title role in "David Copperfield"; Maureen O'Sullivan, Max Robson, Basil Rathbone and thirty-four other well-known players.

The settings, depicting Imperial Russia at the height of its splendor, were designed by Cedric Gibbons and his staff. Assisting in the production were three authorities on Russian affairs and customs, headed by Nathalie Bucknall, chief of M-G-M's Research Department, who is assisted by Count Andrey Tolstoy, a descendant of the famed novelist.

Lavishly mounted, madcap comedy, studded with the outstanding stars recruited from every division of the amusement world, "The Big Broadcast of 1936," which comes to the New Lyceum Theatre on Wednesday and Thursday, October 16 and 17, can be classed as entertainment of the highest order in the comedy and musical fields.

Add to these fun makers such ace high performers as Amos 'n' Andy, Bing Crosby, Ethel Merman, Bill Robinson, Mary Boland, Charles Ruggles and Ray Noble and his band, and you have an unbeatable assortment of entertainers.

"Big Broadcast" depicts the uproarious experiences of two radio entertainers who have the good fortune to meet a wealthy young Countess when their radio station is facing bankruptcy. Oakie is his customary wise-cracking, engaging self in a role cut to his measure. He and his partner, Henry Wadsworth decide to enter an international studio, from financial failure. They consider using the Radio Eye, a television mechanism invented by George Burns and Gracie Allen. At this point Lydia Roberts, as a sentimental, wealthy Countess and her secretary, Wendy Barrie, enter their lives, and whisk them off on her yacht to her estate in Cuba, and holds them there as her guest prisoners until she makes up her mind which one of the two boys she wants for a husband.

In a desperate break for freedom, Oakie, in broadcasting for aid, unintentionally competes in the radio contest which makes for a whirlwind, hilarious finish. Oakie and Miss Roberts provide many of the laughs, ably abetted by Burns and Allen. The specialty numbers, a high light in the film, are spotted throughout the production forming an important background to the story.

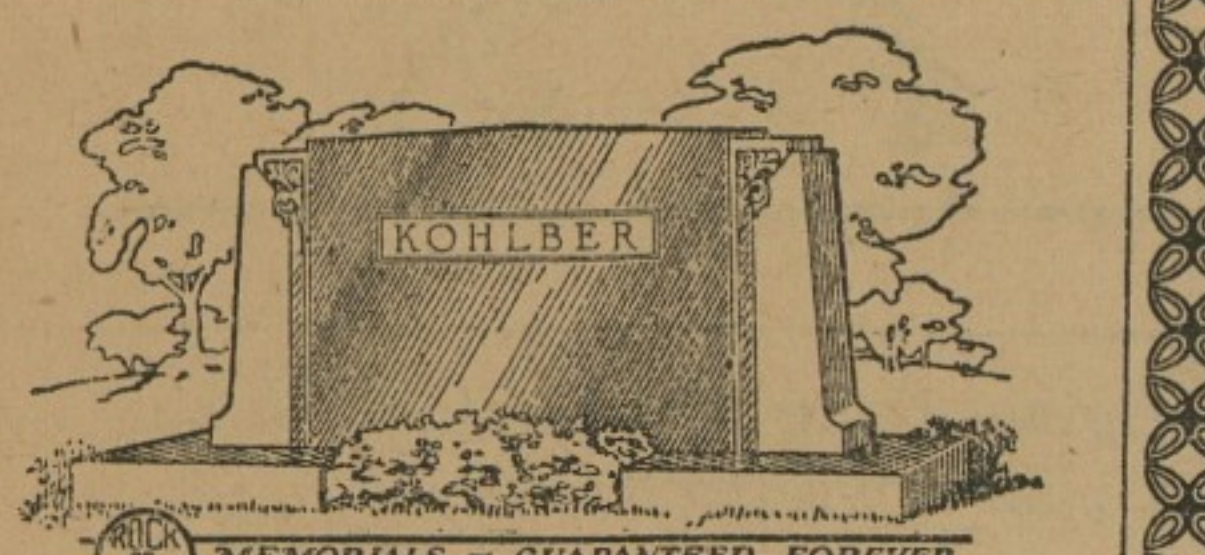

Others in the large cast are Douglas Dumbrille, George McKay, Shirley Grey, Charles Wilson, Bradley Page, Arthur Rankin and Fred Kelsey.
