### DEATH'S DOINGS.

**CAPT. J. E. VICKERS.**  
Capt. John E. Vickers, aged 59 years, well-known as a captain of Bay craft, died last Saturday at his home near Lankford, this county, of Bright's disease. The funeral took place Monday from Lankford. Interment was in the cemetery of Wesley Methodist Protestant Chapel. Undertaker Chas. L. Dodd had charge of funeral arrangements and the pall bearers were: John V. Samuel and Barclay Kilbourn, Chas. Vickers, Marshall Pinkind and Chas. W. Fletcher.

Captain Vickers had followed the water all his life, and with his father, John E. Vickers, built his own boats. Among the last three which he built and commanded were the Lankford, the Hope and the Sarah E. Vickers, the last and largest boat being a schooner having a capacity of 4,000 bushels. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Emma Vickers and two young daughters, also two sons by his first wife, Thomas J. Vickers, mate of one of the boats of the Tolchester Company, and Kent Vickers, and one daughter, Mrs. Grace Fletcher, of Lankford. Captain Vickers also leaves two brothers, Messrs. E. O. and S. A. Vickers, who reside in Baltimore.

**MISS ANNIE KNORR.**  
Miss Annie Knorr, formerly of Louest Grove, died at the home of her sister in Frankford, Pa., May 11th. Funeral was held 15th inst., interment in Cedar Hill cemetery. The deceased was the niece of Mr. Robert Comly, of Louest Grove.

**WM. F. BIGGS DEAD.**  
Wm. F. Biggs, a well-known horseman, died Tuesday at the home of his father-in-law, Wm. L. Russell, at Arlington, near Baltimore, after a long illness from an affection of the lungs. For a number of years Mr. Biggs was identified with the race track and became known as one of the best drivers of trotting horses on the turf. He trained many fine Kent county horses. A widow and two children survive.

Mr. William Hanson Hodges, of Baltimore, died in Atlantic City Wednesday. Mr. Hodges was about 43 years old and a son of the late William K. Hodges and a nephew of ex-Mayor James Hodges. ### JUSTICE LOUD BUYS.

Law Violators Have A Field Day In Chestertown — Officers Cooper, Getshall, Startt and Lockerman Make Arrests.

Saturday night and Sunday were "field days" for law violators and the officers had considerable difficulty in arresting some. Samuel Sheppard, an old offender, was drunk and in arresting him Officer Getshall's two fingers were pulled out of place. Sheppard was given four months in House of Correction. Walter Johnson was fined \$3.40 and John H. Johnson \$10.40 for disorderly conduct, each of whom paid his fine. Charles Bell was fined \$7.40 or sentenced to 15 days in jail. Benjamin Blake was fined \$5 which he paid. George Hollins and Robert Clayton were each held for action of Grand Jury on charge of selling intoxicating liquor. Clayton was also sentenced to six months in jail for carrying concealed weapons. Spencer Robinson was fined \$7.80 and ordered repair damages to jail which he caused. It is said that a cart-load of jugs and bottles were found broken in a lot near Santiago, friends of accused colored men having relieved their homes of suspicious articles. Officers Cooper, Getshall, Startt and Sheriff Hadaway deserve commendation for their efficiency and desire to break up violations of law and preserve peace. Justice Loud is measuring fully up to his duty and takes to law like a duck to water.
