## NEW FOOD REGULATIONS

No More Victory Flour—To Increase Sugar Allowance From 3 to 4 Lbs.  
Victory bread, the war bread of the United States, is no more a necessity. No substitutes are required in bread. The housewife is also relieved of the restriction requiring purchases of substitutes with all purchases of flour. The two ounces of bread to a consumer in restaurants, etc., remains in effect.

The action of the Food Administration, it is announced, is due to the fact that the accumulated stocks of wheat in Australia, India and South America are now available. There is also a dearth of foodstuffs for cattle, and the substitutes are needed to feed the stock. It had originally been intended that the 80-20 rule affecting wheat products should not be lifted until January 1.

The sugar ration will be increased from three to four pounds per person beginning December 1, due to the increase in the beet sugar producing states and the cane-producing territory of Louisiana.
