There are over 24,000 ducks, big and little, large and small, at the present time on Oxford duck farm, which is one of the largest poultry farms in the State.

Officers of the State Horticultural Department have sent out local inspectors appointed in the various counties to inspect orchards for San Jose scale and peach yellows.

It is certainly a great wrong to the community to allow such a sacred and otherwise beautiful spot to be marred by neglect. 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FARMING NOTES.

Interesting Items Concerning Crops—The Drought Becoming Serious—Pastures Drying Up—Inspecting Trees.

It has been thirty days since Kent county was visited by rain and the need of a good soaking rain is sorely felt. Corn is about to tassel and hangs drooping under the blaze of the sun while the blades near the ground are turning yellow.

It is a singular experience that farmers are getting more wheat from corn ground than from fallow.

Wm. Bonwill got an average of 23 bushels to the acre.

R. G. Nicholson got an average of 24 bushels. He threshed 26 bushels to the acre of one field.

One of the best yields of wheat this year was obtained by Mr. W. M. Cleandaniel, near Kennedysville. He threshed an average of 24 1/2 bushels per acre from his corn and 19 1/2 from fallow ground.

Mrs. J. L. Beck, near Tolchester, got 16 bushels per acre.

Mr. W. E. Plummer obtained 21 1/2 bushels from fallow and 16 1/2 from corn ground.

A. S. Turner, of Worton, had the first new wheat in Philadelphia market this year.

The white potato crop of the Eastern Shore of Maryland and Virginia is quite prolific this year. They are being shipped in large quantities and are bringing \$2.50 to \$3.25 a barrel.

Percy V. Hendrickson on W. L. Lusby's farm got 24 bushels per acre off fallow and 16 off corn ground.

J. Thomas Blackiston on F. G. Usilton's place averaged 15 bushels per acre.

Wm. T. Nicholson on "Flatland" averaged 15 bushels per acre.

James Donahoe on the C. H. B. Masser farm got 30 bushels per acre on fallow and 21 bushels per acre.

Mr. Walter S. Trew got 620 bushels of 22 acres and he estimates that he lost one-third by scab. It took 40 pounds of twine per acre to bind this field of wheat.

Mr. Jos. Trew got an average of 17 bushels.

Mr. Thos. Bryan, on J. D. Urie's Norfolk farm got 18 bushels per acre off corn ground and 24 bushels per acre off fallow.
