PRE-HALLOWEEN WEEK HERE

Occasion Observed In Most Fitting And Appropriate Manner Here—Our Stores Vie With Each Other With Appropriate Displays —Mr. VanAmburgh At The College

Pre-Halloween Week is here. Almost every store and business place in Chestertown proclaims the fact in no uncertain tones. All along High street and the intersecting streets the spirit of the occasion is abroad in Chestertown. The stores tell the story in many and various ways, each speaking its mute language in weird and somewhat gruesome illustrations. In all the years of the past in which the occasion is observed, this is the first time in our recollection that it has taken on the significance that it has this year.

Halloween, which day occurs on next Tuesday, Oct. 31, is the one mad day in all the year. It went mad in ages long ago and has never been quite sane since. It is the one day in the calendar whose wits have always been a little muddled. It started out as a harvest festival and even today its joyous celebration is in the country. Chestertown, young and old, has caught the spirit of the occasion, and its many and uniquely-designed windows are a credit to those who decorated them.

Halloween is for the young and romantic. It is the one day in the year when, by making use of certain and mysterious charms, they can find out who their future wives or husbands are to be and so save themselves considerable suspense and worry.

Next Tuesday night Chestertown will be alive with young boys and girls who will think Halloween was made especially for them and who will dress up like ghosts and who-not in an effort to have a most joyous time—and they will, no doubt, be successful.

Halloween has its historical and religious aspects. Some attribute its origin to the ancient Druids. Others say it was inherited from the Greeks and Romans, who introduced mystic rites in celebrating the harvest. All Halloween Day is one of holy obligation in the Catholic Church and its religious observance dates back to the Fourth Century.

Have you felt the call of Halloween? If not, come to Chestertown, see the displays and you, too, will catch the spirit.

One of the features of Pre-Halloween Week in Chestertown was the speech delivered by Mr. Van Amburgh, of New York, in William Smith Hall, on Thursday night. He took as his subject, "How to Fail," and interested the large audience for about an hour. Mr. P. M. Brooks, president of the Business Men's Association, under whose auspices the speaker was here, introduced Dr. Gould, president of Washington College, who gave the speaker and the audience a cordial greeting and introduced the speaker of the evening. During the course of his speech Dr. Gould gave out some interesting figures regarding the value of Washington College to Chestertown.

Mr. Van Amburgh told his audience how to fail and how to succeed. He is a speaker of remarkable versatility. He is unique in his manner of delivery and possesses a charm that draws his hearers to a close attention to what he says. During the course of his address he made many good points and held the close attention of his hearers from start to finish.

Chestertown audiences are used to hearing good speakers; they are, in fact, connoisseurs in the art of oratory. But even considering all this, Mr. Van Amburgh brought us something new; he touched points that have been untouched; and his speech was well worth hearing. Chestertown people were well repaid by hearing Mr. Van Amburgh.
