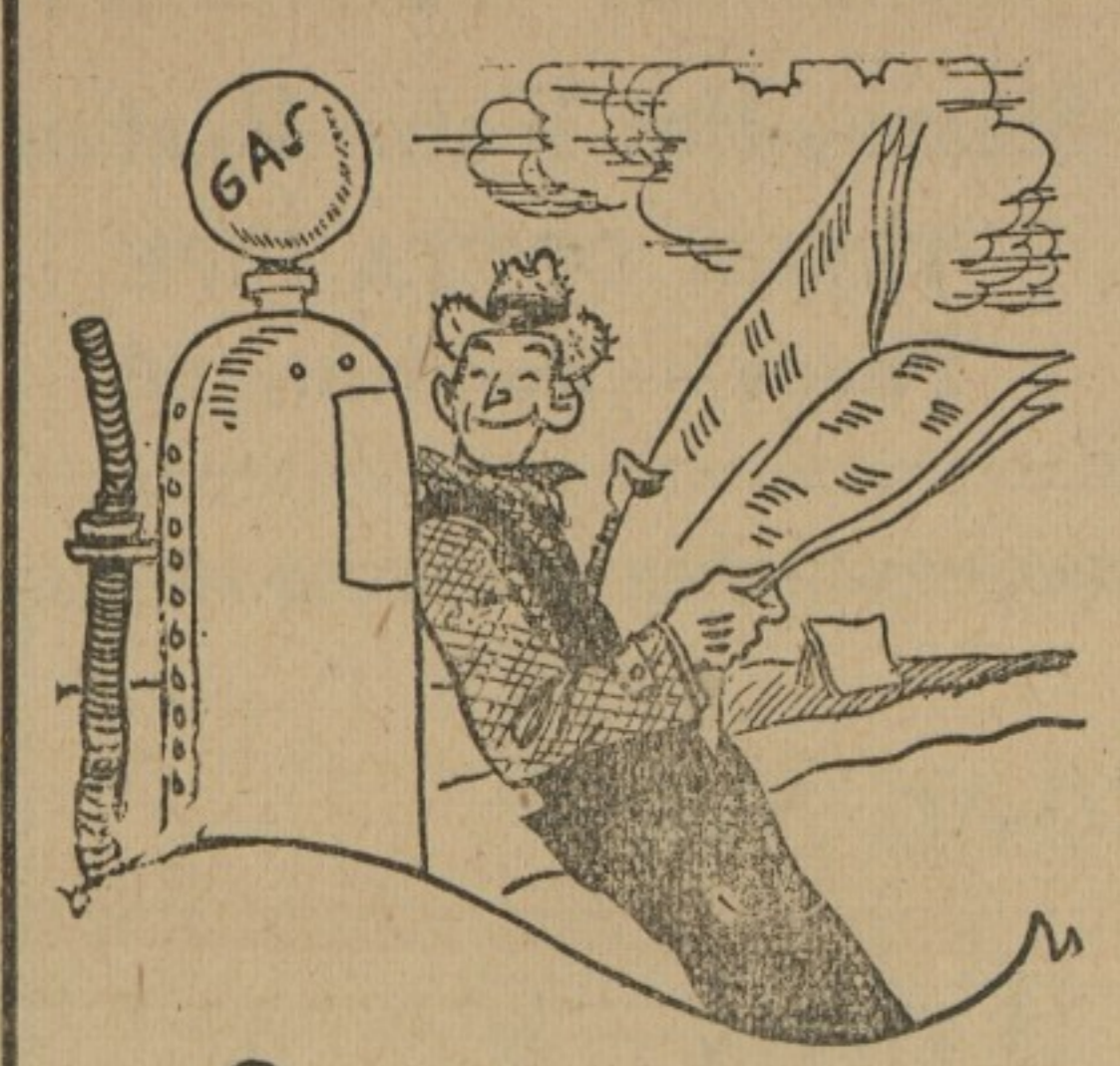

Stocks of wheat in interior mills and elevators in Maryland on January 1, were estimated at 450,000 bushels, according to the Maryland Crop Reporting Service. The total number of bushels stored in elevators and mills throughout the United States is estimated at 93,485,000 bushels.

That the births in Maryland, last year, exceeded the deaths by a total of 6,631, is shown in a report on births, deaths and causes of death, in 1934, submitted recently to Governor Nice, by Dr. R. H. Riley, Director of the State Department of Health. There were 27,854 births reported in the State in 1934, 21,521 white and 6,063 colored and 20,953 deaths, 16,069 white and 4,884 colored.

A 100-year-old tree, sentenced to "death" at Bourne-mouth, England, has been reprieved owing to an outcry from residents.

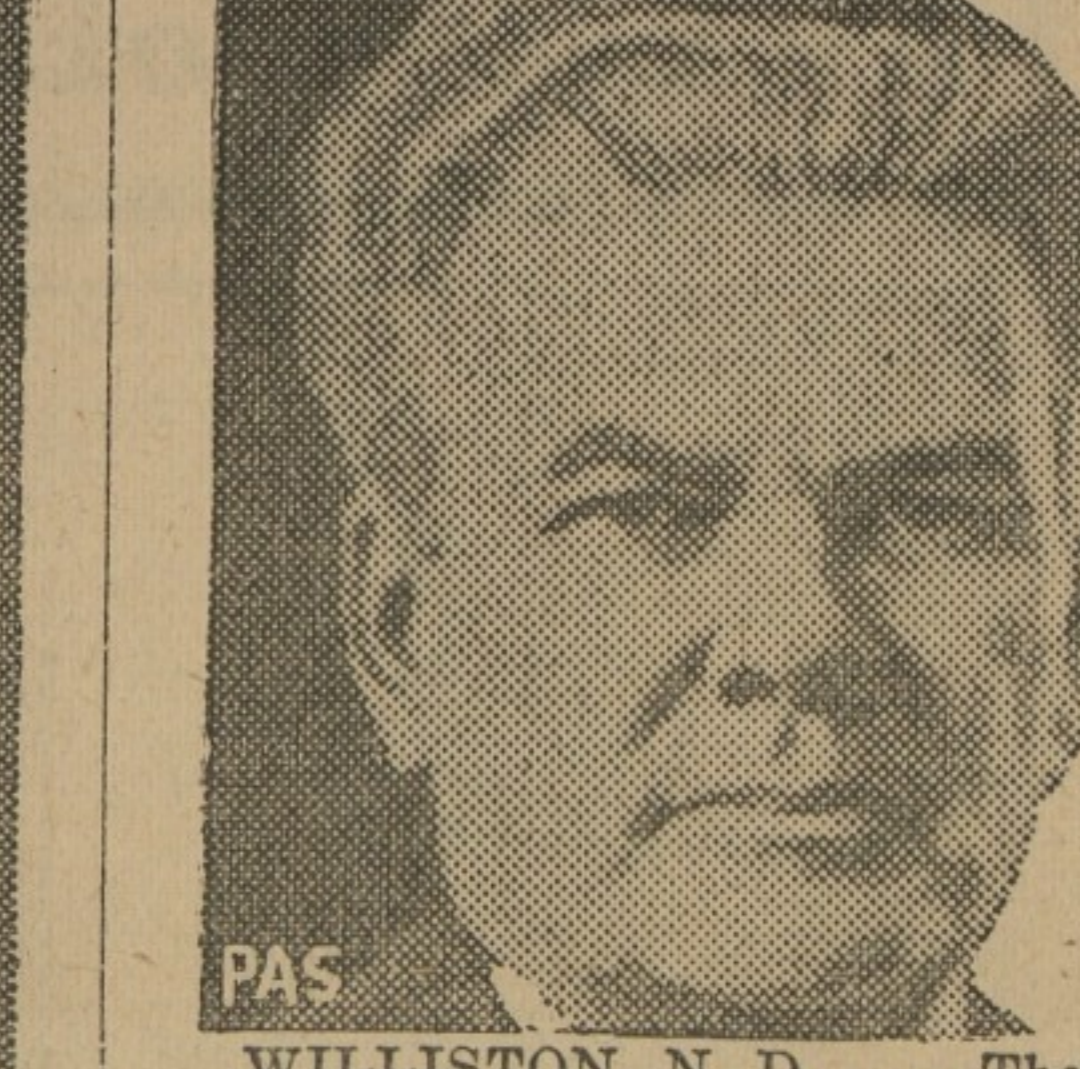
