Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Nicholson have returned from Cumberland where they attended the funeral of Mr. Nicholson's uncle.

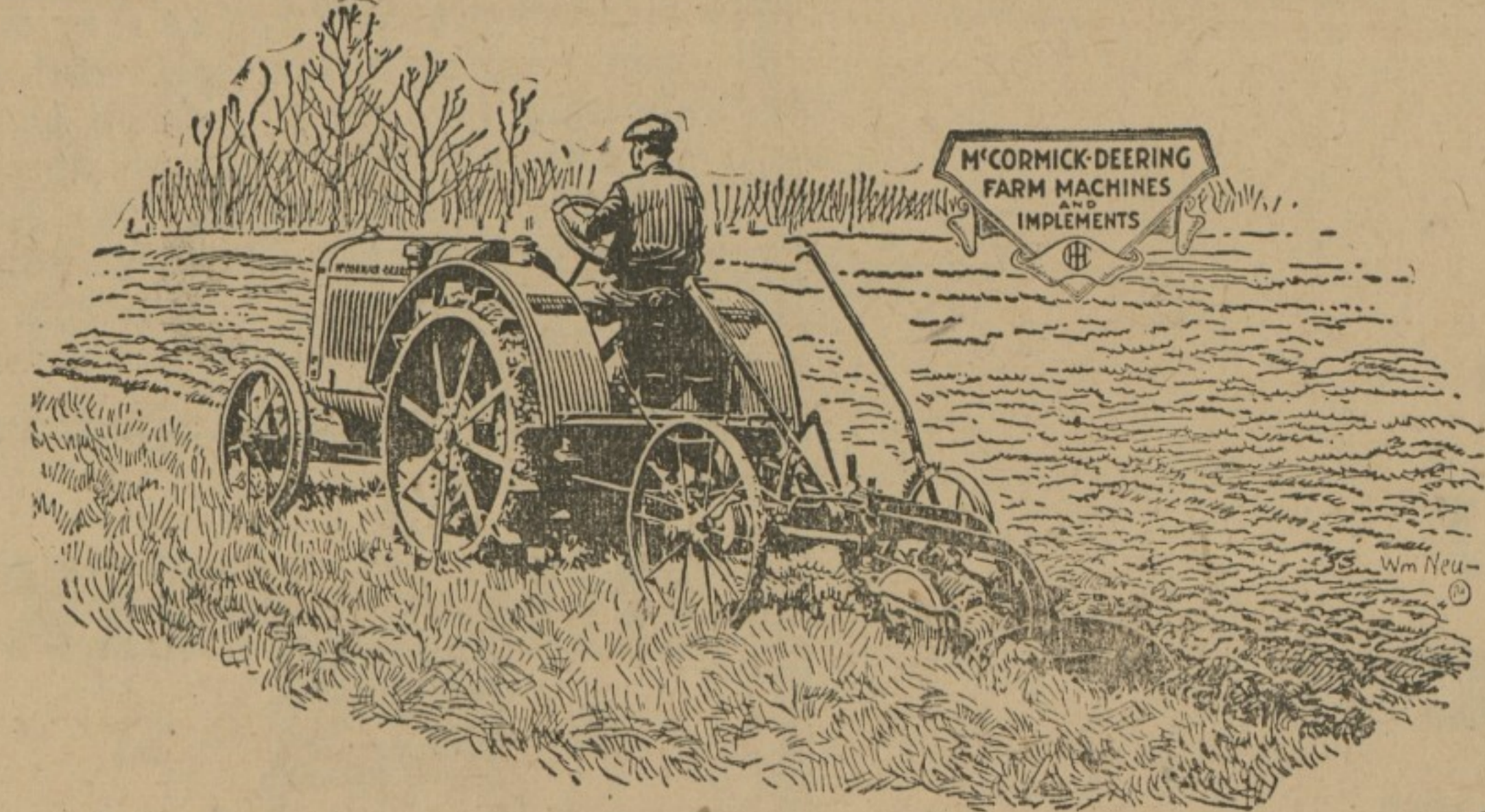
