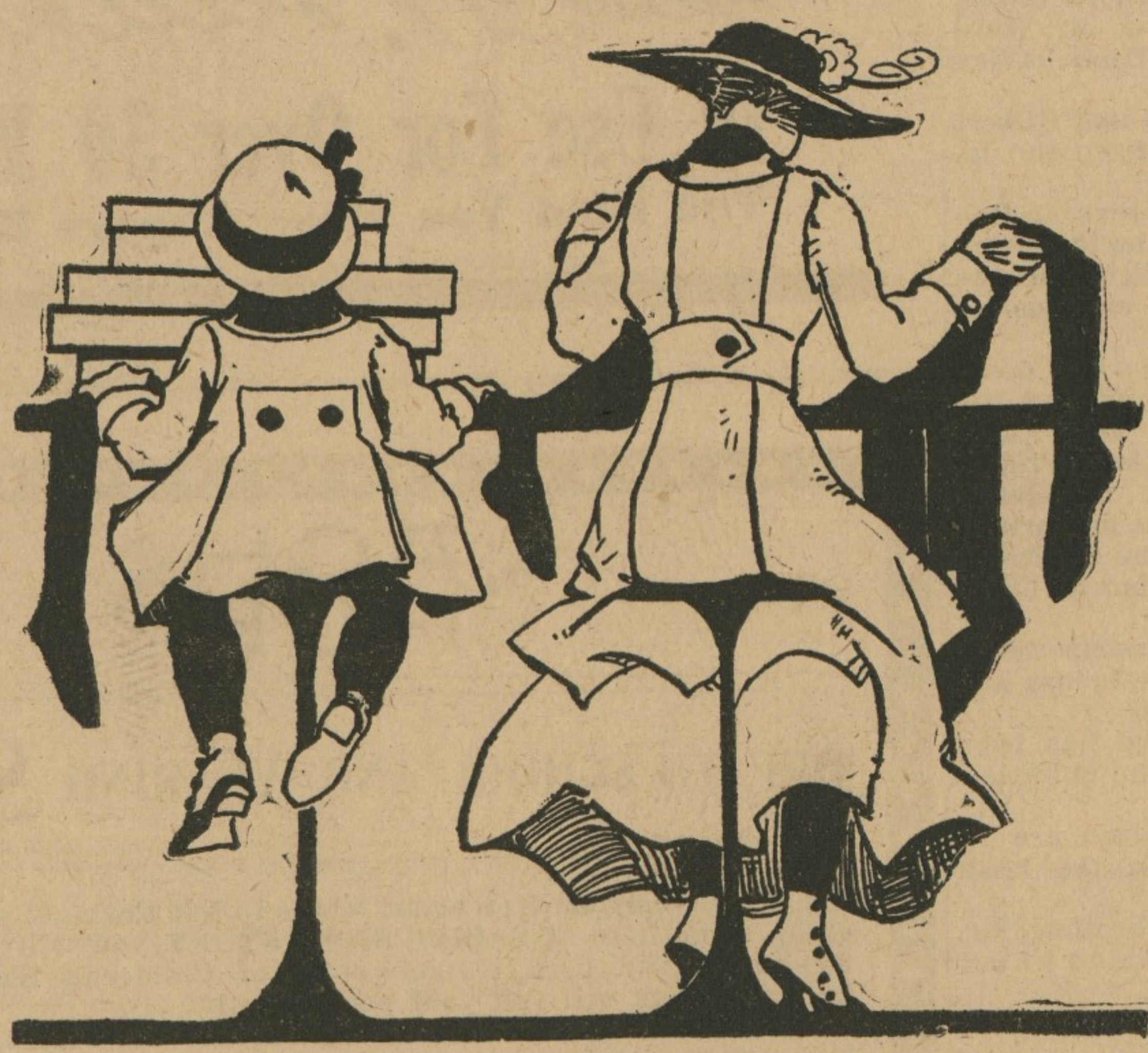

### Big Drive For War Relief Agencies

On Nov. 10 the people of Kent and the American people generally will start a one week's drive to raise the largest amount of money ever given outright by any people in the history of the world. For the first time Protestants, Catholics and Jews will line up shoulder to shoulder, welding their individual organizations together in their common devotion to the boys in the cantonments and trenches.

A conference was held in Chestertown Tuesday at the Eastern Shore Inn and plans made for Kent's part in this undertaking. Dr. E. J. Clarke is to have charge of the "Victory Boys," Miss Adele France the "Victory Girls" and Hon. James A. Pearce has been named treasurer of the county. The executive committee in full is as follows: Chairman, F. G. Usilton; Vice-Chairman, C. C. Jones; Ladies' Chairman, Mrs. W. T. Morris; Treas., Hon. J. A. Pearce; Sec., C. N. Jefferson; Victory Boys, Dr. E. J. Clarke; Victory Girls, Miss Adele France; Publicity, C. S. Smith. The above with J. T. Dixon and H. Sachs constitute the executive committee. The apportionment for the counties is based on the Liberty Loan apportionment, and the quota for Kent county is \$11,050.

### Gunning Season Near

From all districts comes the cheering intelligence that partridges are more numerous than for several seasons past in Kent. For the past two seasons there was a marked scarcity of birds. This spring was dry and very few birds perished. Then followed a summer and fall in which the birds had abundance of food and shelter.

Kent duck shooting has a state-wide reputation. Both the canvas-back and the red head are found here. Kent furnishes excellent shooting grounds in her tidewater districts and reports indicate a good season.

The ducks have already begun to arrive. Redheads, mallards and coots are coming in every day attracted by the fine feeding. Canvasbacks will arrive around the middle of November and they seldom leave until the ice drives them away.

There are plenty of rabbits in Kent and the hunters will enjoy some good sport.

Don't forget your gunning license. It only costs \$1.10 for Kent. To be without it might cost you from \$15 up.

The rabbit and bird season opens in Kent November 11.
