**Washington - St. John's Renew Old Cage Rivalry Here Saturday**

**Both Clubs Will Present Youthful Array of Talents. Donohue, Johnnie Veteran, Won Game Here Last Year In Final Seconds**

A pair of ancient rivals will meet on the Chestertown Armory court Saturday night when Washington College entertains the cagers from St. John's College, Annapolis, in a Maryland Collegiate Basketball League contest. Fire and fur always fly when these old foes get together and the fact that the Shoremen and the Johnnies are rated among the strong teams of the loop makes the contest more inviting.

Coach Dutch Lentz, a St. John's alumnus who in his undergraduate days caused the Shoremen of that time much trouble, has practically a new quintet this season. But there is at least one veteran on the squad that Washington cagers have every reason to remember. Donohue, a veteran guard, is the lad who tossed in the last second field goal from back of the center of the court to defeat Washington by one point here last winter. That tremendous heave is remembered too well by some of the Shoremen.

Washington, too, is apt to send a practically new outfit against the Johnnies. Unless Tom Kibler alters his plans there will be four freshmen in the starting lineup of the Washington games from now on. Phil Skipp, at center, is the only veteran who has been able to retain a starting berth. Salter and Horowitz, at forwards, Wilmot and Huffman, at guards, are all freshmen.

The Shoremen had a rest last week end when the game with Loyola was postponed. The heavy snow and examinations combined to keep the Washington squad at home. The only means of reaching Baltimore was by railroad and with several on the squad having examinations in the morning it was impossible for Tom Kibler and his charges to get away before afternoon. Investigation revealed that the trains were running several hours behind schedule and that the earliest the Shoremen could hope to arrive in Baltimore was 9 P. M. With the consent of the Loyola officials the game was postponed.

The Washington cagers were given the day off on Saturday but practice was resumed in earnest on Monday. Since Kibler hit upon the Salter-Horowitz-Skip-Wilmot-Huffman combination that outfit has been looking very good in practice. The shifting of Wilmot to guard may be

the making of the team. This Waterville, Conn., youth, always a forward, is a natural born rear court player. He is the "feeder" type, an excellent ball handler and one who can see plays develop. His defensive work in the Mt. St. Mary's game was of the very highest order.

With Wilmot at guard it is possible to get more scoring power in the game, a thing Washington has needed for a number of years. Horowitz, the lad who moved into a varsity berth at forward as Wilmot went back to guard, is a fine shot and a good team player.
