


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Neighborhood News

This was proven at the meeting held on Monday night, when the firemen, returning from the blaze which destroyed the house of Romie Patrick, a member of the fire company, and formerly of Chestertown, adjourned after calling the roll and proceeded to fix up temporary quarters for Mr. Patrick.

The house on wheels belonging to Alfred Lewis was obtained and hauled out to the Patrick place, about three miles on the Centerville road. Then bedding, etc., was put in order and the temporary quarters heated and made comfortable. This work took preference over the meeting, which the firemen claimed could be held next Monday night.

The fire started from an oil stove in the kitchen setting fire to the oil cloth back of the stove as a protection to the wall. Soon the entire wooden structure was ablaze. The call was sent in to the firemen, just as the entire roof was ablaze.

The firemen responded at once, but the high wind and the absence of water soon gave the flames the upper hand. Two engines were on the scene, and these were used to save the outbuildings and the hay and other products of the farm.

The household effects were mostly destroyed, but a large quantity of meat and provisions was saved, and Mr. Patrick was forced to stay on the place to save these. With the house burned down there was no place for him to stay outside the stable. The firemen got busy, obtained the house on wheels, and soon had it comfortably arranged for the night's lodging. Mrs. Patrick was cared for by a neighbor.

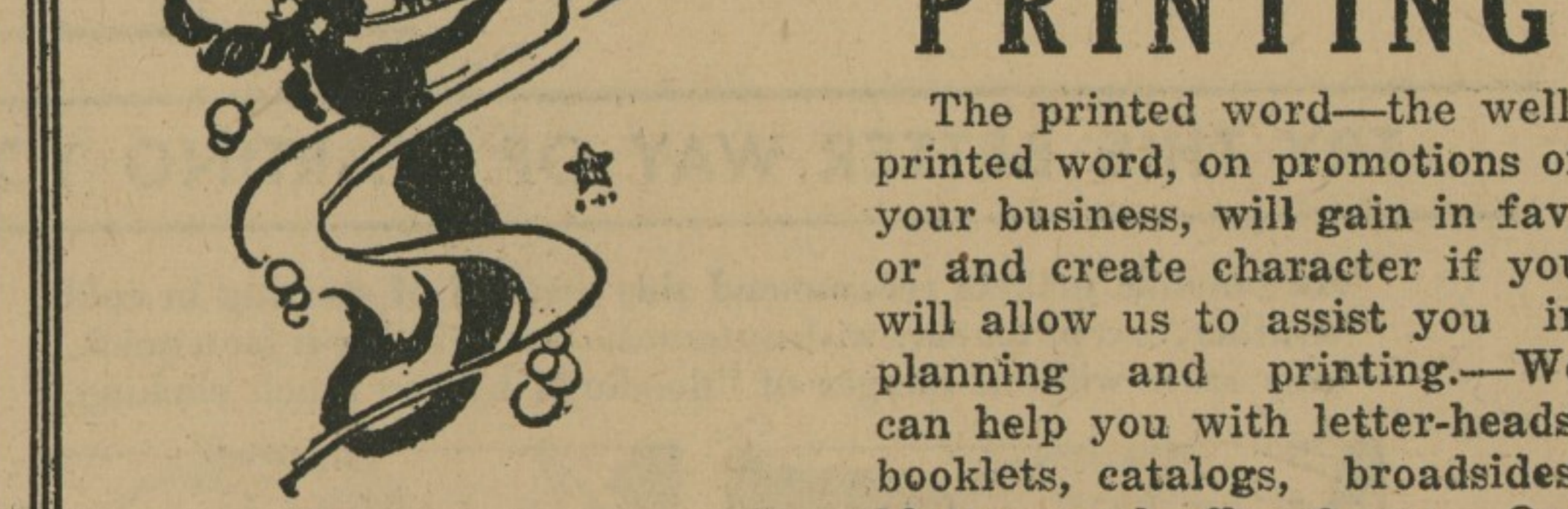
