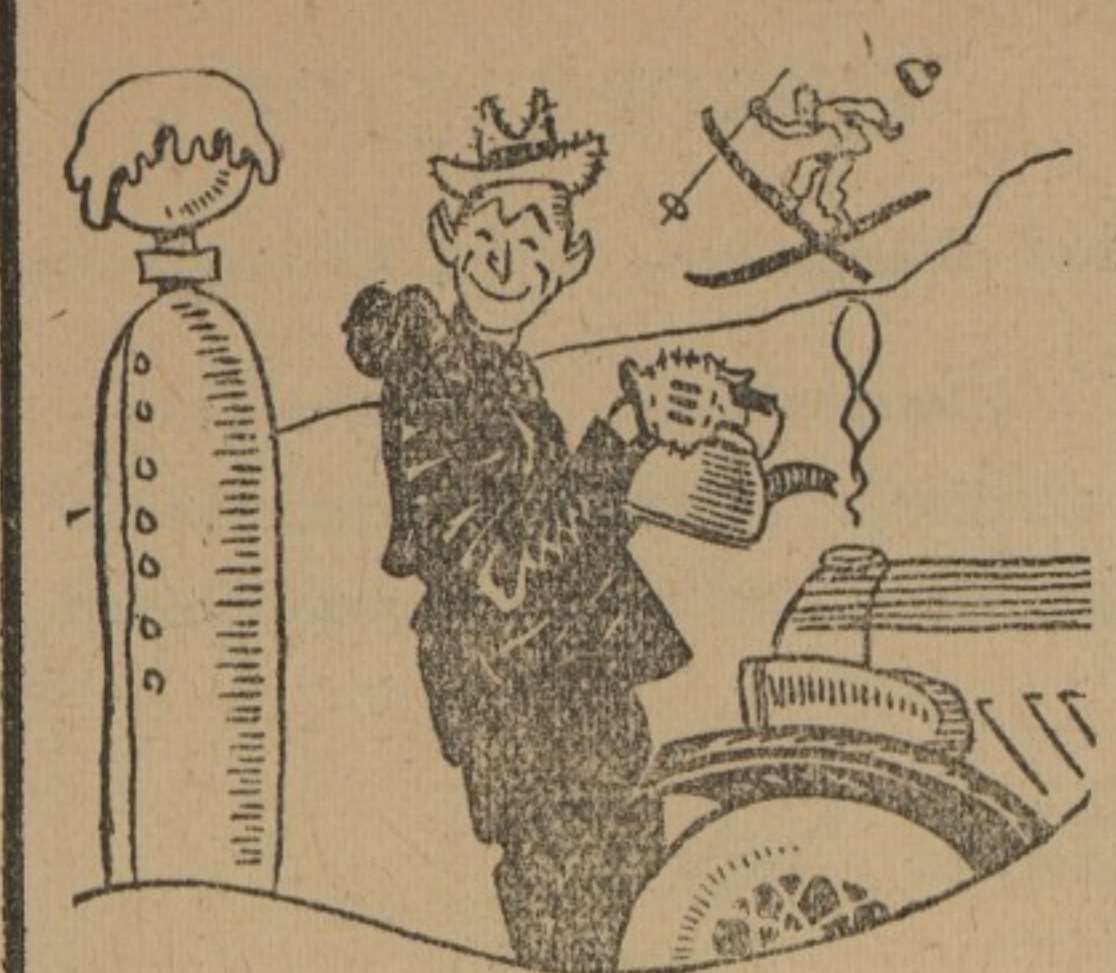

COUNTY LOSSES HIGHER (Continued From Page 1) company. There is nothing more disheartening to your President than to hold meetings week after week with hardly more than enough to make a quorum.

There are some recommendations I should like to make, but owing to the condition of our Treasury, I do not think it the proper time to make them. We will, however, have the report of a committee which was appointed to make recommendations on a new truck, and which in my judgment is badly needed, and which I think at this time can be successfully financed, while our present apparatus is in fair condition.

There are very few organizations in the county whose financial condition is as good as it was 5 years ago. The depression which has swept the country has made it especially hard for all volunteer fire companies and I deem it my duty at this time, to urge all our members to be reasonable in their demands, and as economical as possible, for while we are out of debt we must make the best use of the funds we have in hand.

There was a great deal of unbusiness in our company during last winter on account of our band being disorganized. This I am glad to say has all been cleared up, and I wish to extend our thanks to Mr. W. H. Elliott under whose leadership the band was reorganized and some new uniforms purchased. Also to Prof. L. B. Van Petten who is now directing the band and through his efforts has been brought up to a high standard and in our judgment is second to none on the Eastern Shore of Maryland.

In July of the past year we decided not to hold a carnival, which was a great load lifted from the shoulders of all of us. The credit for this is due to Mr. L. G. Brown, one of our very good members, who solicited contributions from the citizens of the town and whose work in this respect has been untiring, and he has the thanks of our entire organization.

In August we suffered the loss of one of our best beloved members, Fred S. Russell, a man who was loved by all of us; a man whose place in this organization will be very hard to fill; a man of wonderful ideas; and one who was always ready and willing to do his part. While he has left a vacancy in our ranks, there lingers in our hearts a sweet memory of him.

I cannot close this report without thanking the officers and members for your kindness and consideration of me and for the manner in which we have all worked together. It has been a pleasure to have been associated and to have served as your presiding officer during the past year. I especially wish to thank our secretary, Mr. Raymond East, who has been a wonderful help to me. He has been faithful and prompt in all his duties and he is deserving of the thanks of the company.

In closing my term of office as your President, I again, appeal to you for harmony in our ranks during the coming year, and I ask you to give to my successor and all other officers whom you may elect tonight your hearty support.

Neighborhood News

M. C. Sherman, of Queenstown, Queen Anne's county, is one of Maryland's oldest and best breeders of Aberdeen-Angus cattle. He maintains a herd of sixty pure-bred females and is feeding forty head of steers for market.

Last week Mr. Sherman purchased from Andelot Stock Farms, of Worton, Kent county, two of the best bulls in that famous herd. Evaxus 29th of Page is sired by Imported Evaxus of Ballindalloch, a bull imported from Scotland. He will be used on the main breeding herd and is considered one of the best bulls ever to be used in this state.

Mr. Sherman selected Revolution 46th of Page. This bull is sired by Revolution of Page 11th who sired the International Grand Champion steer and the International Grand Champion Group of three steers at the 1934 International Livestock Exposition. With two such splendid bulls, Mr. Sherman should soon be able to take a leading part in the Aberdeen-Angus business of the East.

Aberdeen-Angus are strictly a beef breed of cattle noted for their early maturity, quick fattening and for the quality of their meat. They are very popular in Maryland where there are now many very high-class purebred herds. The Eastern Shore is fast becoming famous for its splendid herds of this breed. Herds are maintained by R. D. Bonney, of Elkton; George K. Bailey, of Earleville; Andelot Stock Farms, of Worton; M. C. Sherman, of Queenstown; Mrs. Marion Dixon, of Worton; F. W. Rochelle, Jr., of Easton; and Kinauer Bros., of Cambridge.

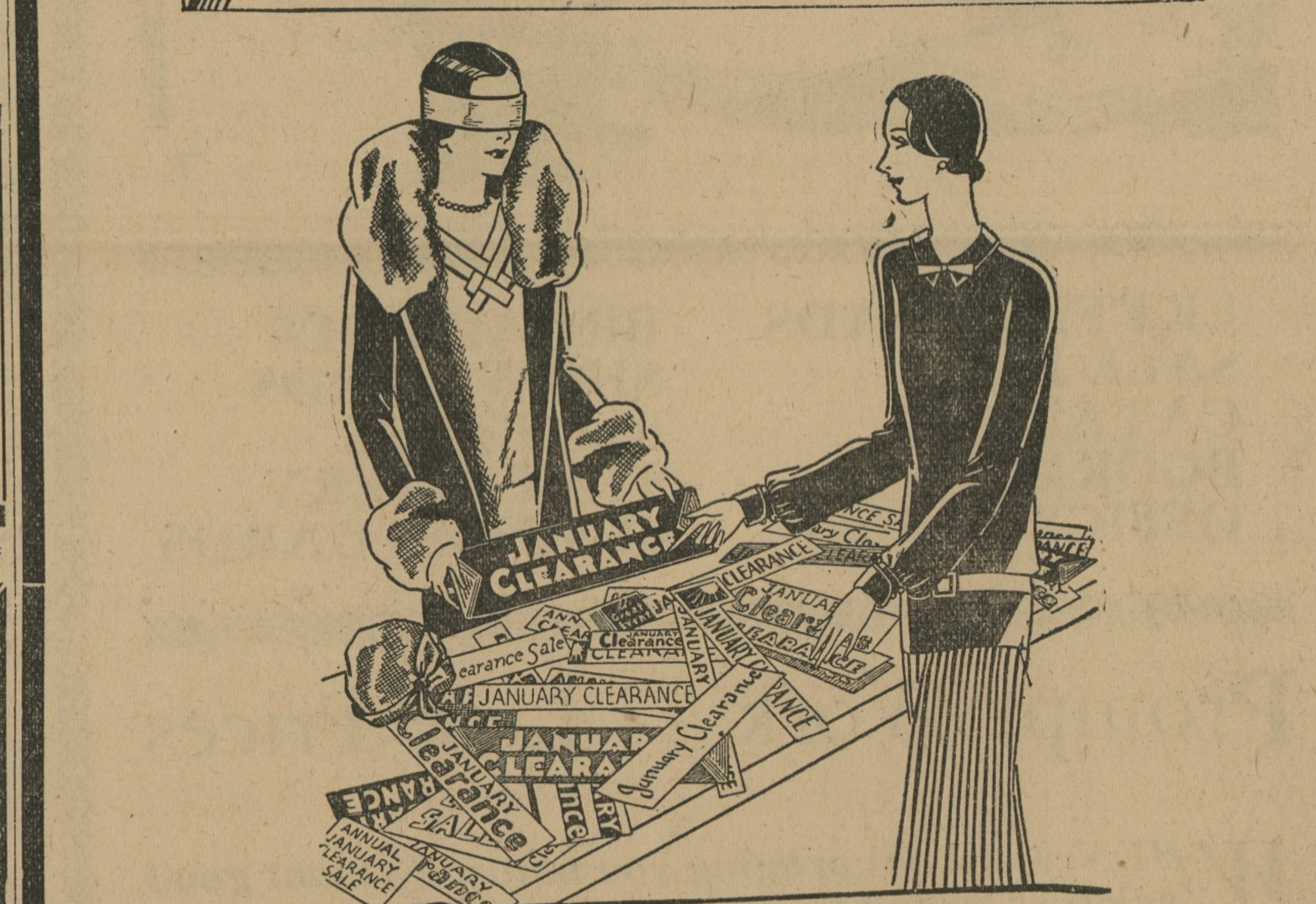
