



SHOT AND ROBBED!

Postmaster Morris And Wife At Sassafras Awakened Early Sunday Morning And Face Three Men With Pistols—\$90 Stolen—Steel Trap In Townsmd—Conscience Stricken And Gives Up \$1.

The quiet little village of Sassafras located on the river of the same name, about twenty miles from Chestertown and ten miles from Townsmd, Del., was the scene of exciting incident at 2 A. M. Sunday. Three white men left Townsmd in a team stolen from Mr. Vanhorn, of near Middletown, drove to Sassafras, and after stealing a lot of cheese from Mr. John F. Ernest's shops, made for the postoffice. They forced an entrance here but found only \$6 worth of stamps, and then proceeded to get into the residence by means of the window next door to the M. P. Church.

The three men stole up stairs and found themselves in the bedchamber of Mrs. E. B. C. Morris, the wife of Postmaster W. S. Morris. In this room besides Mrs. Morris were the two daughters, Lineta, aged 9, and Myrtle, aged 7, while a baby boy slept soundly in a crib at side of bed. Mr. Morris and daughter Louise, aged 8, were in an adjoining room.

Mrs. Morris was aroused by the men who stood over her with pistols and demanding her money! She screamed and Mr. Morris came quickly but two of the men soon floored him, one by putting a bullet in the calf of the leg while the second one struck him in the face with a chisel or brass knuckles.

Mr. Morris advised his wife to give up their earnings and the thieves demanded her to show where they were hid. Mrs. Morris said she was undressed, but the robbers replied that they would excuse her. In a box near the bed was the hidden money which was opened to the men. As they squatted about the box pouring over the silver and notes, Mrs. Morris said, "Isn't this an awful life for you men to lead. Here you have shot my husband, stolen all our money, and what will we do for a living?"

This evidently touched a warm spot in one man's heart for he turned over two half dollars to Mrs. Morris and said, "we didn't mean to hurt your husband; we just shot to scare him!" After discarding the checks and pocketing about \$90, \$40 of which belonged to the government, they left the home by the back door cautioning the inmates against giving any alarm. A lamp was left burning in the bed room.

In turning their stolen carriage around one of the wheels was wrecked, so they harnessed their horse to Mrs. Morris' carriage and drove off. Mr. Morris gave the alarm in the town but not a man would undertake to overtake the thieves.

They went to Pond Neck, got dinner at Mr. Harry Clark's ten mile house, came up to Cecilton in the afternoon and robbed Mr. Spear and a colored man of several dollars. Nothing has been heard from them since. Postmaster Morris is the son of Judge E. Sheppard Morris. His wound is not considered dangerous. It is remarkable that during all the incidents occurring in the home the baby was not awakened, but the girls are enabled to give accurate description of all the men. They all wore masks but one of them lost his so that Mrs. Morris feels certain she could identify him if he is brought before her.
