Cold And Big Snow Are Topics Of Paramount Interest At Rock Hall

The universality of the topic makes the cold and big snow, their inconveniences and their pleasures (for there are pleasures for the young) the paramount subject of conversation. Through Wednesday and Thursday we waited patiently, knowing that not much could be done for the roads, but Friday was a beautiful day but the expected communication with the rest of the county was not forthcoming. Death was in the community and no undertakers services were available; patients were deprived of the ministrations of their family physicians; teachers and pupils could not reach their schools, everyone dreaded to hear the fire siren—in fact, everything was stagnant—not even a paper or letter to know what was happening elsewhere. Saturday it was reported that there were not enough men (relief workers) being employed and it probably would be Tuesday before we were relieved of our isolation. So a lot of men decided that they and the rest of us needed relief from the intolerable situation so they went to work on the drifts and were soon in Chestertown and Mr. Middleton then brought the mail down, which relieved the town at least. On Sunday the men renewed their efforts and helped the people of the Island. By Monday things were running more normally. Very few sleighs have been seen but there are plenty of sleds. Many of them are big home-made affairs that are hitched behind cars after being filled with young people—well wrapped, they are, the girls even wearing trousers. The harbor is frozen over and skaters are making the most of the fact. Friday several young men with a sled went to Chestertown to bring down the films for the picture parlor. They reached home at midnight! Well, Messrs. Elliott, Cornelius and Jones, they were in plenty of time for Saturday night. It seems that every time there is a really big snow the wind rises and drifts form. As for cold—Sunday night surpassed even the storm. Monday at 7:30 A. M. a rather sheltered outdoor thermometer registered seven degrees below zero.

A nice dance will be held in the hall Thursday night. Death found us in our isolation and another of our older people, Mrs. Emma Sutton, passed away last Friday. Among attendants at the funeral Monday were noted a cousin Mrs. Florence Devereaux, a guest at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Willson, a niece, Mrs. Laura Bowers, of Wilmington; Mr. and Mrs. William Williams of Fairlee and Mr. and Mrs. Frank C. Wheatley, of Tolchester.

The death of Harry Carter removes the father of an interesting family of children.

Wilbur, (colored) son of Fannie Blake, died Sunday of pneumonia and an older brother is ill of the same disease.

The storm caused the discontinuance of the revival services at Wesley Chapel until there is a prospect of better weather conditions. Rev. A. W. Ewell returned Saturday to his home in Towson. Prof. Nicholson returned to Willards on Sunday after morning service at which a hundred and one were present. A former pupil of Wesley School, writing from California Thursday said that it had been cold too but that day the thermometer seemed to be around ninety.

Nine airplanes passed over here Monday morning, slowly and very low as if searching.



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
