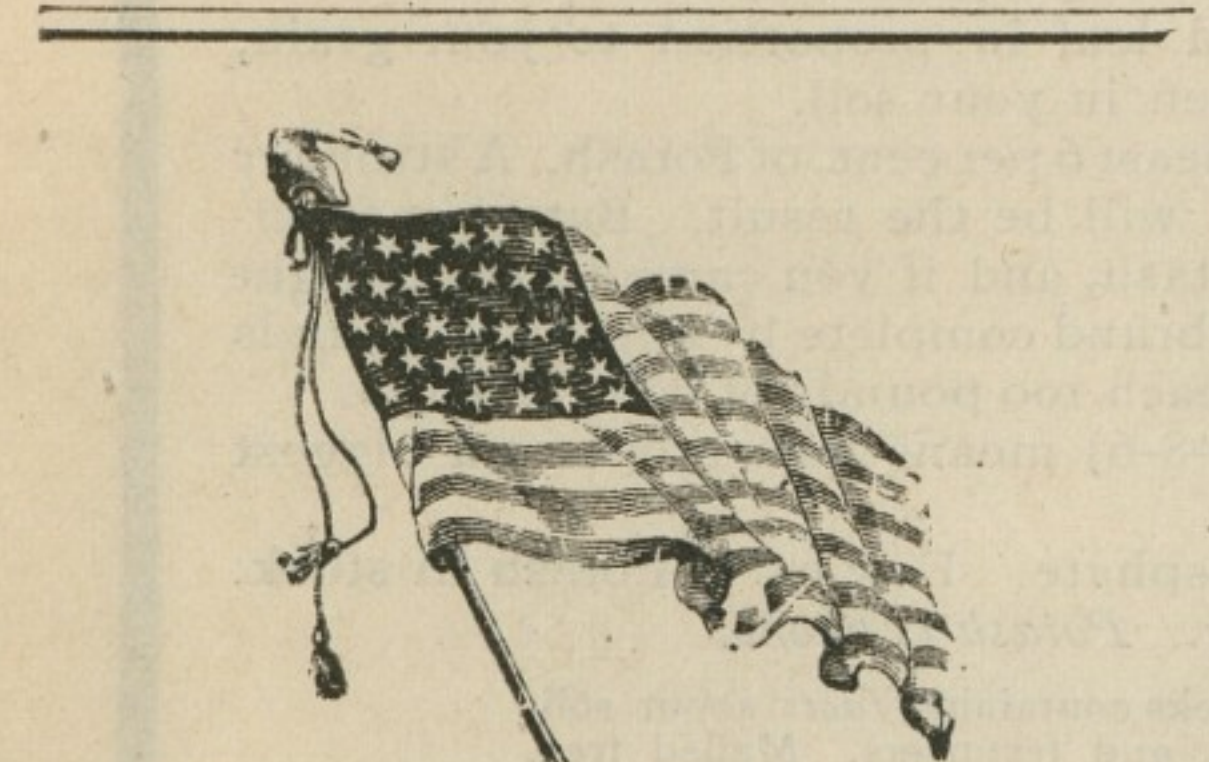

WHAT BRYAN IS WORTH Assessed for \$84,500, but He Has \$75,000 More in Bonds.

Lincoln, Neb., June 26.—According to the county assessors, William J. Bryan stands eighth in the list of Lincoln's wealthy men.

Household goods, \$3,500; 21 head of cattle, \$1,200; dogs, \$40; cash on hand April 1, \$2,100; piano, \$500; pictures and engravings, \$1,000; agricultural tools, \$150; four horses, \$800; notes, \$1,000; diamonds, \$400; six vehicles, \$600.

In Nebraska the law is that everything shall be assessed at its cash value, what it will bring in the market, but as a rule the valuation made represents about three-fourths of the true value.

The mansion at Fair View is assessed for taxation at a figure higher than any other in Lancaster county, with one exception.

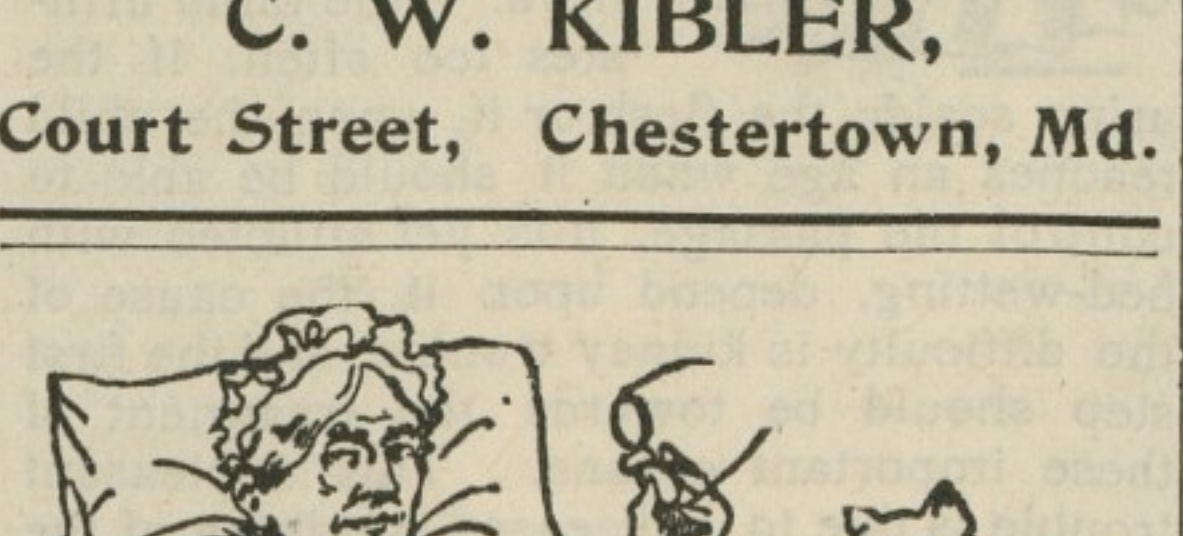
