Don't Be Swindled
Agents in many places are canvassing from door to door with publications purporting to be issued by the government, representing that they have government sanction. They are charging as high as \$4.75 for the publication.
No such publications have been authorized by the government. The publications issued by the government are always given away or sold at cost, or in the case of certain school text books prepared by the Food Administration, sold under contract with the publisher to charge the price fixed by competition, ranging from twenty cts. to half a dollar.
Anyone who engages in a scheme such as described is guilty of false representation if no more. The cases should be reported to the Department of Justice for action.
