Rock Hall
Death has been with us and around us. Frank A. Colson was called away last week. John H. Thompson died at the home of his brother near Gratitude. Both of these were life-long residents of the vicinity and were buried at Wesley Chapel cemetery. Two others were brought home to rest with relatives and friends in their quiet graves: Mrs. Minnie Stevens Dodd on Saturday from Baltimore and Charles Ashley, from Grasonville. The latter grew up in Piney Neck and leaves there a brother, Capt. Joseph Ashley, and two sisters, Mrs. Clara Ashley and Mrs. Ella Ward. His wife and family live at Grasonville.
