While unable to supply a bed because of his family which numbered thirteen in all, he made the unexpected guest comfortable in a chair beside the stove with wood to keep the fire going and in the morning even insisted on his having breakfast and then was reluctant about taking pay. That man is a Samaritan. That day Mr. Culley found board in Chesapeake City where he had to remain until Saturday, reaching home after dark. Meantime, in the midst of the tempestuous weather, Mrs. Culley was doing her best to keep the home fires burning and take care of the packing plant work and employees and the two buildings are several hundred feet apart. A man had pneumonia and it was impossible to get him to Easton but it was finally arranged to get him to the Kent and Queen Anne General Hospital where he got along finely and was soon able to sit up. That speaks well for the efficiency of the doctors and nurses.


