AN EFFICIENT FIRE CO.

Two Alarms Sounded in Chestertown Within a Week and Valliant Work Done by Local Fire Co. Saturday afternoon when the town was crowded with teams and many of the fire company were at the College a fire was discovered in Pippin's Hotel. The alarm was given and in a very few minutes the hotel was surrounded and filled with willing workers. It proved to be a foul chimney and no damage resulted.

Wednesday afternoon about 2 o'clock fire was discovered in the small frame tenement house adjoining the home of John H. Kish, Esq., and occupied by Mr. Theodore Kershaw. Within three minutes after the alarm was given two hose companies were on hand and plenty of water so that the fire was soon under control. It was surely an ugly outlook as the building was old and the blaze was rapidly making its way out the roof while the buildings adjacent were only two feet away. The loss will amount to about \$100 covered by insurance in Mr. Kershaw's agency. The house belonged to Henry Landin and will be put in tenable condition at once.
