SPIRITUAL WAR ON AMUSEMENTS.

Worldly Pleasures Scored in Methodist's International Conference—Applause Greets Recommendation.

By recommending to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which is meeting at the Lyric, that amusements be combated by spiritual rather than legislative means, and that the words "Dancing, playing at games of chance, attending theatres, horse races, circuses, dancing parties or dancing schools" be stricken from Paragraph 248 of the Book of Discipline, the board of bishops caused a sensation Friday morning. The recommendation was greeted with great applause, and caused one of the two great outbreaks of the day.

The first and greatest was caused by the appeal of the bishops for the delegates to pledge "everlasting enmity to the liquor traffic." Both the appeal and the recommendation were contained in the quadrennial report of the board to the Conference, which was read by Bishop D. A. Goodsell, of Boston.

The bishops made it plain that they do not approve of these amusements, but believe that the number and kind of amusements have grown so great that the question should be left to the conscience of the people themselves, and that the opposition of the Church to amusements is regarded as unwholesome may best be stated in the terms of general principles. They recommended that Paragraph 248 be changed back to its original wording, as it was in 1872, when the certain kinds of amusements were specified.

With shouts and cheers the 787 delegates pledged themselves to support the bishops in an onslaught on the saloon and liquor traffic. Every man, woman and child in the hall jumped to their feet and cheered wildly in response to the appeal of the bishops for help in the fight against the saloons contained in the report of the Bishops to the Conference. Bishop D. A. Goodsell made the appeal in a most effective manner.

As the enthusiasm grew, men and women waved their handkerchiefs, giving the hall the appearance of a sea of white. Started to Sing "America." Suddenly one of the delegates started to sing "America." In an instant the great crowd caught up the hymn, and it was sung with a heartiness and will that made people passing along down Mount Royal and Maryland avenues stop and gaze in amazement. As the last refrain ceased some one began the hymn "Glory, Glory, Hallelujah." The new outlet for the enthusiasm, which seemed to be growing, was eagerly seized, and to the tune of "John Brown's Body" verse after verse was sung, until the singers were tired out.

Severely Condemned. The outbreak came after a particularly severe condemnation of the liquor interests. The report said: "There ought not to be—may there must not be—any reaction from the wrath with which all good and Christian citizens pursue this sneaking, law-breaking and murderous traffic. It deserves neither charity nor mercy. There is no law it will obey, no pledge it will honor, no child it will not taint, no woman it will not defile, no man it will not degrade. It feeds upon dishonesties of conduct and on the shame of brotherhood. It stimulates all revenge and makes the murderer dance upon the body he has killed. It falsely claims to be a great public interest, because it employs thousands and pays heavy taxes. But no money in the pockets of the employees and no taxes in the treasury of the city, county, State or nation can balance the monetary losses of the nation through this traffic. No profits, however rich imagined, can compensate for the corruption of our politics, the emptiness of the drunkard's home or the fullness of the prisons and graves. Will you rise here, and now, with the bishops, pledge eternal enmity to this foe of man and God?"

Another feature of the morning was the offering of a resolution calling on Congress to prohibit the shipment of intoxicating liquors into prohibition territory by Gov. J. Frank Hanly of Indiana. It was seconded by Gov. E. W. Hoeh, of Kansas. Both men used strong terms in condemning the demon rum.
