## Shakespeare Club Ready For Production Of "Hamlet" Here

Prospects for a fine Shakespeare production have never been so bright since the birth of the Shakespeare Club at Washington College, four years ago, according to the director of the prospective offering of "Hamlet" on Friday evening of this week.  
 Four years ago an actual stage representation of any of Shakespeare's plays; most had never seen a stage play at all. The acting, therefore, was largely imitative. In the intervening time, however, interest has grown in Shakespearean drama, so that most of the principals of the present cast have seen at least one professional company. A large number of the cast visited Baltimore last autumn to see Walter Hampden's "Hamlet,"—went knowing what parts they were to take, that they might observe and get pointers.  
 The result is that this year, for the first time, there will be something of an interpretation of roles. The actors under their own intonation,—under direction, of course. This is a distinct advance.  
 William Oliver Baker as Hamlet promises a sound interpretation of the title role. Mr. Baker has been living with his role for nearly a year, so that, he reports, he finds himself speaking and thinking in private life in the tones and language of his prototype. He is far from the first Shakespearean actor to find this case. He has thrown aside the nineteenth century interpretations of the quiet, melancholy, meditative prince, who "unpacks his heart with words" and whose deeds "lose the name of action"; and has substituted the mercurial, moody, almost hysterical character painted in the lines. These natural characteristics he conceives as exaggerated by the disillusionment resulting from his discovery of his mother's shallowness and, worse, her unfaithfulness.  
 Horatio, who is better loved and says less than any similar character in drama, in the person of Arthur Greims, makes an excellent foil for Mr. Baker. Quiet, steady, calm, dependable,—he possesses exactly the qualities Hamlet needs for rehabilitation. Had Horatio had a little more time with Hamlet he could have cured him; and Mr. Greims makes this felt.  
 Incidentally the death scene, with the stage strewn with corpses, awed courtiers gathered in silence, and Hamlet and Horatio more and more quietly taking their leave, the one of his friend, the other of life, his fair, if rehearsals are to be trusted, to rival the professional stage.

## ROTARIANS - GUESTS ENJOY OYSTER FEAST

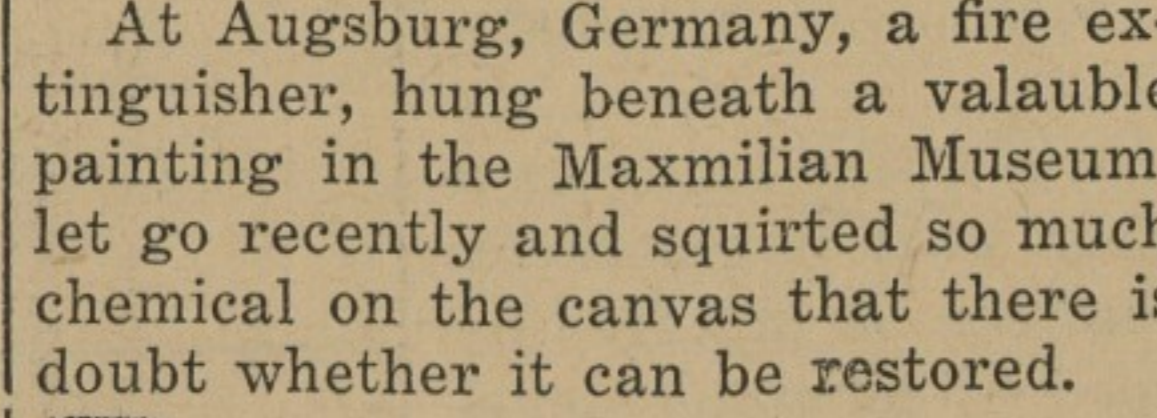
