Governor Nice Makes Inaugural Address At Annapolis Today

act as a clearing house for all financial transactions involving distributions to the State employees and would be a means of control over disbursements made by all State agencies and departments. It would function without additional cost to the State, as I will place at the service of the Comptroller, for the purpose of administering the bureau, such of the employees, now engaged in doing the financial work of the various departments, as may be necessary to effectuate this plan of financial centralization.

In the course of his address Governor Nice gave indications of several pieces of legislation which he would advocate. Among those mentioned were:

1. A re-enactment of the Compensation Act, repealing objectionable features and making the law more equitable.
2. A ratification by the State of the National Suffrage Amendment.
3. The repeal of the Declaration of Intentions Act.
4. The appointment of a Service Officer to aid the War Veterans of the State.
5. A measure to provide installment payment of State taxes.
6. A measure to provide for the election of the State Treasurer by direct vote of the people.
7. Legislation relative to Old Age Pensions and Unemployment Insurance.
8. The formation of a Department of Social Welfare.

In referring to the plight of Maryland's watermen Governor Nice said: "Two of the most valuable of the State's natural resources, the oyster and the crab, after years of legislation and the expenditure of millions of dollars, are now found to be in a lamentable condition of depletion through neglect of adequate measures for their propagation and protection. We are advised that \$500,000 is a conservative estimate of the amount necessary to rehabilitate these two important industries. I advocate a Commission of three, with proper compensation, whose members shall be required to give
