wheat sold for 80c per bushel, it under the A. A. A. would have averaged \$1.22.

Now take the most extreme case one can well imagine. Farmer B on his 60 per cent of 50 acres or 40 acres or 45 seeded acres has a bumper crop and after retaining seed wheat, feed for poultry, and wheat for flour is able to sell an even 100 bushels (the total average of 1930-32) in spite of the 20-10 per cent fewer acres. The 1000 bushels at 70c as above is worth \$700, (not forgetting that his fertilizer, twine, harvesting, tillage, threshing and marketing costs are greater than if he has 20 per cent fewer acres seeded and opportunity to use those acres for feed crops or soil improving crops.) His benefit payment is the same in either case \$226.80. And \$926.80 is the value of the marketed crop or 93 cents per bushel. This 93 cents per bushel plus the 20 per cent to 10 per cent saving in fertilizer and tillage justify the claim that the A. A. A. plan gives even this very exceptional farmer the equivalent of \$1.00 per bushel for his wheat.
