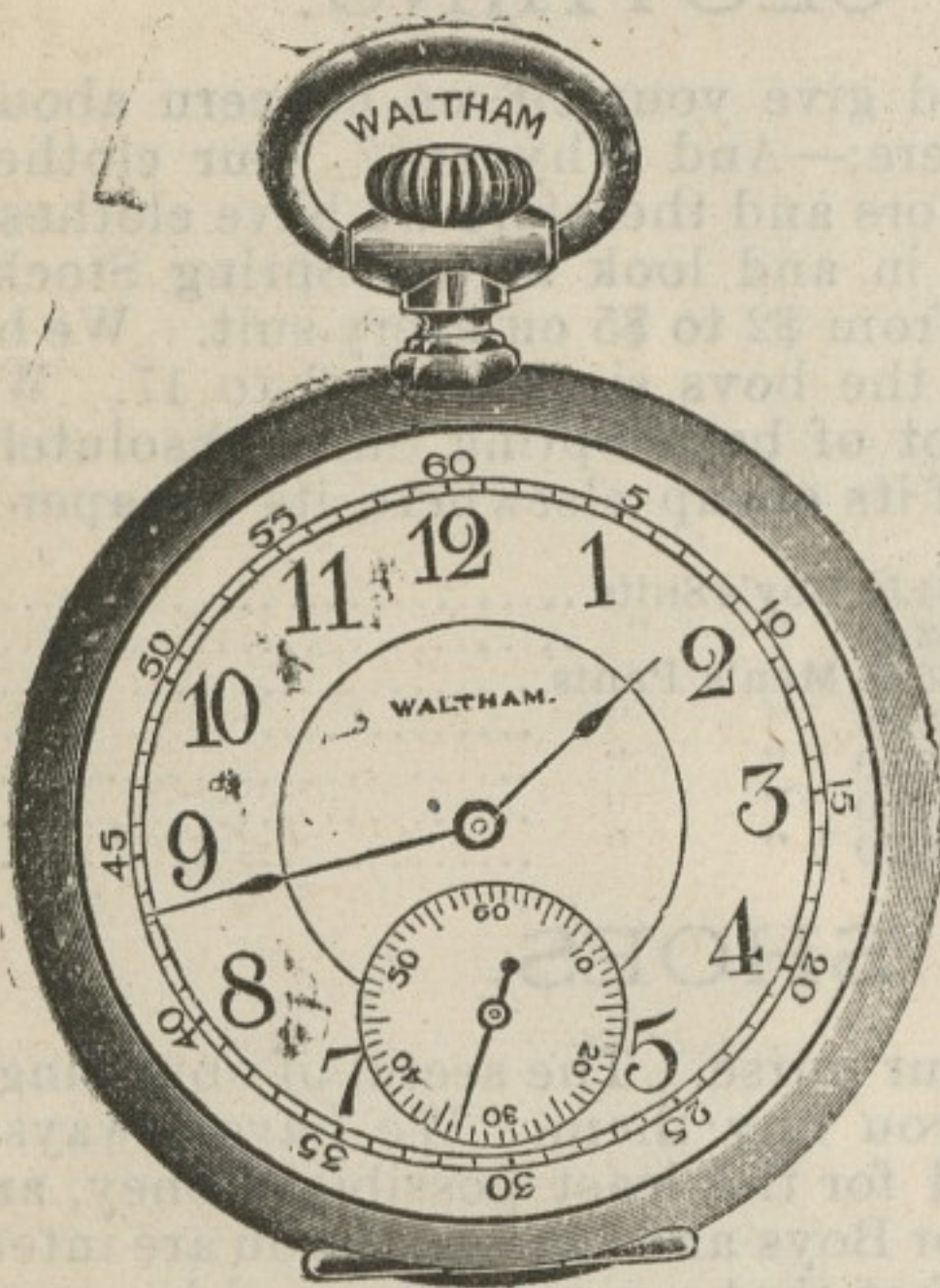

DEATH'S DOINGS.

MARY A. STEWART. Miss Mary A. Stewart died in Baltimore last week, aged 54. She had been ill for many years during which time she had the devoted attention of her father, David Stewart and friends. The funeral took place at Middletown last Friday.

WILLIAM P. ROWAN, SR. William P. Rowan, Sr., after a short illness passed away at his home near Earleville on Sunday morning, aged 67 years. The deceased was a prominent farmer. He is survived by a widow and two sons, John Cavender Rowan and William P. Rowan, Jr.

Funeral services were held at his late residence on Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, Revs. W. F. Dawson and C. E. Jones officiating.

ISAAC JEWELL. Rev. Isaac Jewell, formerly of Kent, died at his home in California last Saturday morning after a lingering illness of pneumonia. The deceased was stationed at Queenstown for many years and while there married Miss Carter, daughter of the late Richard E. and Elizabeth Carter, and a sister to Mrs. Richard E. Bryan, of Baltimore. She survives him. The remains were interred in a cemetery near his late home.

HENRY W. ARCHER. Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Archer, widow of Henry W. Archer, died suddenly of heart failure Monday morning at her country home near Belair, aged 80 years. Mrs. Archer was the daughter of the late John and Elizabeth Walker, of Kent county. She was married to Mr. Archer in June, 1849, and his death occurred in July, 1887. She was a member of Emmanuel Protestant Episcopal Church of Belair and was greatly beloved by a large circle of friends.

THOMAS SAULSBURY, 91 years old, died Thursday. He had been ill for several weeks. He went to Delaware several years ago from Caroline county, Maryland, where he had been Sheriff. He was an active Democrat and took a prominent part in Caroline county politics for many years. While living in Maryland he was a farmer, but he retired after going to Dover. He was a cousin of late Senator Eli Sausbury and of Chancellor William Sausbury and the late Governor Sausbury.

Cochran, Middletown, Del., was the scene of a quiet home wedding at 10:30 o'clock Thursday morning, when their daughter, Miss Adele Hynson, was united in marriage to Mr. Joseph Wallace Beaten, of Hertford, North Carolina. Rev. Henry Donohue, pastor of St. Anne's Church, performed the ceremony which was witnessed by relatives and friends.

Under the spreading branches of a giant oak in front of the home of the Rev. Mr. Compher, near Rock Hall, Miss Della Enos, 17, was married to Mr. H. Carroll Crew, 116 South Gilmor street, were married at 8:40 o'clock Saturday night, July 18, while their unsuspecting parents thought they were away for a week-end visit.

The young couple, accompanied by the bride's sister, Miss Della Enos, left Baltimore Saturday afternoon to visit Rev. Mr. Compher. Arriving at his home they acquainted him with their wish to become married. The good parson started out on a race to Chestertown in order to procure a license before the clerk's office should be closed.
