### Shoremen Have Chance To Tie For Md. League Title

Can Assure Tie With Three Victories

By winning its remaining three games Washington College can do no worse than tie for the title in the Maryland Collegiate Basketball League and it is not unlikely that those three victories would bring the crown to Chestertown undisputed.

And so the Shore cagers under Tom Kibler, are out to sweep the remaining three games, the first of which is played with St. John's at Annapolis on Thursday night. Western Maryland will be met at Westminster next Tuesday and Loyola will be met in the grand finale on Friday, March 1, in the local Armory.

Right now Loyola is in the lead with only two losses chalked against its league record. Washington has been defeated three times so that if both continue to win until they face each other a victory then for the Shoremens would mean a deadlock. Mt. St. Mary's, too, is in a fine spot to win or tie for the crown.

But the Shoremens are concerned mainly with their own record and three victories in the next three games will, under any circumstances, gain them nothing worse than a tie.

Kibler hopes to have his outfit clicking on all cylinders when it faces the Johnnies on Thursday night. In recent games the Shoremens have started at a whirlwind pace but in practically every game have finished in a walk. In the first meeting with the Johnnies here they started fast, then faltered but managed to hit their stride again toward the end. At Mt. St. Mary's last Friday Washington held the lead for a good part of the first half and then went to pieces.

On Saturday here, facing Delaware, the team looked like a million dollars in the first half and thirty cents in the second. Hard work was on the card for the Shoremens on Monday and Tuesday. The squad tapers off today and around noon tomorrow begins the journey to Annapolis. The Johnnies will be set for revenge, despite the fact that they lost two of their best performers through study weaknesses. The Crabtown outfit didn't take kindly to the severe training they received here at the hands of the Shoremens and would like nothing better than to turn the tables.

The games means much to Washington, too. For without a win against St. John's the chances of a league title are slim, mighty slim.

### BYRD ENGINEER PRAISES AUTOMOTIVE EQUIPMENT

As the second Byrd Antarctic Expedition left Little America recently, Commander George O. Noville, executive officer and fuel engineer, reported a very satisfactory operation of the automotive equipment.

In citing the fine record of this equipment he brought out three salient factors: first the efficiency of the personnel, second, the exceptional quality of the Tydol fuel and Veedol lubricants provided by the Tide Water Oil Company and third the sturdiness of modern equipment.

In his report to Admiral Byrd, Lieut. Commander Noville stated that Tydol gasoline and Veedol lubricating oil, which are distributed locally by the Holt Oil Company, had been issued to the extent of 20,850 gallons of the former and 1300 gallons of the latter.

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It is not injurious to the drill. After treating, the seed should be stored in a pile or sacks for 24 hours before planting.

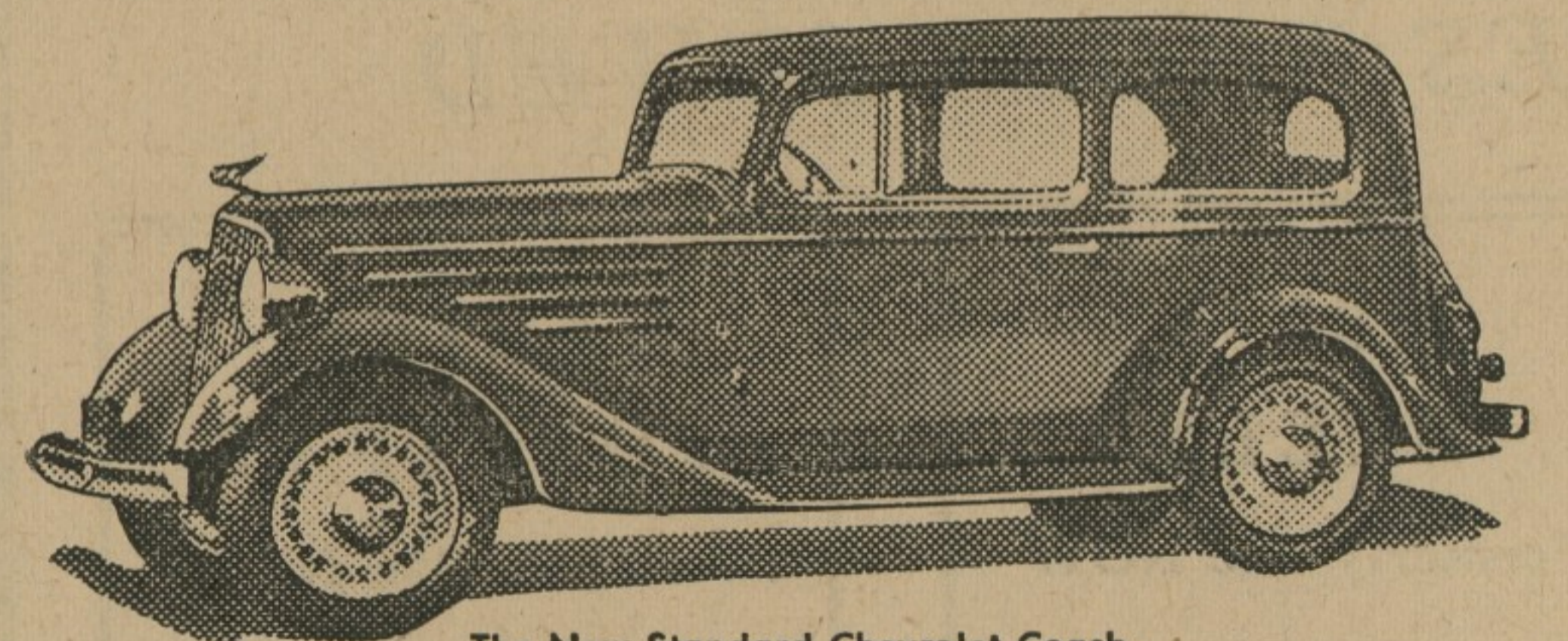
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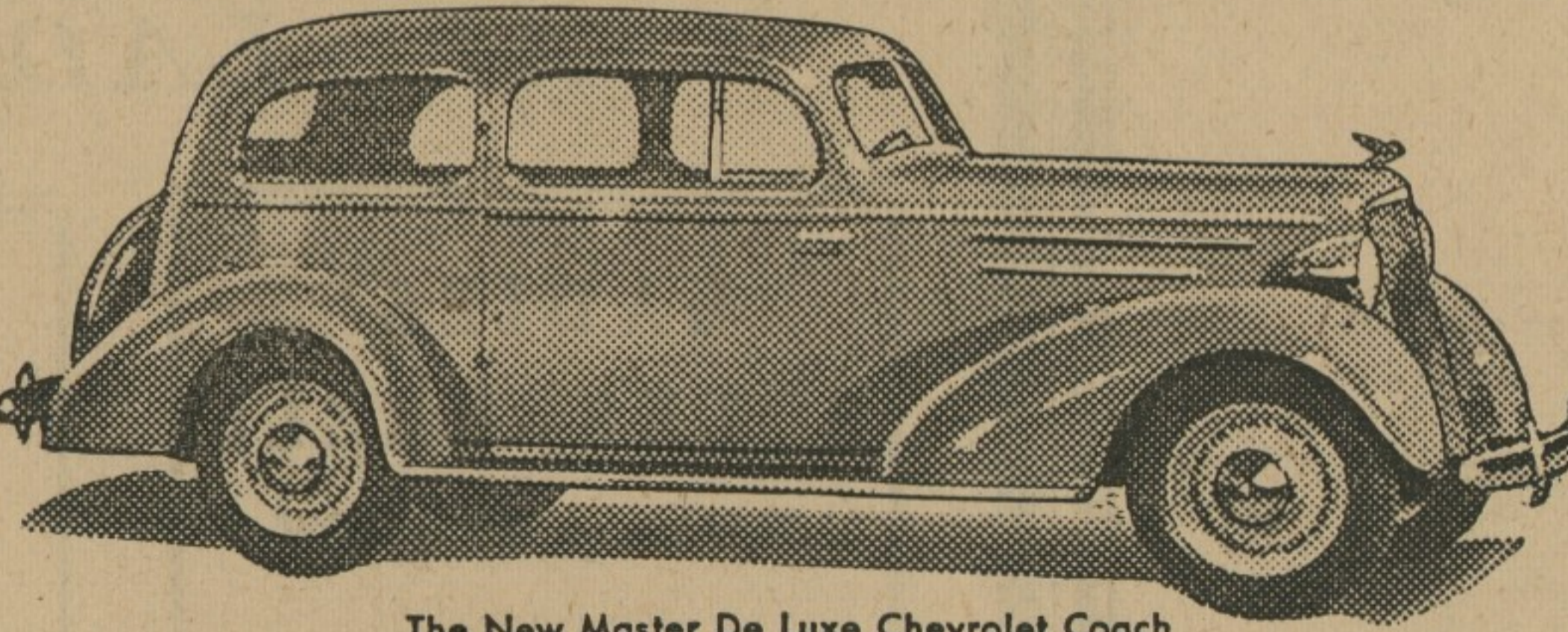
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
