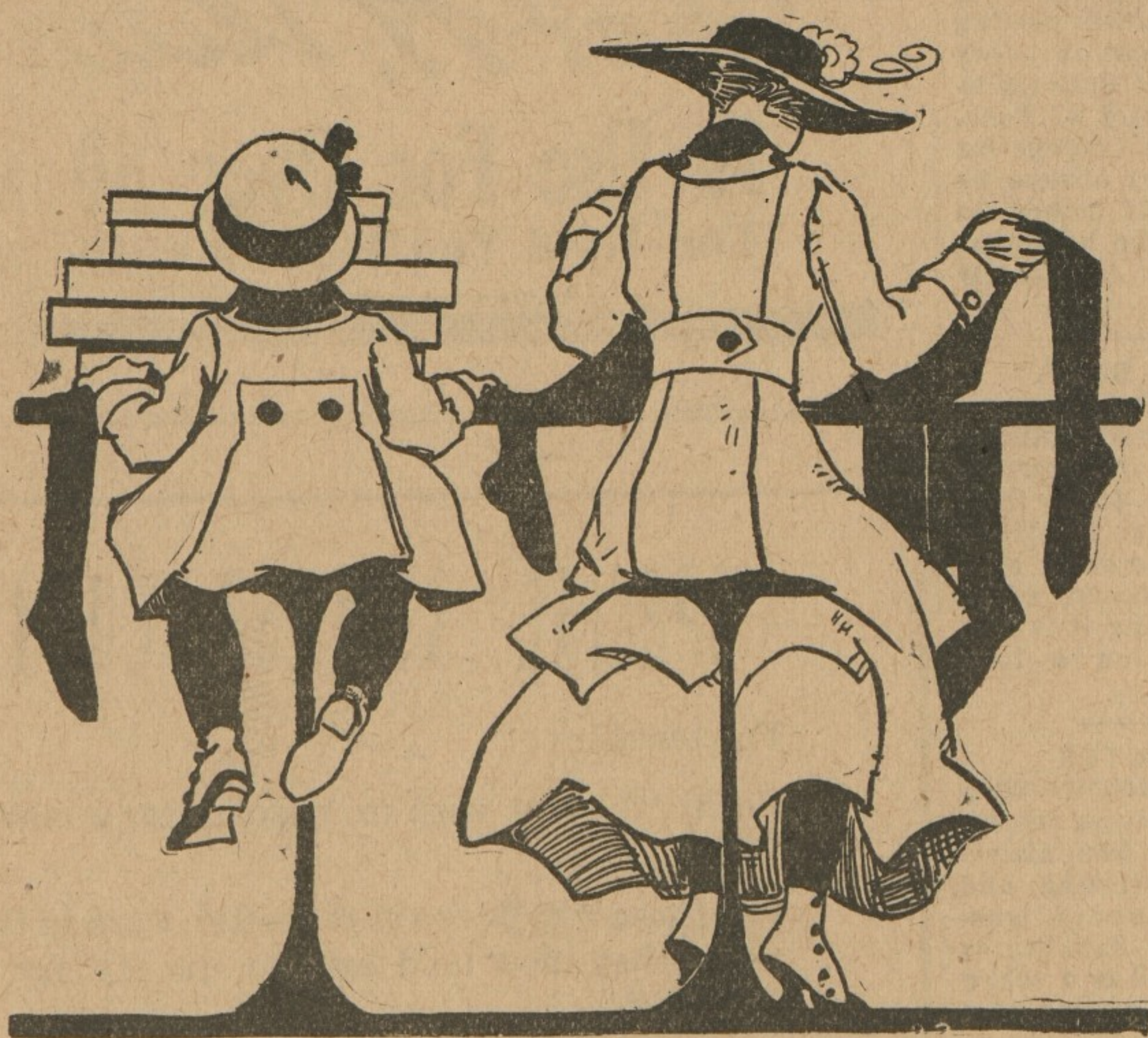

Government Needs Stenographers and Typists

To The County Chairmen: The Women's Section of the Maryland Council of Defense has been asked by the U. S. Employment Service in Washington to assist in the drive for 5,000 stenographers and typists that is to be put under way by the Employment Service. These stenographers and typists are desired for positions in Washington and elsewhere in essential industries. Some of the positions are under Civil Service and others are not.

Stenographers are expected to qualify for one of these classes:
1—College graduates, and women of wide business experience. Salaries \$1,320 and up.

2—General stenographers. Salaries \$2,000 and up.

3—Typists and stenographers of limited experience. Salaries \$1,100 and up.

The National Council of Defense is co-operating with the U. S. Employment Service in securing suitable living conditions for employees going to Washington. Prices range from \$40 to \$50 a month for room and two meals a day. The National Council of Defense, Room Registration Bureau, 1321 New York Ave., Washington, will furnish lists of available rooming and boarding houses for applicants.

The Government is now making arrangements to take care of its new employees as far as housing is concerned, and Congress has appropriated \$10,000,000 to house employees of the Government.

Early in the year, the first of a series of residence halls for women will be completed. This is being erected opposite Union Station, and will afford a home for 2000 women. It will be operated on the plan of an apartment hotel. Until the residence halls are completed, the Government is taking over private homes to relieve the congested living conditions.

Registrations for stenographers and typists from Baltimore and other parts of Maryland will be held at the Maryland Council of Defense, Women's Section, 200 West Saratoga Street, beginning Monday, September 28th, from 9 A. M. to 5 P. M. Further information will be furnished there to all applicants.
