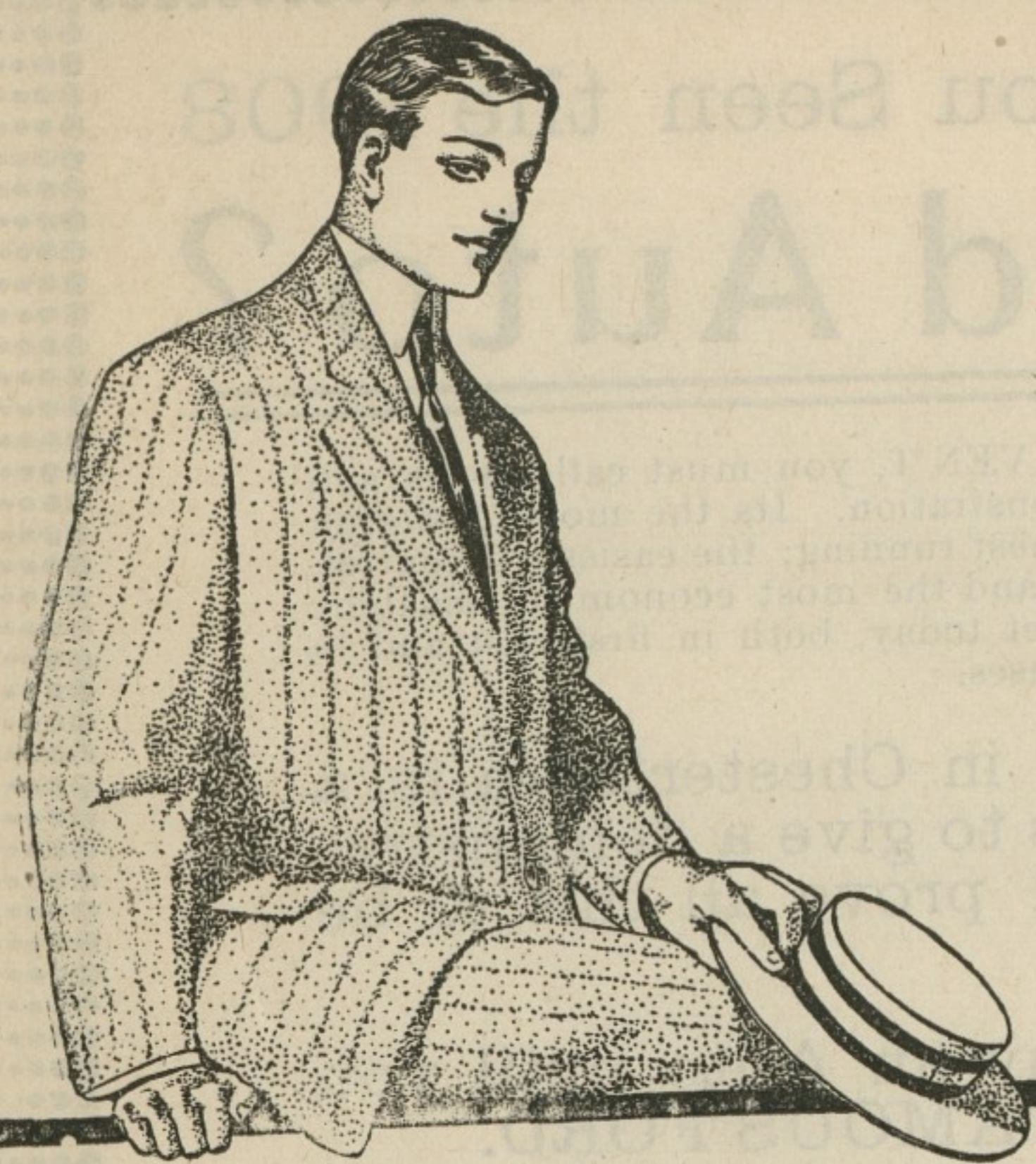

### Live Local Notes.

**Sudden Death.**—A colored laborer named Wolford, who was employed by Capt. George W. Moors on his boat at Harris' wharf Tuesday night fell dead. He had eaten a hearty supper of crabs, and went to carry grain on board of the vessel when, upon emptying his first sack, fell dead on the deck. Judge Shalcross summoned a jury of inquest, and after an examination by Drs. Maxwell and Finley pronounced his death caused by acute indigestion.

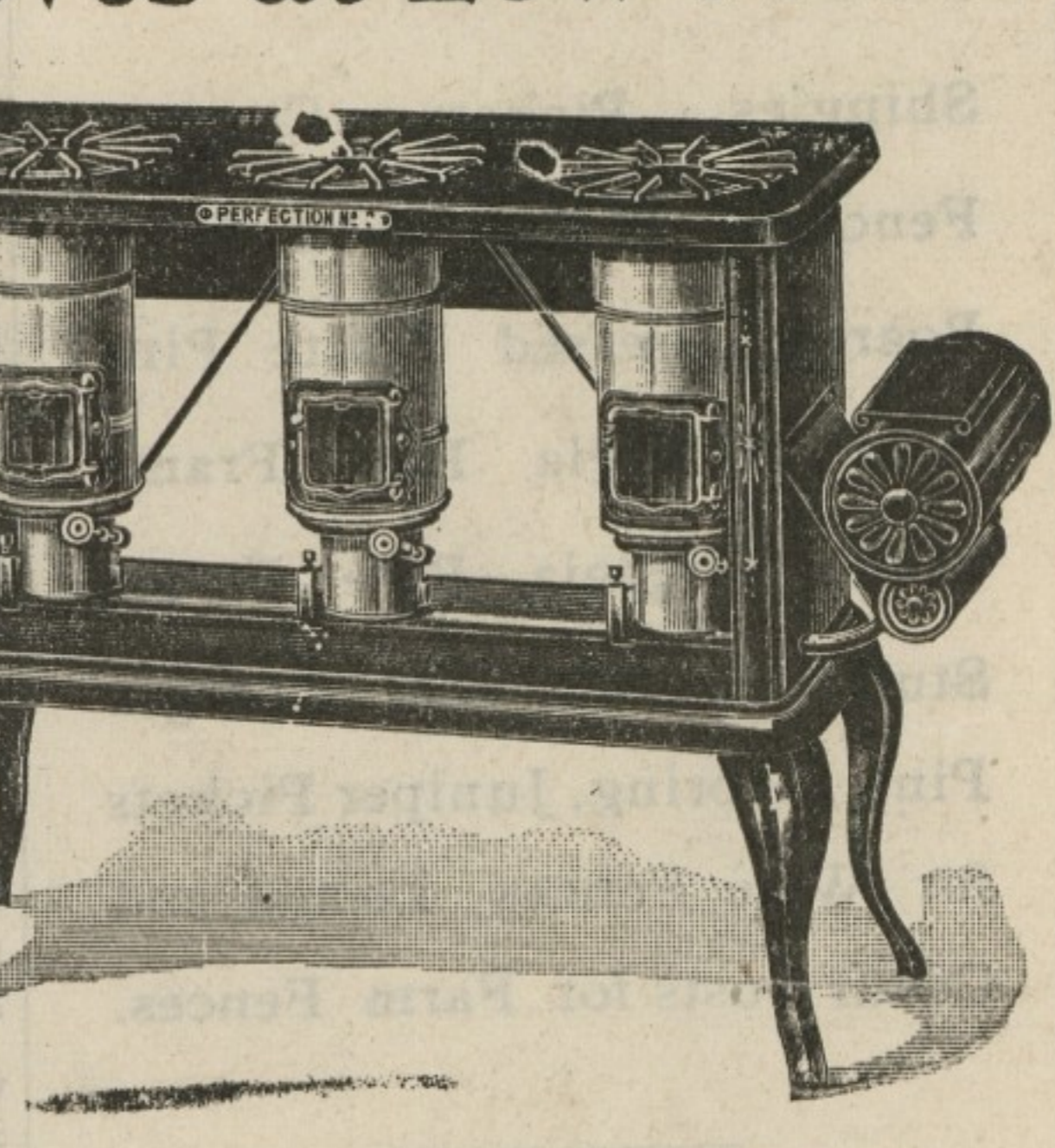

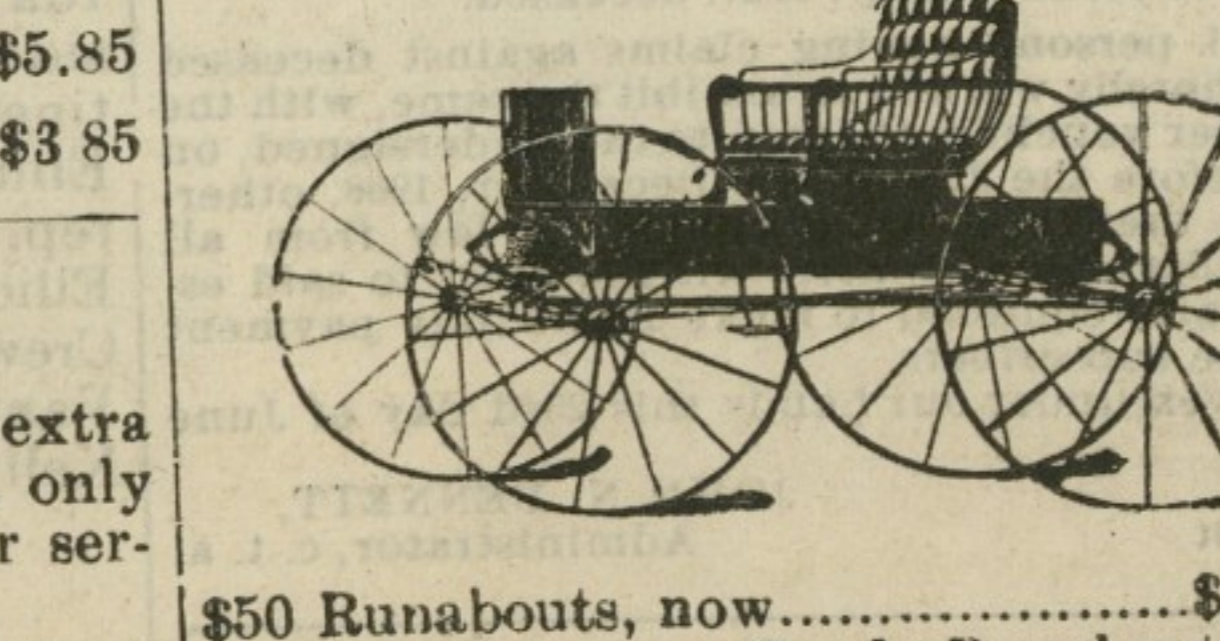
