The State of Oregon has elected a Republican Governor and Legislature and a Democratic United States Senator. At least the Legislature is pledged to elect the man who received most votes and that man was former Governor Chamberlain. This is surely a rare case.

BRYAN can poll more votes than any other Democrat who could be named, therefore the News thinks he is the logical candidate for the Democracy to name. He has many converts in Maryland recently and wherever he goes the character of the man, his honesty and richness of thought are bringing new recruits beneath his standard.

MAJOR WILLIAM P. CHAFFINCH, who was elected to serve Easton in that capacity only four weeks ago, has resigned because the Council refused to confirm some of his appointments. He had named his son, Laurence A. Chaffinch, as town clerk, and Monday night the Council rejected him. President of the Council, Major Charles W. Adams, will be Mayor now in place of Mr. Chaffinch.

It has been decided that no liquor will be sold in the auditorium in Denver where the Democratic National Convention meets in July. Several firms experienced in catering at conventions offered large sums for a bar concession, but the committee voted unanimously against the sale of liquor on the auditorium premises, and decided further to refuse all concessions of whatsoever kind. This proves that the Democratic party is learning the sentiment of the people and can read the signs aright.

The General Conference of the M. E. Church, in session the past month in Baltimore, adjourned Monday night. The designation "Presiding Elder" was changed to "District Superintendent." When the Conference adjourned, the time limit for pastors, the attitude on amusements, a resolution on divorce and a revised ritual were left unacted upon.
