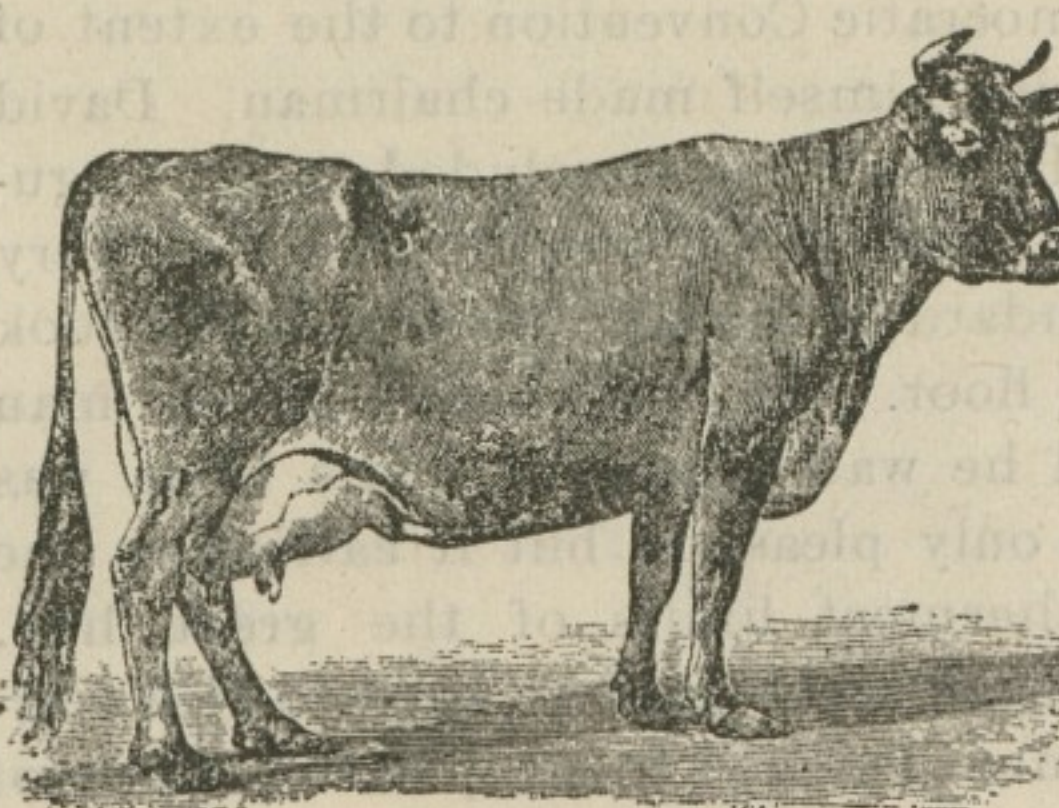

LIGHTNING'S FREAKS.

The storm on Tuesday afternoon took the form of a miniature cyclone in lower Kent. Capt. Taylor says it was one of the worst winds he had ever experienced. Mr. John C. Wood says the fruit on the island was blown off in large quantities while many shade trees were blown down.

Nine sheep belonging to Mr. Walter Hadaway were killed outright while in his field.

Mrs. Gertrude Hyson while sitting on a coil of rope near Rock Hall received a severe shock from lightning. Her skirts were burned from her and her side somewhat injured. At this writing she has about recovered but will never forget her experience.

JOSEPH LOGAN KILLED

Thrown From Dog Cart And Kicked By Horse Near Crompton Lane on Monday.

Mr. Joseph Logan, aged about 25, son of Mr. Robert Logan, tenant on the Spry farm, was killed Monday evening while driving along Crompton lane toward Crompton. Mr. Logan was in his dog cart and while driving down the road gave Mr. Joseph Ringgold a little "brush." The bolt of his cart came out and he was thrown down behind his horse and before the animal could be stopped he had kicked Mr. Logan a severe kick on the head which caused his death. Mr. Ringgold went to his relief and Dr. Landers was summoned but life was extinct and by 9 p. m. all was over with Joseph. The deceased was a splendid young man, weighed 190 pounds and industrious. He had many warm friends who regret the sad occurrence.

A TERRIBLE INCIDENT.

Miss May Elburn All Ablaze Rushes Into The Mill Pond, near Chestertown.

Miss May Elburn, oldest daughter of Mr. Wm. S. Elburn, of near Chestertown, with a terrible accident Thursday morning about 5 o'clock. Several of the family had gone to the picnic and during their absence Miss Elburn met with this accident. She spilled coal oil over her person after which she took fire, and when the fire had enveloped her whole person she rushed out the door and plunged into the mill-pond, just a few feet from her door. Her brother was at work out side and saw Miss May as she came from the house and went to her relief. Messrs. T. H. Topping and J. Gale Usilton happened to be at the mill and also saw the appalling sight. Mrs. Topping went to the lady's aid and Dr. H. G. Simpers was quickly summoned. At this writing the patient is extremely low.

A Queen Anne's Farmer Murdered.

Wm. Williams, a farmer of near Maryland, Queen Anne's county, was found in the woods near his home dead. In the dead man's pockets was found a marriage license to wed 18-year-old Elizabeth Walls, a daughter of Samuel Walls. At the inquest the verdict was that he had been murdered. He owned a nice farm in Delaware. Opinion is divided as to the motive for the murder of the old man. Some think he was murdered through jealousy or by persons who opposed his marriage to such a young girl. Mr. Williams was a frequent visitor to Crompton and the last seen of him alive was Saturday when he left home to visit John Wessels of that place.
