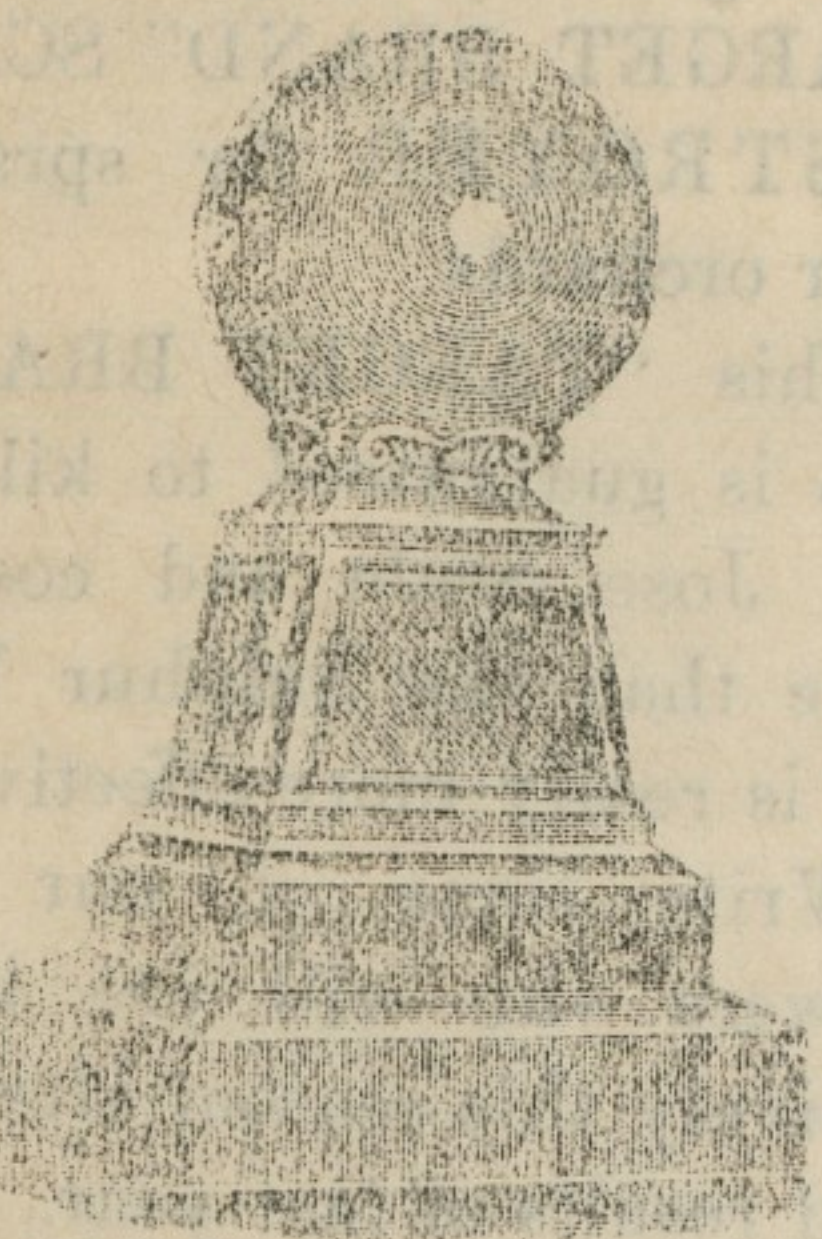

Dr. Trimble Suffering From Blood Poison—Infected From Operating Chief Horton's Scalp.

More than ordinary interest has been aroused by the critical illness of Dr. Isaac Ridgeway Trimble, who has been operated on at St. Joseph's Hospital, Baltimore, for septicemia, or blood poisoning. This interest exists not only among the eminent surgeon's personal friends and professional associates, but to many others.

Probably no friend of Dr. Trimble is more interested in his condition than Chief Horton. Although confined to his room in the City Hospital, the Chief is kept in touch with the condition of his friend and surgeon. By a strange coincidence Chief Horton almost predicted that Dr. Trimble would fall a victim to infection.

Some days ago Dr. Trimble visited the Chief, and the pair talked seriously of the life of a fireman. The surgeon tried to tell the old fire-fighter that he should give up his position as leader of the firemen because of the great dangers. Although Chief Horton has been injured several times, he was not willing to admit that he had better retire.

Dr. Trimble had operated on Chief Horton's head, aiding in getting glass and other debris from the wounds the Chief received at the Register building fire. So he had no hesitancy in talking plainly to the veteran.

"There are always great dangers threatening in the fire-fighting business," said the surgeon, "so why don't you give it up?" "Oh, I can't say there are so many more dangers in the fire-fighting business than in some others," replied Chief Horton, "for you know, Doctor, you are always liable to become infected from some case."

Dr. Trimble, in his characteristic manner, shrugged his shoulders, threw up his hands and walked gaily away, as if he gave little thought to such a danger. Since then the doctor has been a great sufferer from blood poison and his veins ripped from the arm in effort to save life.

The fact that a surgeon—the man supposed to cure physical ills—has himself fallen a victim accentuates the romance—the possible tragedy. It intensifies the "color" that is indelibly a part of his calling and which may fail to consider the danger and actual peril of life make it apparent that the surgeon—the trained physician—is not merely a man of glittering surgical instruments, a man of nostrums and, incidentally, a man who must be paid large fees, who is himself immune from the ailments of the laymen, but a human being in even greater danger of more serious ills and maladies than they.

Few, in fact, stop to consider that in his daily duties—his almost endless sacrifice to humanity—he is exposed to dangers of contagion; that when he is administering to the ailments of others he is in even greater danger oftentimes than the patient whom he attends or the person upon whom he operates.

Dangers A Layman Never Knows. The individual falls ill usually because of some long-neglected disorder, which the proper care and caution would have precluded from developing in a more serious malady which makes it imperative that the surgeon be called in to operate. But the physician is daily, almost hourly, brought in contact with virulent diseases, exposed to a thousand and one dangers which the layman never knows. Seldom indeed, is it that a man not of the medical profession considers or gives the credit due the physician for his heroic work.

For the surgeon contagion and possible death lurks in every case he supervises. And most frequently it is from the seemingly insignificant abrasion or puncture of the skin that develops into the most serious cases. Such was the case with Dr. Trimble.

Called in to operate on a case of kidney disease at St. Joseph's Hospital last Monday, Dr. Trimble while working cut two of his fingers slightly. He immediately sterilized the abrasions and thought no more of the occurrence until Wednesday, when, after a rise and fall of temperature, the pulse again took a jump and the physician was in the throes of excruciating pain. After attempting to diagnose his own case he went to the hospital, where, after a consultation of eminent physicians, it was decided that the dread bacteria streptococcus had entered the wound. Thus it resulted that the physician who had used his skill to try to save the life of a patient fell into even greater danger than the patient.

Heroic Measures Adopted. Dr. Trimble's case recalls others similar, all resulting from wounds at first supposed to be superficial. In several cases the slightest prick of the point of an instrument that apparently had been thoroughly sterilized caused septicemia, to cure which heroic measures had to be adopted.

The disease is probably the one most dreaded by physicians and one of the most malignant to which the surgeon is exposed. The bacteria once having entered the blood, it is necessary to remove the glands and veins beyond the point to which the poison has ascended. Recognized in its early stages, the victim is sometimes cured by the amputation of a finger or even of one of the joints, but because the poisoning or contagion is not readily apparent until it has made headway it is often necessary to remove the veins of the arm and the glands of the armpits, and frequently the arm it-

self. This method is employed to prevent the infection from reaching the heart, which results in death. To one not familiar with even the rudiments of surgery the operation seems almost barbaric. The skin is laid open and the veins ripped out, the arm appearing to the layman to have been cut into ribbons.

Case Of Dr. L. M. Sweetnam. One of the most important cases of such blood poisoning was that of Dr. L. M. Sweetnam, one of the foremost surgeons of Canada, who died at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. Dr. Sweetnam after an operation had removed his gloves and was cleaning his hands with a small brush. One of the bristles lodged beneath a finger nail, entering the flesh. The surgeon pulled it out and thought no more of it until his arm began to swell. Upon consultation it was decided to hurry him to the Baltimore Institution, but in spite of the heroic measures taken another surgeon paid the toll demanded by science.

Another case, which fortunately was noted in time and cured, occurred at St. Joseph's several years ago. A young physician, who later became a brilliant surgeon, while operating on a patient's skin of his finger in the morning, and in the afternoon noted symptoms of blood poisoning. He was put on the operating table, and while being treated the nurse who was in attendance and who had assisted him in the morning was found also to have been infected. Without delay she was put on a table, and as the result of an attempt to save the first patient's life both the physician and the nurse attending him lay in jeopardy of their lives.

Formerly septicemia was not uncommon in hospitals among medical students, but since the advent of listerism and aseptic methods it has become less frequent.

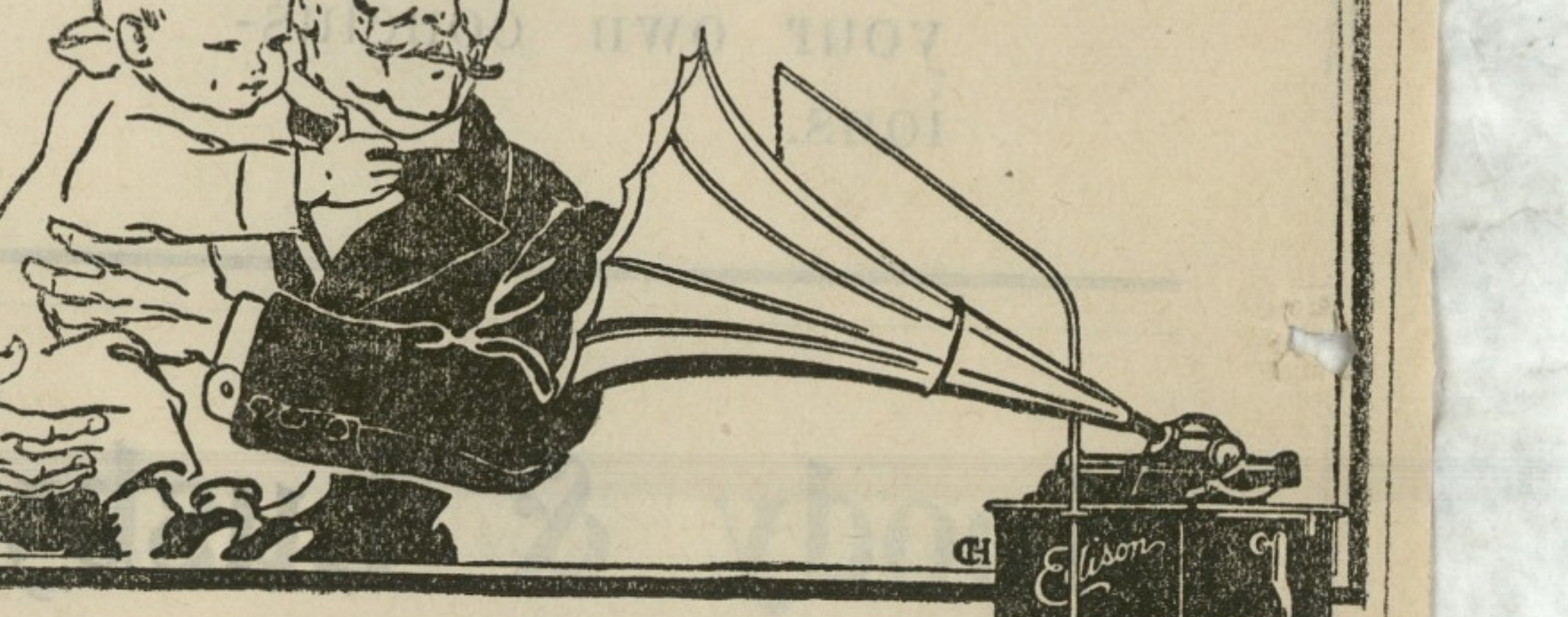
